

## News of the Week.

## NEW BRUNSWICK.

A young man named Hughes got drunk in a Gibson rum shop, was turned out in the cold and was found in the morning badly frozen.

The pack of lobsters in Westmorland Co. last summer amounted to 9,514 cases, equal to 156,672 pounds.

There are a number of cases of diphtheria at St. Stephen. The patients are isolated and all precautions taken.

The house of Mr. Charles McLean, in Woodstock, was destroyed by fire Thursday morning; loss about \$1200 which is covered by insurance.

While the Rev. Mr. deSoyres was preaching "peace on earth and good will toward men," in St. John's (Stone) church Christmas morning, some person entered the robing room and stole the pastor's watch.

When the Chignecto Ship Railway is completed a saving of 640 miles will be made by a vessel from Moncton bound for Prince Edward Island.

The Moncton soap and chemical company's factory at Moncton, with everything in the building, including the company's books, was destroyed by fire Friday night.

James Magee was engaged on Tuesday, of last week, in digging a well for S. A. Carpenter of Lancaster, when the side caved in and the unfortunate man was buried forty feet from the surface under fifteen feet of earth. Owing to the unstable nature of the soil it was impossible to rescue him although he lived for several hours after the accident and was heard to speak and groan.

## NOVA SCOTIA.

The Vale Colliery, Pictou county, is reported on fire.

During the year 745,000 tons of coal have been mined in Cape Breton against 240,000 in 1879.

In the coal mines of Cape Breton an army of from 4000 to 5000 persons are employed, and about 18,000 persons are supported by this industry.

John Ehler of Crow Harbor and Thomas Macdonald of Guysboro, were found guilty in the admiralty court at Halifax, Tuesday, of complicity in the extensive smuggling of American whisky into Canada from the Island of St. Pierre, whither the liquor had been taken from Boston. Ehler was fined \$600 and given six months imprisonment. Macdonald was fined \$300 and given three months.

It is reported that the Londonderry Iron Co. have examined the iron deposits on the Nova Scotia Central railway with a view to develop them. The ore is found to be much superior to that near their works over the N. S. C. R., W. & A. R. and I. C. R.

One day last week the schr. Island Belle, Anderson, from Apple River, for St. John, with a cargo of deals, put into Digby in distress. Capt. Anderson reports that he left Apple River, Sunday night. Early Monday morning, when off Quaco, the wind blew a gale from the northeast accompanied by a thick snow storm, during which the vessel sprang a leak, and had 20,000 feet of deals washed over-board and other damage done about the deck. Finding it impossible to make a harbour on the New Brunswick side the vessel was headed for Digby.

Preparations are being made for the building of 24 vessels along the shore from Parrsboro to Advocate this coming summer.

The apple crop in the Cornwallis Valley during the past season was about 400,000 barrels of which about 20,000 are still unshipped.

All efforts to extinguish the fire in the Vale colliery proved unavailing, and on Wednesday the management decided to shut down the mine, closing all the air drafts, in order to smother the fire if possible. Between three and four hundred men will be thrown out of work at the mine and an explosion may occur at any time, which will only be dangerous near the opening.

The Yarmouth schooner Lennie, Capt. Porter, from Antigua for Yarmouth with a cargo of molasses, ran ashore at Sandy Cove, 20 miles below Digby Gut, in a heavy gale and snow storm Thursday morning. Capt. Porter and seaman William Hutchinson were drowned. The vessel and cargo will be a total loss. The rest of the crew were saved with the greatest difficulty.

The estimates of civic expenditure in Halifax next year are \$306,000.

George Cunningham and wife, who smothered their child during a drunken debauch, are to be prosecuted for manslaughter.

Friday afternoon Wellesley Morton who was visiting his father at Harris Island, one of the Tusket group, went duck shooting on the shore of the island. He did not return and yesterday those who went to search for him found him dead with his side ripped up by a shot from his gun. It is supposed that he was creeping along dragging his gun by the barrel, when it went off and killed him. Morton was about 40 years of age.

## OTHER PROVINCES.

The day before Christmas, Geo. Springstead, aged 25, a Michigan Central railway brakeman of St. Thomas, Ont., fell from his train at Tilsonburg and portions of his body were found on the track. The remainder has been crushed into mince meat between the engine wheels and the fire box.

Jas. Kew, aged 55, was to-day sentenced to imprisonment for life for indecently assaulting Christina Christolm, a little girl in Toronto.

So far this year twenty-two thousand immigrants have settled in Manitoba and Northwest territories as against seventeen thousand last year.

A despatch from Vancouver, B. C., says that while a party of six persons were driving through some woods in a sleigh, a large fir tree fell, striking the sleigh and instantly killed four of the occupants.

Five convicts escaped from the penitentiary at Kingston, Ont., Christmas night, after clubbing and binding three guards and convicts in the bakery, where they were working. Some time after the convicts left one of the guards got the gag out and raised the alarm, but the fugitives could not be traced. Thursday it was learned that during the night they stole a boat and left for the States, twelve miles distant. The lake was very rough, but they may have crossed in safety. All are desperate characters, and are well armed.

## UNITED STATES.

A cotton compress at Fort Worth, Texas, with 10 car loads of cotton on the track and about 20,000 bales on the platform, were destroyed by fire. Loss \$150,000.

A disastrous cave-in occurred in Lane mine, Cal., owned by Howard & Hobart, by which sixteen men were buried. The men were working on a 4,000 foot level when the timbers suddenly gave way and the roof and timbers fell on them.

A family of eight persons—mother, father and six children—was in a starving condition near Moyer, Pa., and were brought here to be sent to the county home. All of the family are in a dying condition. The father and mother were taken ill from fever, and as they lived in an isolated place the children could procure no aid. There condition was accidentally discovered by a farmer who chanced to visit the house.

Eighty-seven persons have been killed by the electric wires in the United States within the present year. It now seems reasonably certain that electricity will kill.

In Manchester, N. H., a house occupied by Charles Savory was partly burned Thursday morning. Mrs. Savory was suffocated by smoke and two children were rendered unconscious, and in a critical condition.

At Mount Vernon Mich., last night, Wm. Major killed his wife, his daughter, and his grand-daughter. Major is about 50 years old and a well-to-do farmer.

The principal colliers in the great Wyoming region between Wilkesbarre and Carbondale, Pa., will suspend operations owing to the dullness of the coal market. About ten thousand miners will be idle in this field by the end of the week.

A despatch from Hancock, Mich., says a family named Gross, consisting of parents and eight children, with a visitor, was consumed in a burning dwelling at Huron town Sunday morning.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Private telegrams from Montevideo, received by persons here, confirm the news of recent disorder and riots in Brazil and state the situation of the present Brazilian government is critical.

The town of Aci Reale, Sicily, was shaken by earthquake yesterday. Several houses collapsed and many persons were buried under the ruins.

The hospitals of Vienna are crowded with patients suffering from influenza, accompanied by inflammation of the lungs, pleurisy and peritonitis.

The influenza epidemic at Paris has assumed a graver type and many cases are now complicated with pneumonia. In consequence of the constantly increasing crowd at the hospitals, the authorities are erecting tents for the sufferers. Undertakers are overworked and many of their employees are down. The official return for the week gives 200 more deaths than for the preceding week.

The ceremony of proclaiming Carlo I, King of Portugal and Algarves, took place Saturday without untoward incident.

A report comes from St. Petersburg that there is some dissatisfaction in the army and several arrests have been made of officers who have given too free vent to their opinions.

A despatch just received from Oporto, says that the Ex-Empress of Brazil, died there Saturday. It is believed death resulted from heart disease.

The smallest circular saw in practice use is a tiny disc about the size of a shilling, which is employed for cutting the slits in gold pens. These saws are about as thick as ordinary paper and revolve some 4,000 times per minute. Their high velocity keeps them rigid, notwithstanding their extreme thinness.

The insurance companies of the United States have already invaded Central and South America, and last year transacted business amounting to \$40,000,000, from which they derived a cash income of \$6,000,000. One company alone reports business amounting to \$16,000,000 per annum.

Volapuk is scarcely ten years old, and yet there are said to be 2,000,000 people studying the subject. More than 2,000 books have been published upon the subject, more than thirty periodicals are regularly issued in its interest, more than 600 societies have been organized.

In China, the inhabitants are counted every year in a curious way. The oldest master of every ten houses has to count the families, and has to make a list, which is sent to the imperial tax house. Last year the whole number amounted to 379,383,500 inhabitants.

During some manoeuvres of the German cavalry at Brigg, a woman and a little boy got in front of a regiment of cuirassiers charging in full gallop. The leading officer shouted to her to lie down, and she did, lying upon her boy. The whole regiment passed over without injuring her. Every horse in whose track she lay was made to jump over her.

Teacher (to class in arithmetic): "John goes marketing. He buys two and a quarter pounds of sugar at eleven cents a pound, two dozen eggs at sixteen cents a dozen, and a gallon and a half of milk at twenty cents a gallon. What does it all make?"
