

## News of the Week.

## NEW BRUNSWICK.

A despatch from Edmundston, says that on Tuesday of last week thunder and hail storm did considerable damage in the parish of St. Ann's Madawaska Co. The cyclone covered a territory of about two miles in width, travelling from east to west, blowing down 31 buildings, as far as heard from. The damage to crops was heavy, the hail in some instances cutting them level with the ground.

The dwelling house and barns of H. A. Wallace, Upper Caverhill, were consumed by fire on Wednesday morning. Very little was saved. The first load of hay, which had been hauled into one of the barns was saved with the wagon and horses. The loss is estimated at \$800; insured for \$450.

The residence of Major O'Malley at Kingsclear, York county, was destroyed by fire, Wednesday afternoon. All the barns and outbuildings were burned to the ground and the flames spread so rapidly that not a thing was saved. The dwelling was worth about \$3000 and the loss of furniture was heavy. Insurance light.

The Victoria Co. Election is fixed for Saturday, Aug. 23; nomination one week previous.

During the month of July there were manufactured and shipped from Marysville, lumber, laths, brick and cotton to the amount of \$110,200.

The yard in front of the I. O. C. R. general freight shed St. John, is being paved. The work will be 300 feet long by 30.

R. Barry Smith and David Grant to be sitting magistrates for the city of Moncton.

Antoine Roebichaud and Amand Daigle to be justices of the peace for the county of Kent.

James English has been removed from the office of labor commissioner of the parish of Canterbury, York Co.

David Bartlett has resigned the office of coroner of York County.

A man who stole \$120 from Messrs. C. & E. Everett, St. John, was captured at Vancouver. The money was found in his possession.

Many of the hands employed in the railway shops at McAdam have been discharged, and work has been proportionately reduced.

The recent excessive heat has been very fatal to children. In this city at least twenty five little ones have died since the heated term commenced.

The railway authorities have discovered that three or four messenger boys employed in the general offices Moncton, have made large steals of postage stamps, rubber bands, pens, etc., which they have sold around town.

In St. Stephen, Walter Jenkins and his father, Jas. Jenkins, are charged respectively with theft and receiving the stolen goods. The boy, a lad of 16 or 17 years has been in the employment of Broad & Sons. Mr. Broad has been missing edge tools for several months, but was not able to trace them until after a day ago, when, in company with the Deputy Sheriff he proceeded to the residence of the boy's father, James Jenkins, found about 150 of the missing articles, which included axes, chisels, etc.,

Mr. Daniel Casey, for many years Road Master in this city, died on Friday. He was 80 years of age. Every body knew him, and he had the respect of his fellow citizens, as a man of integrity and a good citizen.

## NOVA SCOTIA.

The estate of the late lieutenant-governor McLellan is worth about \$150,000.

The Pictou Standard says: Geo. J. Geldert has been awarded the sum of \$7,500 for injuries received at the River John Bridge last winter. He claimed \$8000. This is a nice sum for Pictou county to be saddled with, but it's only another instance of having to pay for gross carelessness on the part of those in authority.

A Liverpool, Nova Scotia, despatch says: Thursday morning, James Warman, clerk in Colin Campbell's hardware store, set fire to some powder spilt on the floor. It ignited a keg of powder close by and in a moment the store was wrecked. A fire started but was quickly put out. The front of the store of Forbes and McNutt opposite was blown in. Warman will probably die, and another boy is badly burned.

There was shipped from Caledonia mines during the month of July, 27,700 tons of coal, probably the largest monthly shipment from one pit ever made in the provinces.

George Watt has put up, this season, at Black Point in Liverpool county, N. S., 350 cases of canned mackerel.

The last span of the Grand Narrows Bridge on the Cape Breton Railway was placed in position last week. The span is 240 feet long and weighs 225 tons.

For fourteen years the law expenses of the city of Halifax have averaged \$2000 per annum.

The New Glasgow Enterprise gives a lengthy account of the building operations in Pictou county, and estimates that over \$300,000 is being spent this year. \$100,000 in New Glasgow, (which includes \$50,000 for streets) \$70,000 in Westville, \$35,000 in Pictou, \$25,000 in Trenton and \$20,000 in Stellarton. \$100,000 is also being spent in Truro.

The Acadia Convention in Digby county this week bids fair to be the largest representative gathering of the kind ever held in the Maritime provinces.

Mackerel are abundant on the western shore of Cape Breton. Cod fishing is good around Cape Breton, while bait is plentiful at Canso and on the west shore of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Adolphus A. Porter of Belleville, Yarmouth Co., has on his farm an apple tree measuring over seven feet in circumference. It has produced as high as fourteen barrels of apples in one season.

Mr. Jacob N. Hatfield, of Gravelton N. S. has a cherry tree of the ox-heart variety, from which he claims to have picked seventy-five quarts of fruit this season, and there is a quantity still on the tree. These cherries are larger than the ordinary kind.

Sheriff Hill of Antigonish, N. S., is dead.

The Halifax street railway has passed into possession of the Nova Scotia Power Company.

There are in Nova Scotia 138 lodges of Good Templars in good standing, with 5,340 members.

Ten miles from Sydney, C. B., is the Coxheath, which will be, when developed one of the rich copper mines of Canada. Already a quarter of a million dollars has been expended in developing the property. The main mine has one shaft 260 feet deep. The chief vein is 12 ft. wide 400 ft. in length and 100 feet high. Another shaft is proving to have better ore than the first.

A new industry has been started at Kentville, called the Kerr Vegetable Evaporating Co., with a capital of \$20,000. The product is said to be highly endorsed by the British admiralty who have used it, and have given three large orders for supplying the navy.

A small green insect has been attacking the oats, in Colchester Co. They live on the leaf, and it soon turns rusty. It is not yet known what effect it may have on the crop, which is growing well.

It is estimated that new buildings to the value of \$300,000 are being erected in Pictou county at present. Those at Truro are placed at \$100,000, at Westville \$70,000, at Pictou \$30,000.

## OTHER PROVINCES.

It is said the hay crop on P. E. Island has not been so poor for the last 30 or 35 years.

Mr. Greenway estimates the wheat crop of Winnipeg at 15,000,000 of bushels. Mr. O'Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R. puts it at 17,000,000, with 12,000,000 bushels to export.

The steamer "Napoleon" has successfully placed in position a new fog whistle at Cape Normand, on the Newfoundland shore of the Straits of Belle Isle.

The indications are that the salmon catch in British Columbia this year will be very light.

Winnipeg advises say that the head of a large grain dealing firm estimates a million bushels of wheat were destroyed by last Tuesday's hail storm.

Advices from Cape Normand, Nfld., report that the people there are suffering for want of food. Not a pound of flour is to be obtained in the district, and some families have subsisted for months on mussels and shell-fish. On June 20th snow fell to a depth of four inches. A similar state of affairs is reported from Quirpon.

A heavy thunder storm passed over P. E. Island, Tuesday night. In several parts of the island lightning did destructive work.

A sailor from Gaspé jumped or fell off the west-bound Quebec express near Millstream, Quebec, while, the train was going forty miles an hour. He was brought to Campbellton. It is feared he is fatally injured.

The Dominion government has decided to connect the shore of Anticosti and Mingan, on the mainland, with a submarine cable, and the work will commence next week. The cable will cost fifteen thousand dollars.

From July 1 to July 31, 17,082 immigrants arrived in Montreal from the old country, and of this number 12,193 settled in Canada and 4,889 in the Western States. Those remaining in Canada brought about \$750,000 into the country.

The minister of marine and fisheries received a telegram from British Columbia Friday, which states that the salmon run is of an extraordinary character and fully equal to last year. Three canneries took twenty thousand fish in one day. Operations of the government fish hatchery are beginning to tell.

## UNITED STATES.

Miss Annie Vigout, Waterbury, Conn., aged 20 years, was disfigured for life by some miscreant throwing some powerful acid on her through a window, as she was sleeping.

Hail storms prevailed in many portions of Minnesota Thursday night, hail falling in great quantities, accompanied by destructive winds.

Thursday afternoon the convicts in the harness shop of the Charleston, Mass., State prison refused to obey the orders of the keepers and began throwing missiles in every direction. They made a dash for the guard and tried to scale the walls, but the sentinels fired on them. An alarm was sent out to the Boston police, and in less than five minutes 45 officers arrived, and shortly thereafter about 150 more appeared. In 15 minutes from the beginning of the uprising the men were safely under lock and key.

In Providence, R. I., Jerome Sweet, who poured kerosene over his wife's clothing and set it on fire, has confessed that he did the deed, admitted that he intended to set fire to his own clothing in a like manner but his courage failed him. The woman is dying.

Kemmler was executed by electricity in New York on Wednesday. This is the first execution by electricity.

The corn crop in Nebraska is far below the average.

Governor Steele, of Oklahoma, has officially reported that there is great suffering among the people of the territory and that many of the families are in actual want of the necessities of life. The President sent a message to congress recommending that authority be given to use the balance of the Mississippi River flood fund (\$45,000), to meet the most urgent necessities of the people of Oklahoma.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Cholera is raging at Jeddah, Egypt. The number of deaths average 100 daily.

About 180 houses and immense stores of corn have been destroyed by fire in the village of Puspok, Harval, Hungary.

A railway train was thrown from the track near Pilsen, Bohemia, Wednesday. The cars rolled down an embankment into a marsh. A stroker and several passengers were killed, and nearly eighty passengers injured.

The exodus of Jews from different points in Russia has commenced. Thousands are going to Brazil; others to Algeria.

Cholera is spreading at Mecca. Wednesday 81 deaths from the disease were reported, and Thursday 84. All ports in the Red Sea, the Levant and in Asia Minor have been quarantined against pilgrims.

Mme. Bournion, the fasting woman of Bourdonilles, France, has died from inability to digest food. She had abstained for 33 days.

Cholera is spreading in Spain, and is threatening Portugal and other European countries. It is extremely virulent in Mecca among pilgrims. Last Saturday 400 victims were reported, and on Sunday 500. The pilgrims are usually excessively filthy, and pay no regard to the laws of health. Precautions are taken in Egypt and Asia Minor to prevent contagion. But it is quite possible that the plague will spread. Hence, preparation is proper everywhere. The cleanliness and temperance that protect from cholera are a protection from less deadly and awful diseases.

The spread of cholera in the south of Spain has caused a panic among the inhabitants. A general exodus has begun to the north of Spain and France.

Mr. Powell, Dublin, editor of the *Midland Tribune*, has been sentenced to six months' imprisonment in Tullamore jail for publishing a boycott resolution.

About 12,000 natives belonging to hostile tribes have assembled in the vicinity of Melilla, a Spanish colony in Morocco. They demand the release of Moorish hostages held there and will fight if it is not complied with.

In all there are now about twenty five Protestant missionaries in Korea, but the most of them are recent comers, and only four or five are able to speak the language with ease. The first church, which started in September, 1887, with twenty members, has now over a hundred.
