INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Third Quarter—Lesson VIII.—Sept. 7.
JESUS AND ZACCHAEUS
THE PUBLICAN.—Luke 19: 1-10.

GOLDEN TEXT.—The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost.—Luke 19: 10.

THE SEEKER, ZACCHAEUS.—Vers. 1, 2. And Jesus entered and passed (was passing) through Jericho. His last journey from Ephraim, along the frontiers between Samaria and Galilee, down the Jordan, across the fords of the Jordan to Jericho, thence through Bethany to Jerusalem. Jericho. The largest city in the valley of the Jordan, about 20 miles north-east of Jerusalem, on the west side of the river Jordan. Jericho was wealthy and flourishing. And behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus, the chief among the publicans. See Lesson VIII. this Quarter. There must have been at Jericho one of the principal custom-houses. Zacchaeus was at the head of the office. The taxes imposed by the Romans were farmed out to men, who, for a specified sum paid at once into the Roman treasury, obtained the right of collecting the taxes of a province or city. These contractors, who were usually Roman knights, entrusted the collection of taxes to sub-contractors or tax gatherers. It is probable that Zacchaeus was a sub-contractor under the Roman knight. And he was rich. He had every opportunity to amass wealth. He had not an altogether clear conscience as to the way he had gained some of his riches. He was in some degree convicted of sin, and that conviction may have been deepened by what he had heard of the teachings of Jesus, felt longings for better things, and a nobler life. He was a publican, a religious outcast, from whom nothing good was expected.

SEEKING JESUS.—Vers. 3, 4. And he sought to see Jesus. It is probable that curiosity had something to do with his interest. Besides, his awakened conscience would give him no rest. And could not for the press. The crowd who surrounded Jesus. Because he was little of stature, and could not see over the heads of the multitude, or make his way through them. And he ran before the multitude, along the path in which they were coming. And climbed up into a sycamore tree. This tree was not like our sycamore, into which Zacchaeus could never have climbed—a squirrel cannot even scale them. It was the Egyptian fig tree. It grows large and high. It was formerly abundant in Palestine. A lofty and shady tree, the sycamore was planted along the wayside. Its stem is short, and frequently 50 feet in circumference, and its boughs extend horizontally to a great distance.

THE WELCOME OF JESUS.—Vers. 5-7. The action of Zacchaeus was really a prayer, which Jesus answered in his own way. And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up and saw him. He knew both his name and his desire. Zacchaeus, make haste, and come down. Words of extraordinary grace. For to day I must abide at thy house. Possibly over night; but it is more likely that it was to be a mid-day rest. And he made haste. If Zacchaeus had not been alert now, he would have failed of his only opportunity. And received him joyfully. He had obtained not only what he had hoped for, but a great deal more. And when they saw it, they all marvelled. The crowd of Jews. The action of Christ was most unpopular, and it required great courage to brave the almost universal national feeling. That he was gone to be great; a social visit, as with an equal. With a man that is a sinner, a disreputable outcast, a notorious sinner, Zacchaeus as a publican, would thus be termed, whatever his character had been.

CONSECRATION.—Vers. 8. And Zacchaeus stood: stood up before his family, and whatever guests were present. He would confess his reformation, and his intention to live a new life, before all. Behold,

Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor etc. Some consider this to mean that this was his habit. But it is much more probable that it states what he now determines to do with his property. Zacchaeus imposed upon himself the severe measure enjoined by the law concerning any one convicted of theft. 'It is written, he shall restore four sheep for a sheep,' but even this was exacted only of him who had made away with the property he had stolen. 'If the theft be found in his hand alive, he was only to restore double. Zacchaeus therefore judged himself most severely. Let us do likewise when we repent.

SALVATION.—Vers. 9, 10. This day is salvation come to this house. The publican was saved; saved from his past sins, saved from his sinful character, to a new, true, holy life. He had given two proofs that he was saved; (1) repentance, confession, and restitution; (2) devotion of his property to God and man. In all probability, with the Lord's express sanction, he continued in his occupation, in order that he might set an example to others of his class, showing them that a calling which does not involve the commission of sin is a lawful one, and may be pursued innocently and honestly. Forasmuch as he also is a son of Abraham. This expression was probably used with a reference to the sneers of Pharisees against publicans and sinners. Our Lord declares that however much the self-righteous Pharisee might despise Zacchaeus, he was a genuine son of Abraham, if any one was. He was one by natural descent. But better than that, he was a son of Abraham in a way the Pharisees were not. He walked in the steps of Abraham's faith and works. For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost: and therefore he went where the lost were.

PRACTICAL HINTS.
Where there is a will there is always a way. No one ever sought Christ sincerely who did not find him. Every man knows of places where he can put himself in the way of Christ,—as the house of God, the praying circle, the closet for secret prayer.

Courage is required in the service of God. Zacchaeus showed courage in his way of seeking Jesus; Jesus showed great courage in going to Zacchaeus' house, contrary to a strong popular opinion.

It is a great blessing to have Jesus abide in our homes. It is a sad thing for those who think themselves good to oppose the efforts to save the lost.

Out of great sinners Jesus can make saints. The proofs of Conversion are repentance, confession, restitution, and benevolence. Christ's coming to save the lost gives us all hope. We should, with him, seek after the lost and wandering ones.

Miss Hood's address, as given in the Message, was as follows:

"MADAM PRESIDENT.—When in the course of human events it becomes necessary to enlarge the 'Den' of a National President, the first work of the committee was 'to raise the roof.' We do not mean this in the parlance of the world, as your committee have, in no sense, committed such an offence. Knowing very well how of en now-a-days your mind and heart turn towards the South, we arranged so that the addition might be made upon this side. As we thought what the fittings of the room should be, we said oak, iron, and brick must enter into the construction; materials indicating strength, character, purpose, such as the platform of our W. C. T. U. is composed of—a platform which you have so largely built, so

strong and firm that now the whole world can rest thereon. We knew how you love light and warmth, and so we said there must be a fireplace, and when dark, cold, dreary days come, you could look into the depths of a glowing fire and be warmed thereby; just as out of the richness and warmth of your loving, generous nature you have shed gladness and brightness into the hearts of many, into lives where 'dark and dreary' days have come. The room must have light, an abundance of it, so these broad windows were made to let God's sunlight in, just as by your unceasing efforts you have let the light of a pure gospel come into many a darkened soul. The floor over which so many feet will pass must be of the sturdy oak, smooth and well polished, indicating the courtesy and gentleness which you have brought into our work—the polish of a true Christian woman. The decorations of the walls must be harmonious in tint and coloring, like those which you have blended and woven in your life work—a pure soul and a spotless name. The table must be broad and strong, for on it will lie many documents, some weighty and massive in character, with letters sent to near and dear ones. We place upon the table an electric bell which shall quickly summon your trusty secretaries to bear away important documents, and 'orders' which, when heard, will 'turn about face', many thousands of true and loving hearts who so willingly execute the commands of their loved commander.... In presenting you with the key of this 'Den', Madam President, we do so, having accomplished the work we set out to do some months ago. We regret greatly the 'generous donors' who have made the enlargement of this place possible might not have been with us this evening; their names will be given to you later on in bound form. Your committee have given service with willing feet, ready hands, and full loving hearts. We trust that this room will be a source of comfort and pleasure to you, and that your life may grow deeper and richer each day—your life-consecrated work more—out-reaching."
