

of the office. The taxes imposed by the Romans were farmed out to men, who, for a specified sum paid at once into the Roman treasury, obtained the right of collecting the taxes of a province or city. These prayer. contractors, who were usually Roman knights, entrusted the collection of taxes to sub-contractors or tax gatherers. It is probable that Zaccheus was a sub-contractor under the Roman knight. And he was rich. He had every opportunity to amass wealth.
