DEFEATED.—There has been an attempt to establish by law, a State Lottery in North Dakota. The bill was defeated. One of the most impassioned speeches against the evil proposal, was made by the Chief Justice of the State. He said:

"Who does not burn with indignation at the thought that the state is to gamble for a living? To deplore this vile scheme and yet decline to protest is to say that they would not have the chastity of the state debauched, but, if she must be prostituted, they would like to enjoy the fruits of her dishonor. I implore this people, in the name of love, for state and its honor, in the name of home, of wife and child and parent, in the name of everything that makes life worth living, that they cast off this foul reproach, resist this dastardly insult, stay the hand of the polluter and redeem the chastity of the state by such a voice of aroused indignation as will drive this moral leper from our domain."

All of which will apply with equal force against the license of the iniquitous rum trade.

LOTTERIES.—A newspaper in Maine says that the people of that state contribute about \$600,000 a year to the bank account of the Louisiana Lottery millionaires, and get back less than 5 per cent. of that sum in prizes. The amount which goes from New Brunswick to the same swindling concern is said to be quite large, this city contributing its full share. What fools they are who not only throw away their money, but demoralize themselves.

INFLUENZA.—The connection of cholera with influenza has been asserted and denied, but they appear to have the common feature of spreading by means of bacilli or microbes, which can be seen by the aid of the microscope. Two Vienna doctors claim to have discovered the influenza bacillus. They say they made the discovery while searching for the bacillus which causes kidney disease, and they took all possible precautions to prevent mistaking it for other bacilli. During the microscopic examination a microbe was discovered which was declared to be the cause of the influenza. It is claimed never to have been seen before by any bacteriologist. It bears no resemblance to the cholera microbe, but is very similar to that which causes pneumonia.

ICELANDIC EMIGRATION.—Rev. J. B. Jarnason, pastor of the Lutheran church (Icelandic) in Winnipeg, has just returned from a visit to Iceland. He went especially to secure ministers for the congregations of his countrymen settled in different parts of Canada. He expects a number will come soon to take charge of the work. He thinks, too, that a party of immigrants will arrive next year, to be followed by many more later. He found the people greatly interested in Canada, the question of emigration having become, during the past two years, the important issue of the day. The Icelandic newspapers published in Manitoba have a considerable circulation in the old country; and the information they publish, together with that conveyed by travellers, and that contained in letters written from here, have widely advertised this province in Iceland.

THE POPE'S GRIEF.—The grief of the pope over the death of his brother, Cardinal Pecci, is represented as pitiful to behold. He sits in his chair constantly rocking himself to and fro, and it is with difficulty that he can be persuaded to take any food. It was found necessary to give him an opiate to induce sleep. He insists that the relics of the apostles that he ordered sent to the cardinal to comfort his last moments shall be buried with him.

MORMONISM seems to be losing its grip even in Salt Lake City. A gentile was elected Mayor of the city, the other day, by a majority of over 800. The gentiles are, of course, jubilant, and the Mormons correspondingly depressed.

HAPPY LAND.—Iceland, with a population of 70,000 is entirely Protestant, and has no theatre, no police no prison, and not even a Justice of the Peace. Happy land!

REV. GEO. F. MILES (Baptist), of Amherst, was stricken with apoplexy a few days ago, and is not expected to recover.

FINE.—John, McCoy, the St. Mary's rumrunner, was last week fined \$50 and costs for violation of the C. T. Act. Jail is the place for him and his kind.

BIBLE SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of the Bible Society will be held tomorrow (Thursday) evening in the Temperance Hall.

ANGLIN.—Our New Brunswick readers will, perhaps, remember Mr. T. W. Anglin, for many years Editor of the *Freeman*, now defunct. Several years ago he found it necessary to leave the Province—was practically driven out. While here he showed himself the unrelenting hater of everything British. He now lives in Toronto. One of the Toronto papers referring to him as a pensioner of the Ontario Government, says:

"He seems to have been saddled upon Ontario for his maintenance and of course appears as usual in the public accounts. He is down this time for the nice little sum of \$1,974. Of course this is not as good as a Speaker's salary, with the illegal perquisite of farming out of some of the Government printing, but it is not bad for a shelved politician. The question is, Why should Ontario owe him a living?"

CAN IT BE TRUE?—The husband of Secretary Blaine's recently deceased daughter, Col. Coppinger, is a Roman Catholic. At the funeral service in a Catholic church, an account says:

"As the bearers entered the church with the casket, the people rose and remained standing until after the entire family had taken their seats. As Col. Coppinger, who is a member of the Roman Catholic church, entered the front pew, he, in accordance with the teachings of his faith, bent his knee and reverently crossed himself. Secretary and Mrs. Blaine, who seemed wholly overcome and bowed down with grief, followed with their family, and as members of the Presbyterian church, naturally omitted this observance. As they closely followed Col. Coppinger, this omission was quickly noticed by the dense mass of humanity which packed the right gallery, and was as promptly resented in a series of perfectly audible hisses. As may be imagined, such conduct has raised a perfect storm of feeling among those of the vast concourse of people who were present."

It would seem almost incredible that any people would so far forget themselves and what was due to the place of worship and the heart-broken parents, not to say anything of the spirit of christian tolerance or the civilities of decent society, as to hiss on such an occasion. Such brutality would not be expected even of half-civilized people.

DOMINION ALLIANCE.—The Executive Committee of the Dominion Prohibitory Alliance had a meeting in Ottawa on Thursday, at which it was decided that it was not expedient in the opinion of the legislative committee of the alliance to submit the question of prohibition to parliament during the present session. The merits and demerits of the Scott Act in comparison with prohibition were discussed, and the general opinion was that the act is not a failure, but that the failure to carry it out in many places, and its repeal had greatly hindered the work of prohibitionists.
