

PARLIAMENT.

Clarke Wallace moved the second reading of the Orange incorporation bill. He said the Orangemen asked incorporation as a right, not as a favor, and their bill was identical with that unanimously passed by the Independent Foresters last session. The house divided and the bill was read a second time on a vote of 85 to 69.

Answering Mr. Laurier, Sir John Macdonald said \$23,282 had been spent on the Harvey branch of the Short Line railway since last session.

Answering Mr. Kirk, Sir John Macdonald said if the weather was favorable the Oxford and New Glasgow railway would be finished about next July.

The debate on Laurier's motion to cancel the rebats of the corn duty now allowed distillers, was then resumed.

Sir John Macdonald said the government considered this as one of a series of motions affecting the fiscal policy and they, therefore, resisted this attempt at premature action on the subject. It was intended to bring down shortly a tariff measure of considerable importance and affecting considerable interests, and when this was submitted would be the proper time for tariff discussion.

Laurier's amendment was lost on a division of 69 to 104.

Charlton brought up the subject of the Hull riot and called on the government to take measures to preserve the freedom of speech.

Sir John Macdonald said the Dominion government had nothing to do with the matter, which was one solely for the provincial authorities.

Hon. Edward Blake sustained this view and said such action as Charlton's tended only to arouse passion and create trouble.

In answer to Mills, Sir John Macdonald said the government had no intention that the United States government were about to grant a further lease of Behring sea fisheries with provision for the exclusion of Canadian fishermen. Negotiations for the settlement of the dispute were progressing satisfactorily.

Fulton McCarthy moved the second reading of his anti French bill.

Davin moved an amendment referring the matter to the Northwest legislative assembly to be dealt with by order or enactment, after the next general election there.

Beausoliel moved an amendment to the amendment declaring it inadvisable to interfere with the Northwest act.

The debate was adjourned.

Rykert made an explanation of the Northwest timber limit matter, on which he had been questioned by Cartwright. Hon. Mackenzie Bowell and Sir John Macdonald strongly protested against the use that had been made of their names in this correspondence.

The debate on McCarthy's bill to prohibit the official use of the French language in the Northwest was continued.

From present appearances it is thought that Beausoliel's sub-amendment declaring that matters should be left in statu quo will be defeated, and that then one of the members from Quebec, will propose an amendment setting forth direct opposition to the bill.

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

There was a fire in Dr. McAllister's house, Queen St., this city, Friday morning. Sparks from a tobacco pipe are said to have caused it.

In Northumberland Co., where Mr. Tweedie seeks re-election on the acceptance of the office of Surveyor-General, Mr. Morrissey ex-M. P. P. has been nominated in opposition to him. The election takes place Thursday of this week.

Out of the ninety four deaths from various causes which occurred in St. John during January, forty-four resulted from diseases of the throat and lungs.

Mr. A. H. Vanwart has completed the housing of 1,500 tons of ice for the local trade.

It is estimated that the lumber cut on the St. John, the Aroostook and their tributaries, this year will be 150,000,000, which together with the lumber hung up last year will give 200,000,000. Of this latter quantity 125,000,000 is American cut, the remaining 75,000,000 provincial. This latter figure also includes the Quebec cut which comes down the St. John.

Ashe, who attempted suicide at Moncton a few days since continues to improve. He is fed through a tube.

A petition signed by a large number of the ratepayers of Grand Manan, has been forwarded to Ottawa praying the government for the improvement of the harbor on Grand Manan and the erection of a breakwater at Flagg's Cove.

At the January term of the Machias Me., court, Belle Taylor, of Fredericton, sister of Dr. Moore, ex-M. P. P. secured a divorce from her husband, Geo. M. Taylor. The court ordered that she have the custody of her child. The parties were married in Fredericton six years ago.

The residence of Capt. John W. Carter, at Middleton, Dorchester, was burned to the ground Monday night.

Among Moncton legislation which will probably be presented at the next session of the local legislature is a bill providing for the laying down of asphalt sidewalks through the town in place of wood, the property owners in front of whose places sidewalks may be built to contribute one-half.

A House at Kingston, Kent Co., owned and occupied by Mr. Jones as a store and dwelling, was destroyed by fire Sunday morning.

Campbellton has raised the liquor license fees from \$80 to \$100.

Herring are reported very plentiful at Beaver Harbor. The catch at present is about 1000 to a net.

Caleb and Bruce Davidson and Joseph McClean, the St. Martins burglars, were tried before Judge Waters. Bruce Davidson was sentenced to four years imprisonment in the Dorchester penitentiary, and Joseph McClean who helped to do the thieving, was sentenced to two years in the same institution. Caleb Davidson, who received the stolen goods, was sentenced to two years.

Protests have been entered against the return of the six St. John members, against Mr. Phinney and Mr. LeBlanc of Kent, and against Messrs. Stevens and Powell of Westmorland.

NOVA SCOTIA.

A correspondent writes. There has been considerable sickness in Kempt and Rockingham this winter. Poor chance for working in the woods. A sleighing, and very moderate weather. Work on the new bridge over Kempt river has been suspended until spring; the stone work is complete; it is to be built of iron, and will be a substantial structure.

The Nova Scotia legislature meets Thursday of this week.

At St. Margaret's Bay, Friday, a tree fell on a young man named Brown, killing him instantly.

The iron ore deposits at Bridgeville Colchester, N. S., are being rapidly opened. Shafts 75 feet deep have been opened and a drift of 150 feet long with a test shaft made. About 30 men are now employed.

Last week nineteen fine large salmon were captured at Mill Village, N. S., and were purchased on the spot at one dollar per pound for shipment to the American market.

The Cumb. Co. third or prohibition party have nominated R. L. Black and Thos. R. Black, the old members for the legislature.

A. W. Phinney, a Lawrencetown, N. S., justice of the peace, has been fined \$50 for selling liquor contrary to law. The New Star suggests that he should be relieved of the ornamental section of the alphabet (J. P.) which adorns his name.

A little son of Mrs. Elias Peck, of Kentville, while coasting on Friday last, met with a terrible accident, being literally scalped.

Last Saturday, Mr. Daniel Saulnier, of Salmon River, N. S., was drowned in Little Hope river, Digby Co.

Fifteen young boys are under arrest in Halifax for breaking into a schooner and robbing it of a quantity of rope which they sold at a junk store.

The Town Council of Springhill N. S., has imposed a tax of \$2 on every dog, and \$5 on every bitch.

The statement of the People's Bank of Halifax for the past year is the best for many years. It shows a net profit for the year of \$50,000, on a capital of \$600,000.

At the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association at Wolfville, it was stated that speculators had made \$50,000 profit on apples purchased in Annapolis valley last season, and that by ignorant and dishonest packing the fruit growers had only received three fifths of the actual value of their products and had lost \$200,000.

There is now in the Yarmouth custom house a parchment bound book which has been in daily use since March 21, 1840, but it is really older than that, having been manufactured by John Smith, binder to his majesty's stationery office, 49 Long Acre, London, before Queen Victoria came to the throne. It is used as an index of ships' registers and is in a good state of preservation.

Twenty-one vessels are laid up for the winter in the harbour of Louisbourg, C. B.

The Government will be petitioned for a grant of \$100,000 for deepening the river between New Glasgow and Pictou.

A young woman named Maggie Stevens, aged 23, who came to Halifax to consult Christian Scientists, went raving mad to-day and will have to be taken to the lunatic asylum.

Steamer Ulunda, which sailed from Halifax for London took 16,013 bushels of peas, 23,271 bushels of oats and 5,234 barrels of apples, besides a quantity of other cargo. The apples are valued at \$20,936 and oats and peas \$17,751.

The New Glasgow Board of Trade have decided to petition the government for \$100,000, for the purpose of deepening the river between here and Pictou.

The Canadian Pacific telegraph system will be immediately extended through the western counties of Nova Scotia.

Some 40,000 tons of iron ore are expected to be mined at Torbrook, Annapolis, the coming season and shipped by rail to the blast furnaces at Londonderry.

The Halifax Board of Health asks the city council to apply to the legislature for authority to borrow \$40,000 for the construction of sewers and the demolition of uninhabitable houses.

John Grant living at Musquodoboit, had a fierce encounter in his barn with a wild cat on Saturday. For five minutes he had a terrific battle with the beast. A man named Ruggles shot the cat while Grant held it by the throat. Grant was badly lacerated.

John Farnell and Sarah Farnell, who have been residents of Musquodoboit, N. S. for many years, and their seven children have been adjudged idiots. It is understood that steps are being taken to have the whole family placed in an institution.

A sensation was produced among the Nova Scotia fish merchants to-day upon the announcement of the failure of Woodruff & Co., well known New York fish and salt dealers. They were the largest New York handlers of Nova Scotia fish and did an immense business with Halifax, Lunenburg and Yarmouth merchants. One Halifax firm is reported to be a creditor for ten thousand dollars. The liabilities of the firm are placed at over half a million.

Some animal, supposed to be a wild cat, broke into a hen house in the western suburbs of Halifax last Saturday night and destroyed thirty-four out of a flock of forty fowls, most of them valuable thoroughbreds.

The lobster fishing season around the Southwestern coast of Nova Scotia is now in progress and good catches are being made. It is claimed, however, that the fishing grounds are being rapidly depleted owing to the catching of small lobsters.

Godfrey Peart, formerly of Guysboro, N. S. died at Gloucester, Mass. a few days since in apparent destitution, aged 75 years. A few hours before he died he told his attendants he had money secreted in an old house on the outskirts of the city. It was found, \$3,800.

The Acadia Powder Works at Waverly, Halifax, were on fire Friday night. The large bath house was destroyed and three men were terribly burned. The fire was kept from the powder mill with great difficulty.

Halifax society is mourning the sudden departure of its lion, Prince Dhuleep Singh, and Halifax merchants are mourning the loss of numerous accounts. The young prince lived in elegantly furnished apartments and spent money like a millionaire. Nearly all of his effects were purchased on credit and he borrowed money right and left.

OTHER PROVINCES.

The Attorney General of British Columbia has introduced a bill to provide for the establishment of a Juvenile Reformatory in that province.

An exchange tells of the death, at Nanaimo, B. C., of Alexander McIntosh, who was struck by a log while loading timber, and only lived 10 minutes. Deceased was a native of Pictou county, Nova Scotia, 19 years of age. He had only been in British Columbia a few months.

A recommendation that the vote and proceedings of the Manitoba Legislature be not longer printed in French was adopted.

No trace has been discovered of Arch. McLean, who disappeared mysteriously two or three weeks since from Summerside, P. E. I.

At Thameville, Ont., John Shaw, aged 40, was found by his father sitting in his barnyard dead. His head was severed from the body, evidently the result of falling while intoxicated under the wheel of his wagon.

Two long freight trains on the Canadian division of the Michigan Central collided in a deep cut near Cayuga, Ont., while going at the rate of 30 miles an hour. The engines and 25 of the foremost cars of the trains were completely destroyed and made a pile of debris higher than the banks of the cut. Forty other cars were more or less damaged.

Large quantities of opium and large numbers of Chinamen are being smuggled from Victoria, B. C., into the United States.

Toronto University was totally destroyed by fire Friday night. The loss is estimated at over \$500,000. Preparations had been made for the annual conversation at which 2,000 people were expected to be present, and it was just before the guests commenced to arrive at 7 o'clock that the fire broke out. The building is not supplied with enough gas jets so that on any special occasion it is necessary to light up with lamps. The lighted lamps fell and broke, the oil spread all over the stairs and down into the already heavily oiled floor. All the buildings were destroyed. The library worth \$100,000 the museum with its valuable documents of Dr. Wilson, president of the university, chemical apparatus, the mathematical instruments, furniture and utensils were all destroyed. The property was insured in 12 companies to the extent of \$164,000.

UNITED STATES.

Between 800 and 1,000 Indians credited to the Devil's lake agency, N. D. are reported wholly destitute of clothing and in the last stages of starvation. Unless furnished with food, clothing and medicine at once, these Indians will die like cattle.

At Norfolk, Va., six oyster boats, out in Saturday night's storm, are missing and it is believed they are lost, with twenty persons on board. Other boats were badly damaged.

The body of a man, supposed to be the missing Hiram Sawtelle has been found at East Lebanon, Me. His head was cut off and could not be found. Turning the body over a bullet dropped out of a hole in the back. The bullet had gone through the heart.

Thirteen business men of Helena, Montana, have been indicted for stealing coal from the Northern Pacific Railroad Company. The company claims to have lost 210 carloads there in one month.

Parliament re-assembled Tuesday. The Queen's speech opening the session was read by commission.

France has had a sensation. A paltry princeling, the Duke of Orleans, came into France, invaded the mighty republic with a carpet bag and possibly a revolver, and France is convulsed; for the Duke is a pretender to the French crown. How the Government met the emergency is not hard to tell—the young man was captured by the police and imprisoned.
