

## Religious News and Notes.

—Rev. A. B. Earl, the well known Evangelist, is over eighty years of age. —Moody has been holding services in Brooklyn.

There are in Mexico three Catholic archbishops and seventeen bishops. —Six young ladies from Canada have recently departed for China, in connection with the China Inland Mission.

—Seven Jews, on a recent Sabbath in London, made a public profession of their faith in Christ, and were baptized.

—In heathen countries, Protestants occupy 500 separate mission fields, containing 20,000 mission stations, supplied by 40,000 missionaries. In these mission stations there are 500,000 Sunday-school scholars—an average of 25 to each station.

—A hundred years ago the number of professing Christians of all the three great sections of the Christian Church, were less than 200,000,000, now they are over 430,000,000; and of this great increase in a hundred years, by far the larger share falls to the Protestant Church. While the Roman Catholic and Greek Churches only doubled their numbers, the Protestants multiplied nearly fourfold.

—At Carthage, Ill., a revival of unusual power has been in progress for some weeks. Among its results is the closing of the Opera House against strolling theatrical troupes, and the revival goes on apace without any theaters, saloons, or even public billiard tables in the city, so far as known, to divert the serious from the house of God, or to lead the young into evil courses, and prevent them from hearing the voice of the Spirit and the Bride.
