

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Jas. Rourke, M. P. P., of St. Martins, is about developing a rich deposit of manganese on property at St. Martins within easy reach of shipment.

The preliminary survey of the B. & M. railway extension from Buctouche to Richibucto has commenced with Mr. Hanington as chief engineer.

Says the Carleton Sentinel: Judging from letters that we have seen, there is good prospect for an early resumption of operations at the iron works, Upper Woodstock.

Says the Gleaser: Although all the looms of the Maryville cotton mill are in operation, the employees can scarcely keep up with the numerous orders that have been received at the office.

Mr. John Currier, of Ormococt, has received a telegram, from California, stating that his son, Daniel Currier, had been accidentally killed while working in the lumber woods there.

Seth Gesner, steward of the schooner M. L. Bonnell, was badly burned at Hillsboro on Tuesday. He had placed a pan of grease in the oven to render it for use on the masts and while attending to some work returned to find the stove red hot.

The man Rawdon, charged with poisoning cows at Canterbury, is out on bail, \$1000.

A meeting of the provincial board of health was held in this city, last week, Dr. Wm. Bayard in the chair. The other members present were Judge Watters, Judge Steadman, Dr. G. E. Couillard, and Dr. J. Z. Currie, the secretary.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Sydney, C. B., is to have electric street lights.

A gentleman from Weymouth says mackerel have again struck in and the bay is full of bluebonnet fishermen.

There is a serious outbreak of diphtheria in Halifax. The newspapers of that city report that in the first week of September seven new cases were reported, in the second week 30 cases, and for the third week 34 cases.

The Windsor Cotton Co. have empowered the directors to sell or enlarge the capital stock as they deem expedient.

The Yarmouth and Shelburne S. S. Co. are negotiating for a steamer to place on the route from Barrington towards Halifax.

Additional reports of damages by the freshet in Cumberland Co., N. S. Parties from Shinnicous and vicinity report the damage to bridges and mill property as serious.

The witness dominion prize in the Canada competition was won by Maud Saunders, of Annapolis, N. S. The prize was a \$500 piano.

Windsor, N. S. has several cases of diphtheria, which is also prevalent in Halifax.

In Nova Scotia recently, to test the grain and insect devouring propensities of the bluebird and English sparrow, boards containing the cocoons and larvae of codlin moths and with wheat screenings were placed out doors and the English sparrows came and devoured all the grain, but did not touch the insects.

Building operations are lively in Truro, fifty new residences going up, valued at \$70,000.

Desertions from the West Riding regiment at Halifax continue to be frequent.

A fatal accident happened at Cambridge station on the W. & A. railway Friday afternoon. Nathan Condon, belonging to Cambridge, was walking on the top of some apple barrels on the edge of the platform as the west-bound freight train from Halifax came along.

On the Annapolis and Digby Railway, everything is being done by the contractors to push the work along rapidly and the prospect is that the line will be opened this fall.

The first three weeks of September thirty-one deaths ascribed to diphtheria have been registered in Halifax.

The Governor General will arrive in Halifax about the 15th inst.

Silver is reported to have been discovered near Brookfield, Colchester county. It is said that a rich gold lead also exists near the same place, in connection with which, it is said a 100 stamp mill will be running in a year.

A discovery of silver and also of gold is reported from Pleasant Valley, Colchester. The find was made on the Hogan property near Short's lake.

The late freshet in Five Islands, Economy and Bass River did considerable damage. At the latter place there was quite a large washout at the western end of the bridge.

On Saturday Captains Smith, R. N. R. and Hunter delivered their decision in the Ulunda case. The captain's held that the stranding of the vessel was due to the extraordinary current which the captain of the Ulunda did not allow sufficiently for.

OTHER PROVINCES.

News has been received at Winnipeg, of the wreck of the steamer "Keewatin" on Lake Winnipeg. It is thought all on board perished. Three members of the Northwest police were lost.

The Ottawa fisheries department have advised that the salmon pack on the Fraser River, B. C. this season will be worth nearly a million and a half dollars.

There are 122 sheriffs, registrars, county attorneys and county clerks in Ontario whose salaries and fees average over \$4,000 each.

In Quebec a hundred thousand acres have been claimed by families of 12 or more children. The total number of people in these families is 15,000. Some of the families have 22 members.

The trial of J. R. Birchall, bogus farmer and stock raiser, for the murder of the young Englishman, F. C. Benwell, whom he had induced to come out to Canada to go into business with him (Birchall's motive being to swindle Col. Benwell, the murdered man's father), is going on at Woodstock, Ont.

UNITED STATES.

The high water has caused considerable damage in Acrostock waters, and more is expected to follow. About fifty feet of the mill dam owned by A. R. Gould across the Presque Isle stream at Presque Isle went out taking with it a portion of the bridge above and a part of the grist mill owned by Cox, Hayward & Purinton.

The banner orange-growing town in Southern California is Riverside, and it is perhaps the richest town in the country, if the average wealth is correctly estimated.

The populations of the four largest cities of the United States, as ascertained by the recent census, are as follows: New York 1,513,301; Chicago 1,098,576; Philadelphia 1,044,894; Brooklyn 804,374.

The next in order, St. Louis, comes a long way after Brooklyn, its figures being only 460,357. In 1880 there were only twenty-one cities with populations of more than 100,000; now there are thirty-two.

Reports have been received from Mullen, Idaho, that the settlers of that section have organized to wipe out the Nez Perce Indians, who for months past, have been burning towns, scalping peaceable persons and committing other atrocious crimes.

Boston has again been attacked by a plague of fleas. So numerous did the little pests become even in the most fashionable quarters that the Board of Health had to be called to fumigate houses.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

It is believed 500 lives were lost in the floods in the South of France.

A Friday despatch from Algiers says a cyclone swept over a large portion of Algeria, doing an immense amount of damage.

An infectious disease, believed to be the influenza, is prevalent in the southern portion of Berlin.

Last week, France was again visited by storms that in violence recalled those of a few weeks ago.

The department of state has received from the U. S. legation at Peking, China, a report relative to the recent heavy floods in that country. The report says that the floods were the most serious ever known.

New York advices from Granada, Nicaragua, under date of Sept. 21, say:—There have been ominous warnings of convulsions of nature going on under the surface of a portion of this country during the past several days.

Up to the present time 10,000 persons have left the city by the railroad trains alone, the government running the facilities will permit. In addition to that number two thousand have left by other means.

A judge had made a decision particularly galling to a young advocate, who had been arguing for an hour on the wrong side.

A woman in this State, in filling a census blank, put down her husband as a lunatic. She told the census enumerator that he was at present engaged in paying an election bet by pushing a wheelbarrow twenty-five miles, and she didn't expect him for a week.
