I hope very soon to write to the societies who sent the work. It will be a great pleasure to show Bessie's quilt to the little folks out here. Not a thing in the box was damaged in the least. It has been a long time since you heard from us, but people during holidays don't like to do much, and we have been having a vacation. Taking it altogether it was not a very pleasurable one, but I will tell you about it another time, we are at home now—the dear little home that seems doubly dear after our long absence. We are all fairly well and have the pleasant cold season ahead of us in which to get stronger.

Bessie is getting to be a big stout girl and Aurilla runs about and plays so nicely that I feel as if I had no baby. The teachers have come to see me since getting home and say that with one exception the work is getting on nicely. In that one school thieves have taken books, sewing and even the table, and the only two chairs there were. Again many, many thanks to those who sent those things to the Indian work in Christ's name and for His sake.

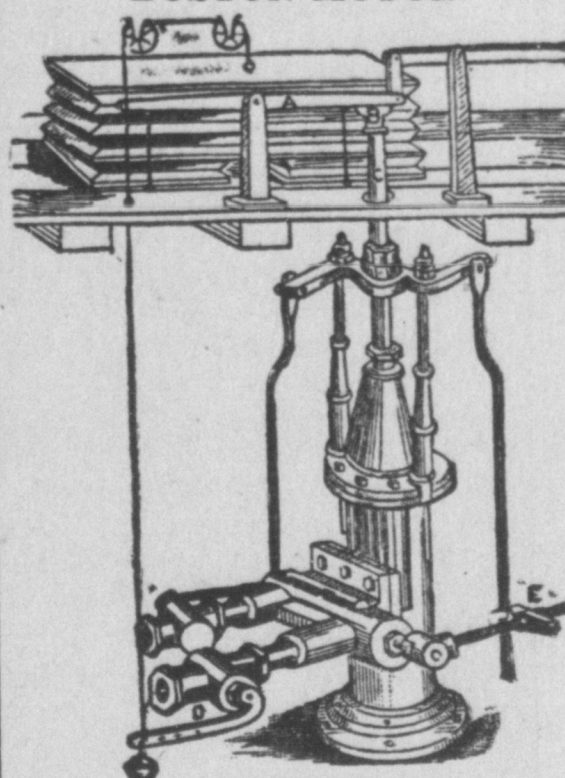
