NEW BRUNSWICK.

Thomas Allan, residing on the Houlton road, near Woodstock, had his barn, shed and all completely destroyed by fire Thursday morning, and the main part of the house badly damaged.

It is stated that the C. P. R., have virtually assumed control of the Canada Eastern, and that the meeting of the Canada Eastern Co., to be held in Gibson Tuesday evening, is for the purpose of formally handing the road over to the C. P. R.

The Bathurst Courier editorially states that it has reason to believe that a brutal murder has been committed at Bellefleur, and charges the local authorities with negligence in the interests of humanity and justice in not taking action in the matter, and allowing those implicated in the murder to escape.

Fire broke out Saturday night in the large two-story residence on King Street, Moncton, owned by J. & C. Harris and occupied by Mr. Wilson, manager of the cotton factory.

The prospects of the Seelye copper mine at St. George are said to be flattering. Capitalists from the United States have recently been examining the mine and are well pleased.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Laura, aged 12, adopted daughter of A. J. Hatfield, of Middleton, N. S., committed suicide by jumping into the Annapolis river there on Thursday.

As a team of six horses were ploughing out the streets in Portland, Maine, on Thursday, they came in contact with two crossed telephone and electric light wires and three of the horses were immediately prostrated and killed.

In Houlton, Dec. Saturday at the noon hour while Hershey and Shaw, lawyers at Houlton were at home to dinner, their office was entered and the drawer of the safe containing over \$100 in cash stolen.

While smoking in bed at No. 588 Parker street, Roxbury, James Simpson, seventy one years of age, set fire to the bed clothes. He was partially paralyzed so that he could not move, and he was burned to death.

Judge Elliot of Arkansas sentenced Charles Seward, for murder, to be hanged on Thursday Jan. 29. The judge said, he never had and never would sentence a man to be hanged Friday because on that day Jesus Christ was crucified, and he would not thus insult the memory of the founder of Christianity.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

There have been very severe snow storms throughout England this week, and traffic is blocked in many places.

A house in the native quarter of Bombay, containing 100 inmates, collapsed; 30 persons were killed and many injured.

At Escauffault colliery, Hainaut, Belgium, Wednesday, when 18 men in a cage were about to be lowered in to the pit, the rope connecting the cage with the drum broke and the men were precipitated to the bottom of the shaft and every one of the occupants of the cage were killed.

Seven Alpine chasers, who were working under command of an officer at a new fortress on the summit of Mount Scharah, between La Briga and Reviere, were swept, with their superior, by a sudden blast over the precipice into the terrible abyss. Five of the men and the officer fell a distance of 2,500 feet. The bodies were recovered in a frightfully mutilated condition. Two of the men managed to cling to some rocks and escaped death.

A Singer's Royal Guest. HOW MADAME ALBANI ENTERTAINS QUEEN VICTORIA AT AN INFORMAL TEA. Once every summer Queen Victoria drives over from her Balmoral Castle to the Scottish Highlands home of Madame Albani-Gye, the famous prima-donna, where the latter entertains her at an informal tea.

The December number of St. Nicholas has for frontispiece Rembrandt's portrait of himself. The portrait is referred to in Mrs. Dodge's account of Holland and its strange features. An important contribution is "The Story of the Golden Fleece," retold for American boys and girls with illustrations—this number containing the introduction only.

The roof of the blacksmith-shop of the Roanoke, Va., machine works fell in under a heavy weight of snow Wednesday. One man was killed and eight seriously injured. The damage to the building and machinery is estimated at \$100,000. The storm was the worst for years. Over two feet of snow has fallen.

Mr. Phair, the starch manufacturer of Presque Isle, says that the potato crop of this year in Aroostook county will realize \$2,000,000. Mr. Phair states that he has paid \$100,000 for starch this year.
