HOME MISSION REPORT.—To Rev. B. H. Nobles, Cor. Sec. of H. M. Executive; Dear Bro.—It is my duty to report to you my doings for the month of May. I went to Knowlesville on the 2nd inst, and commenced meetings on the 3rd. It was evident from the first meeting that the Spirit's presence was in our midst. Rev. E. B. Gray, pastor of the church, had held some meetings previously in which much blessing had been enjoyed and four were baptized. But the interest having somewhat waned he had closed the meetings and went to Gordonsville and engaged in special work there. I was much pleased to find him present with me on Sunday morning. He is esteemed highly, in love for his work sake, by these good people. Sunday afternoon the Rev. Mr. Giberson, preached the funeral sermon of Mr. Robt. Henderson's infant child. In the evening, Mr. Bayley (Methodist) preached, it being his regular appointment. Bro. Gray and I continued the meetings during the week, Bro. Bayley being present most of the time. The Lord's presence was manifested to convict and save souls. Sunday, the 10th, Bro. Gray baptized five more converts. Monday morning he went home. I continued the meetings. During the week the work progressed with deepening and widening power; many wanderers were reclaimed, some of whom confessed they had been away from father's house for twenty years; the unconverted generally became deeply interested and seriously impressed under the preaching of the word, and many of them were led to seek and find the pardon of sin. The work spread into the adjoining neighbourhood, especially into South Knowlesville and vicinity, until nearly all the unconverted were anxiously seeking salvation. Sunday, 24th, I baptized ten more, and on Friday 28th, I baptized one and Bro. Giberson eight, and the following day two more; these were persons belonging to families in connection with his church and congregation. Others are to follow next Sabbath. Some persons were converted who will find their home ultimately with other denominations. Bro. Gray and I baptized

twenty in connection with our church, and Bro. Giberson has baptized ten, and I have no doubt that he will baptize quite a large number more.

Knowlesville church has been greatly helped and largely reinforced, and, considering the small size of the place, a great work has been done.

I found a most comfortable home with Bro. Leonard A. Doucet, who, with his amiable wife, did all in their power to make me feel at home and enjoy myself, which I did. In fact, I found all the people very kind and liberal. When at South Knowlesville, I enjoyed myself in the hospitable home of Bro. J. Wesley Lawson. I shall not soon forget the kindness of this good brother and his wife. I have worked very hard, and am now home resting for a few days. I shall start for Upper Brighton on Thursday next and shall (D. V.) preach there on Sunday 7th of June morning and evening, and shall continue special services there as the Lord may lead. The kind friends at Knowlesville and vicinity contributed for my support the sum of \$52.81. May God abundantly bless this dear people.

C. T. ACT NOTES.—On Tuesday, last week, F. B. Coleman, of the Barker House, and Geo. Howard were charged before the Police Magistrate with violating the C. T. Act. Mr. J. A. Vanwart appeared for both of them, and pleaded "not guilty." Mr. McCready conducted the prosecution. When the witnesses in the Coleman case were called they did not appear. The case was adjourned to give time to serve the witnesses with warrants.

In the Howard case adjournment was asked for on the ground that he had been ill for some weeks and was unable to have the case go on. The plea served the purpose of delay, notwithstanding the fact that cases often, indeed almost invariably, go on without the presence of the accused, and notwithstanding the other fact that Howard had been about the streets and at his shop for days before the trial was called, and has been out regularly since.

On Friday the Coleman case came up again. One witness swore that he and others had bought liquor at the Barker House. The other witnesses were called, but were absent as before, and the case was again adjourned.

Charlotte County is to vote on the question of the repeal of the C. T. Act. The St. Andrew's Beacon thinks the voting will be in the latter part of June or early in July. Of course the rum men of the County will do their worst to repeal the law, and will be helped by their fellows in other parts of the Province and probably elsewhere. The duty of the temperance people of the County is plain—they should make a determined effort to defeat the purpose of the rum party. If the work is gone about systematically and done thoroughly we believe a decisive defeat await those who would establish rum-selling by law in the county.

The Beacon tells the people of Charlotte that this is the last time the Act can be questioned. We are not aware that there is any such provision in the law.

Four cases of violation of the law were before the Police Magistrate on Friday. The charges were against the Wilber, Dugan, Watson and Boyer, all hotel men. They were adjourned to get more evidence.

THE UNIVERSITY.—The enclosure of the University took place on Thursday. There was the usual large attendance. Governor Tilley presented the Douglas medal to Mr. Yorton the winner.

The winners of medals were announced, and presentations made as follows: Douglas medal, to Mr. Yorton; Stanley gold medal to Mr. Walker; the Stanley silver medal to Mr. Dickerson, Alumni medal to Mr. Walker; a prize of books to Miss Henry; the Hazen prize (\$40.00) to Miss Shaw; the microscope to Mr. Stead. Honour certificates, also, were given a number of students in all the classes.

The graduating class numbered ten, each receiving the degree of B. A. They are—Miss B. Henry and Messrs W. Anderson, N. W. Brown, A. G. Harrison, E. B. Jack, H. F. McLeod, D. L. Mitchell, W. B. Mowatt, H. Peppers and L. L. Street.

Prof. Hyde made a short address to the graduating class.

The degree of M. A. was conferred on Rev. W. O. Raymond, G. W. Mersereau and E. W. McCready.

The valedictory on behalf of the graduating class was delivered by Mr. E. B. Jack. The address on behalf of the Alumni was delivered by Mr. Phillip Cox A. M., and Dr. Bailey's address in praise of the founders of the institution was, in the absence of Dr. Bailey, read by Prof. Duff.

Dr. Harrison announced that the Senate had appointed Mr. W. K. Hatt to the chair of engineering made vacant by the resignation of Prof. Strong; he also announced that the Senate had voted \$1000 for the purchase of electrical apparatus.

THE PREMIER.—Sir John A. Macdonald is quite ill. Soon after the opening of the session, he was not well, but was able to attend Cabinet meetings, and was absent from his place in the House only a few days. Last week he had a relapse. About the middle of the week it was reported that he was seriously ill, even dying. Thursday the physicians in attendance issued a bulletin which said that he had suffered from a return of physical and nervous prostration, and that they had enjoined complete rest for the present, and entire freedom from public business. Friday evening he grew worse, and became speechless, though retaining consciousness. The doctors announced his condition critical, and late in the evening Sir Hector Langevin, having come from an interview with the physicians, stated to the house that the Premier was dying and asked an adjournment. It was then believed that he would not live till morning; and during Saturday morning it was announced here and in many parts of the Dominion that he was dead. But at this writing (Monday) he is still alive, and some are clinging to the hope that he will rally, though the doctors in attendance hold out no hope. It would be most extraordinary for a man of his years to recover from such an attack.

The feeling caused by the near approach of the death of the Premier is intense. Not only his political friends, but those also who have always been strong political opponents feel that in his death the country will suffer a great loss; and they speak freely of his great abilities, and tenderly of his always genial and kindly ways with men—friends and foes alike.

The question of the effect of his death on the Government and the party he leads is, of course, being freely discussed. The death of the Premier dissolves the Government. The Governor General will then call upon such other member as ministers suggest to form a new Cabinet. Whether the gentlemen now holding portfolios would in the event of retaining positions in the government, have to go to their constituencies for re-election seems to be, as yet, an unsettled point. And who will be called upon to form a new government is yet a matter of conjecture. Should the Premier die Parliament will likely adjourn for a time to permit the formation of a government, and the election of such members of it, if any, as need to go to the people for election.

The great anxiety felt about the condition of the Premier may be judged by the telegrams that have poured into Ottawa almost every hour of the day and night, expressing sympathy and eagerly inquiring for the latest news of his condition. From Her Majesty as well as from the humblest subjects have come anxious messages.

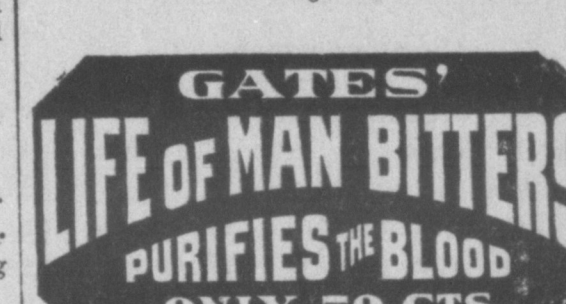
