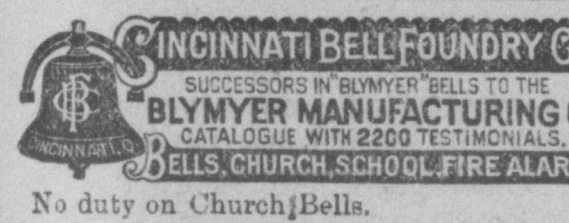

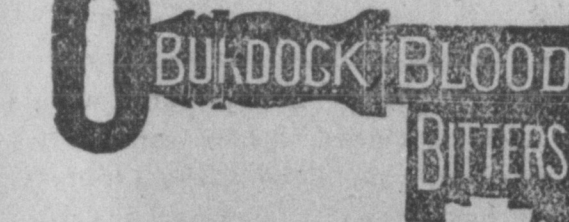

The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Third Quarter—Lesson VI.—August 9.

CHRIST'S AUTHORITY.

John 5: 17-30.

GOLDEN TEXT.—All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth.—Matt. 28: 18.

JESUS WORKING LIKE THE FATHER.

—Vers. 17, 18. He does exactly what God does, and therefore has God's authority for what he does.

But Jesus answered them. Answered the charges implied in ver. 16, that he had broken the Sabbath law. My Father worketh hitherto.

Jesus was justified in healing and helping an afflicted man on the Sabbath. It was Sabbath work, and according to the fourth commandment. And I work. I do exactly according to his precept and with the same purpose. Therefore the Jews sought the more to kill him.

They could have no peace so long as such a man lived. Because he not only had broken the Sabbath. Not, broke the law in any particular case, but was annulling the law of Sabbath observance. He did not what they supposed to be essential to the preservation of the day, but what was really destroying it. But said that God was his (own) Father. His Father in the highest peculiar sense. Making himself equal with God. On an equality with God. They saw that he claimed the power of determining the law of the Sabbath, thus placing his action on the same level with the action of God.

JESUS WORKING WITH THE FATHER.

—Ver. 19. Then Jesus answered. The Son can do nothing of himself. Such is the union between the Father and the Son that it is impossible for any act of the Son to spring from self, irrespective of the Father's will. Their will and their working are one. But what he seeth the Father do &c. The Son of God can perform no act which differs in character from the action of the Father. What he seeth the Father do is a figurative term, showing the inseparable communion of will, wisdom, and power between the Son and the Father. For what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son likewise (in like manner). It is the very nature of the Son to do whatever the Father doeth. The Son does the same things, with the same power, in the same manner.

JESUS POSSESSED OF DIVINE KNOWLEDGE.—Ver. 20. And sheweth him all things. The Father conceals nothing from the Son. From apostles, prophets, and philosophers no small part of the doings of God are concealed. From the Son nothing is. And he will shew him. The knowledge the Son possessed of the Father was progressive. Greater works than these. The Jews opened their eyes wide at the healing of an impotent man. What will a Pentecost do, and a resurrection from the dead! That ye may marvel. Addressed to those who questioned his authority.

JESUS GIVING SPIRITUAL LIFE.—Vers. 21-26. Jesus has just been speaking of works greater than his actual miracles, which he shall one day accomplish. He now explains what those works are: the resurrection and the judgment of humanity. For as the Father raiseth up the dead. Including both a physical and a spiritual resurrection and gift of life. And quickeneth. Maketh alive. Even so the Son quickeneth. Maketh alive. It is in his own power. For the Father judgeth no man. Rather, for not even doth the Father. To whom the work of judging primarily and essentially belongs. Judge any man, i. e., directly. But (he) hath committed (given) all judgment unto the Son. Because the work of quickening with which also he has been entrusted requires such work of judging. That all men should honor the Son, even as they honor the Father, etc. For they are one God. All honor and worship of the Son is honor and worship of the Father. The more we love Christ, the more we love God. He that heareth. Each individual decides for himself whether he will hear and believe. Believeth on him that sent me. He that trusts in God, and shows it by receiving into his heart the message he has sent by Jesus Christ, hath, not merely shall have, but has now, everlasting life. It is more than mere endless existence. It implies blessedness, fulness, joy, glad activity. Shall not come into condemnation. Revised Version, judgment. That judgment which issues in condemnation and punishment. But is passed from death. The realm of sin and death. Unto life. Has come into the condition of eternal life. The hour is coming. It is drawing near; is sure to come. And now is. Has already begun. When the dead. The spiritually dead. Shall hear the voice of the Son of God. Who has power to make himself heard. And they that hear. They that hear and recognize the voice of the Son of God, and turn a willing ear and heart to him. Shall live. Shall become alive. Shall have eternal life. For. Giving the reason why he could promise this. As the Father hath life in himself. Is the original source and creator of life. To the Son to have life in himself. He, too, as the Messiah, is a source and creator of life.

JESUS THE JUDGE OF THE WORLD.—Ver. 27. And hath given him authority to execute judgment. All men are to be judged by Christ. His character and teachings are to be the test. His very presence in the world is a judgment. Because he is the Son of man. A son of man. He is a son of man, a representative man. One who has a feeling for our infirmities, and was "in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin."

JESUS THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE.—Vers. 28-30. Marvel not at this. Do not think that this is too hard to believe. All that are in the graves. Referring to the physical resurrection. Shall hear his voice. A voice like the sound of a trumpet. Unto the resurrection of life. A resurrection which brings perfect life, or eternal and blessed fellowship with God. The resurrection of damnation. A judgment that issues in condemnation. And my judgment is just; because I seek not mine own will. Jesus Christ, through his perfect communion with God, was absolutely above the influence of human fear or favor.

PRACTICAL HINTS

The best of deeds may be misunderstood and misinterpreted.

The example of Jesus is the best interpreter of the way God would have us keep the Sabbath, in the fourth commandment. Jesus worked miracles of mercy on the Sabbath. It is lawful to do good on the Sabbath. But Jesus did not abrogate the Sabbath nor the fourth commandment. The Sabbath is to be kept as made for man, his body and his soul; not either one alone. Fill the Sabbath with worship, devotion, spiritual life, and culture.

Jesus gives us spiritual life,—the life of Pentecost, the life of heaven.

Our best and most loving friend will be our judge; and if he condemns us there is no hope.

The way to these high and spiritual blessings is through faith and obedience.

Mrs. Leavitt's Speech.

Mrs. Mary Clement Leavitt has in eight years, completed her tour of the world in the interests of temperance, as a W. C. T. U. worker. This most remarkable journey marks an epoch in the temperance cause in many lands. During her absence, Mrs. Leavitt has held over 1,600 meetings in China, Japan, India, northern and southern Europe, Egypt, Australia, the Hawaiian Islands, talking in forty-seven different languages, to do which she has employed 231 interpreters. She says, as reported in the Boston Globe: "Among the most remarkable circumstances of my trip, nothing, I think, was more interesting and remarkable than my traveling alone and unprotected, as I did from San Francisco to Boston, among the coolie class of Japan, China, among the Zulus, the Malagassy of Madagascar, the natives of Sierra Leone, and the Hindoos, where, without exception, I was treated as kindly as if I had been their mother, and as respectfully as if I had been their queen." In Japan some of the officials said: "Mrs. Leavitt, your mission here is doing for Japanese women what Commodore Perry did for the country."

Without in any way undervaluing her specific temperance labors, Mrs. Leavitt says: "The greatest value of my years of work lies in the impetus the labors of a woman have given to development among women in remote places."

The Boston Journal devotes a column to the prominent facts of her wonderful journey. Summarized they are: One month spent in the Sandwich Islands during which such an impetus was given to temperance work that it has gone on grandly ever since; sixteen months in the Australian colonies where she organized eleven societies in New Zealand, five in Queensland, one in New South Wales, one in South Australia, and three in Tasmania. Japan comes next and there the work has been most wonderful; four and a half months were devoted to it, then on to China, then to Siam with its visit to the king; crossed the straits of Johore, and visited the Sultan of Johore, who had her conversation with him translated and published in the official paper which reaches all his people. At Rangoon, Burma, she formed a union which she considers—thanks to the efficiency of Miss Ruth Ranney, its president—one of the strongest in Asiatic countries. Ten months were spent in Hindostan, and most parts of British India visited. In Madagascar she made that wonderful journey

an hundred miles inland to visit the queen, and formed a union at her capital. The summer of 1889 was spent in Europe, most of it in the British Isles where she spoke an hundred times. In November of that year she started for the Congo. She says:

"The drink curse on the Congo and on the West coast of Africa is beyond imagination. The traders of all nations are sending liquor there, and are actually forcing it upon the natives, against their will in many instances. Almost all the liquor is Medford rum from Massachusetts, transported in vessels sent out by the people who make the rum. The American trade has fallen off this last year because of German competition. The German rum is made of potatoes, and is the cheapest and vilest stuff."

"The European countries in general constitute the hardest field for temperance work in the world, because almost every individual there drinks moderately. But a much larger number drink it immoderately than Americans traveling there do not look abroad at the right hours. If they would watch the streets between 11 P. M. and 2 A. M. they would discover how much drinking was going on. There is not nearly so much sentiment in favor of total abstinence in European countries as I had supposed. By temperance societies here we understand total abstinence societies but it is not so there. But, on the whole, I think there is a very steady advance in temperance sentiment among English speaking peoples, and a much greater advance among the religious than among the irreligious peoples."

NOTES OF THE WORK.

The wives of the archbishop of Canterbury, the archbishop of York, and the lady principals of Girton and Newham Colleges, signed the declaration in favor of woman suffrage in the *Fortnightly Review*.

There is rejoicing among the friends of temperance in the fact that they number an English Duchess among their ranks. The new Duchess of Bedford, hitherto the Marchioness of Tavistock, is, like her sister, Lady Henry Somerset, a strict teetotaler. Other lady members of the English nobility who have enlisted in the cause of temperance, are the Countess of Carlisle and the Countess of Ellesmere.

In response to many inquiries as to how the World's Petition is to be prepared for presentation, we are requested to say: The Petition with all the signatures received, will be pasted upon white muslin, one-half yard wide, and bound on one side with red tape and on the other with blue; the whole when presented, to be tied with white ribbon, since red, white and blue are colors in the flags of almost all nations.

The first petition for prohibition in this country came from Passaconaway, Chief of the Penacooks, who lived on the Merrimack. He was a sagacious ruler, and seeing the demoralizing effect of drink upon his three thousand braves, he sought the English Government not to sell them fire-water. In 1668 an English "trucking-house" was opened among the Penacooks, and the "drunken Indian" became so numerous that a delegation of chiefs journeyed to Piscataqua to enter their protest in person against the sale of spirituous liquors to their tribe.

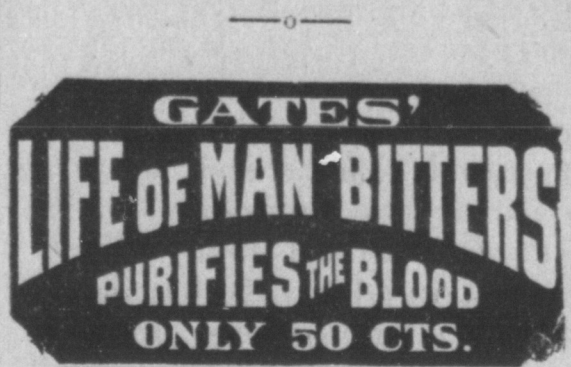
