

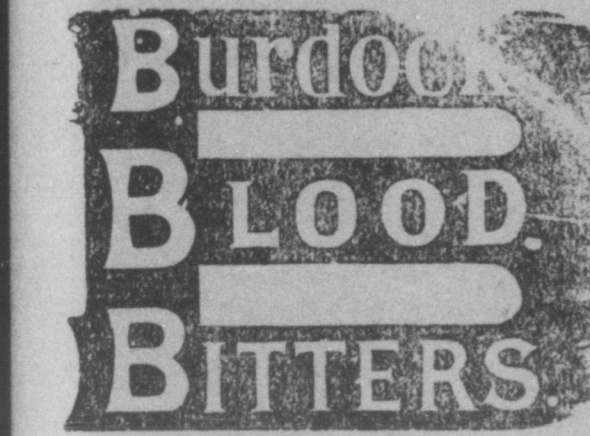
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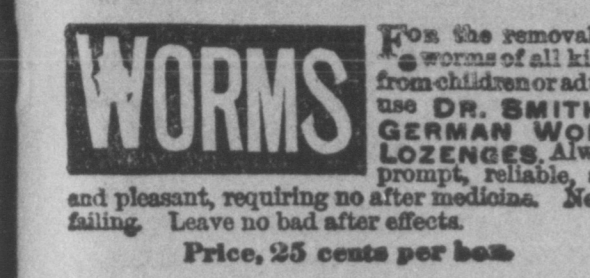

The Sabbath-School. INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

First Quarter-Lesson I. - January 3. THE KINGDOM OF CHRIST. - Isa. 11: 1-10.

GOLDEN TEXT.—He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth.—Pa. 72: 8.

THE PROMISED MESSIAH AND HIS TIMES. HIS ORIGIN.—Ver. 1. And there shall come forth a rod (a new shoot) out of the stem (the stock or stump left when the tree has been cut down) of Jesse (the family of David, from whom the Messiah should spring).

His CHARACTER.—Vers. 2, 3. Describing the figure, the prophet proceeds to describe the character of the Messiah. He is to be David and Solomon in one, equally great in knowledge and in practice. The Spirit of the Lord is more than the spiritual gifts bestowed by him.

His GOVERNMENT.—Vers 3, 5. He shall not judge after the sight of his eyes, etc. He is not misled by outward appearances or popular opinions. With righteousness shall he judge the poor, the weak, the helpless, who have no means of commending themselves to the eye.

THE PEACE AND PROSPERITY OF HIS REIGN.—Vers. 5, 9. We now have a vision of the golden age, which shall be the result of the Messiah's kingdom when it has fully come; but which began when he first appeared and the angels sang "Peace on earth good will to men."

day (which he saw in his far-off vision) there shall be a root of Jesse: that is the plant springing from the root. There is a special reason for the phrase here; it emphasizes the contrast between the outwardly mean origin and the ultimate greatness of the Messiah. So in Rev. 22: 16 the Messiah says, "I am the root, even the offspring of David."

THE MISSIONARY CHARACTER OF THE RELIGION OF CHRIST IS HERE REVEALED. The blessings God bestows upon his people are not for themselves alone, but are a means of drawing other nations. The civilization which is the fruit of Christ's gospel is one of the attractions which draw men to him.

OUR MOTTO.—If God be for us, who can be against us. It seems fitting that we should close this limited report of the great convention with some extracts from Lady Somerset's sermon, as preached in Tremont Temple. We give the report of the Sunday services as taken from the Boston Traveller.

There was a large audience at Tremont Temple on Sunday afternoon to listen to the annual sermon of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, preached by Lady Henry Somerset.

THE MEETING OPENED AT 2.30 WITH prayer, followed by singing, scripture reading, and a short testimonial meeting. The regular service began with singing "The Lord is My Shepherd," by a quartette. Rev. D. Lorimer then made an appeal for contributions for the poor's Thanksgiving. Mrs. H. W. Smith of London then read from the 12th chapter of Hebrews, and Mrs. Harris sang "Just As I Am."

Then Mrs. N. W. Kinney spoke shortly, and was followed by Lady Somerset, who gave as her text, Hebrews xii. 24-28: "By faith, Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the pleasures of God than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasure of Egypt, for he had respect unto the recompense of the reward. By faith he forsook Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king, for he endured as seeing him who is invisible." She said:

If I were asked to summarize that which I believe condenses the whole secret of every great leader's history, I should go straight to these words, for in them I find the whole inspiration of every life that has been called to lead humanity—self-sacrifice, suffering and pain. Right through the ages this principle has come down to us, even from the time when it was breathed in the old legend, which tells how Curtius leaped into the dark chasm, which closed on the flashing form of horse and rider, and we realize that the divine in the human heart, struggling in the twilight of the world, had grasped, as it must always grasp—as it did when Fr. Damien went to the leper island—the sublime, God-given principle that one must die—for the people.

When the great light of the beacon fire of Calvary illuminated that black darkness around, it seemed for a time but to kindle the flames of the faggots on which the martyrs died; but that light lit the great

beaten world of Rome, and dispelled the darkness of degrading mythology, until the temples of Jupiter and Venus rung out with glorious "Te Deums" in the worship of Jesus Christ.

SELF SACRIFICE. No cause was ever victorious against evil for which men and women have not lived and suffered and died, and the secret of true power for sacrifice has been that they dared to look beyond the paltry, visible surroundings of that cause.

Standing on American soil, the truth that no great moral revolution has ever been effected that has not been watered by the blood of martyrs, has been intensely present. The freedom of thousands to-day is sealed by the white tombstones in Arlington Park, where lie the bodies of those who endured because they saw right on through the battle smoke the glory of the eternal freedom of mankind; they heard right above the cannon's roar the glorious shout of the angels in heaven, when Christianity should triumphantly break the fetters that bound men and women for whom Christ died.

WHEN FIRST THE WOMEN OF AMERICA felt the stirring of the spirit to the refined seclusion of their homes to go out into the saloons, in the crusade which was the very heart of the temperance movement in this land, they went because ringing in their ears was the sound which runs through the middle ages, "Deus Vult." They rose because they could not help themselves; God called, and they heard his voice.

They were to go forth, not to liberate an earthly resting place, but the dwelling place of the most high God—the immortal souls who were in the bonds of sin and darkness. They deliberately, calmly, yet with divine enthusiasm, chose to suffer affliction with the people of God; and the mighty work born of that moment's choice stretches to-day from the Atlantic to the Pacific. N.Y., more than that, it girds the great round world.
