INSANITY INCREASING. The Secretary of the Iowa State Board of Health reports that in the state there is an alarming increase of insanity, especially among the people in the rural sections the number of the insane has increased from 1529 in 1889 to 1940 in 1890.

MONTREAL.—The Methodist District Meeting of Montreal has just passed this resolution:

Resolved, that we, the ministers and laymen in district meeting assembled, recognizing the growing immorality of this city by reason of Sabbath desecration, the increase of drinking dens, licensed and unlicensed, the tolerance of lotteries and other gambling devices, the want of vigor in police administration as seen in the assaults on unprotected women and children and the infamous attacks upon the Salvation Army, pledge our moral and active support to those aldermen who are endeavoring to close the resorts of Sabbath desecration, notably so Homer Park, and conserve the moralities of our city.

THE Y. M. C. A.—A meeting of the Directors of the Fredericton Y. M. C. A. was held last week. Hon. A. F. Randolph presided and Chas. A. Sampson acted as Secretary.

After prayer by Mr. Wm. Kinghorn, the chairman read the constitution governing the Association and a draft copy of bye laws.

Hon. A. F. Randolph, chairman Board School Trustees, tendered the use of the Board Room to directors until permanent quarters are obtained. The directors accepted the generous offer with thanks.

The members had under consideration the selection of a suitable building in which a gymnasium could be provided, but nothing definite was determined upon.

It was decided to hold regular meetings of the Board on the second Monday in each month.—Reporter.

CHATAQUA.—The circulars for the Summer Session of the Chataqua College of Liberal Arts and the Schools of Sacred Literature have just been issued. The list of instructors in both departments is larger and better than in previous years. The College offers 51 distinct courses in the various subjects taught in colleges of a high grade, and the Schools of Sacred Literature offer about as many more on Biblical subjects. On the faculty are found such men as Prof. Herbert B. Adams and Richard T. Ely of Johns Hopkins University, George S. Burroughs of Amherst, William Henry Green of Princeton, William R. Harper and Thomas L. Seymour of Yale, Martin L. D'Ooge of the University of Michigan, Bishop John H. Vincent and Ir. Jessie L. Hurlbut. It is intended that the students by concentrated effort, shall be able to accomplish as much in the six weeks session of the College as is usually accomplished in a term in college. The work outlined for the schools of Sacred Literature include courses in the Bible in English, Hebrew, Greek, and the Ancient Versions; in Biblical Literature, History, and Theology; and in the Hebrew, Assyrian, Arabic, Syriac and New Testament Greek Languages. The various courses are adapted to the needs of all classes. College students, members of young people's societies, teachers and Bible club leaders, general students of the English Bible and those who are acquainted with, or wish to study the Bible in the original, are classified in such a way that they may all study intelligently and profitably. The class lectures of Prof. Harper on the Early History and Traditions of the Hebrews, and those of Prof. Green on the Mosaic Authorship of the Pentateuch, are two of the most attractive features of the Schools.

THE COLLECTIONS.—Here is a novel piece of information from the treasurer of the Union Temple Baptist Church (Tremont Temple), Boston: The receipts from the collector for the past year included \$9,680 in coin, of which \$5,433 was silver, and the balance made up of 131,500 "coppers," 58,640 "nickles," the whole weighing 1,825 pounds, a weekly average of 35 lbs.
