Parliament.

The West India steamship subsidy estimate was taken up. Mr. Mills asserted that Mr. Foster tried at the beginning to get Furness and his tender out of the way. Mr. Foster suggested that Mr. Mills quote that part of the correspondence which supported this view. Mr. Mills declined the proposition and went on to say that Mr. Foster declined Joseph Woods' offer to furnish a ship of seven hundred tons for the services and afterwards accepted Pickford & Black's steamer Alpha, which was no larger. Mr. Foster at this point informed Mr. Mills that he had things mixed. The Alpha was on a different route. The finance minister congratulated Mr. Mills on the fact that he had not ventured to repeat the allegations made by him in an insinuating way the other night, that Mr. Foster had acted corruptly in the West India matter. In respect to that matter, Mr. Foster used some very plain language. The member for Bothwell, said Hon. Mr. Foster, has any one of three courses before him—as a man, a gentleman, and a member of parliament. First, he can consider my contradiction satisfactory. Second, he can make his charge in this house and ask for a tribunal which I promise him he can have whenever he wants it. Thirdly, if he is man enough to say outside of the house what he has said and insinuated here, sheltering himself under the privileges of the house, to assert them publicly or in any of his organs over his own signature, though he is a professor in a law school and has theoretical knowledge, I will give him a taste of practical law. Mr. Foster next showed by the correspondence in the hands of Mr. Mills that he had not tried to get rid of Mr. Furness, but was most anxious to deal with him. "Will he state now that I wanted to get rid of Mr. Furness? I say that if he does say so he states what is false." The minister of finance was equally severe in dealing with Mr. Mills' statement that his (Foster's) arrangement for a smaller vessel than 1,000 tons was made on his own responsibility and in violation of the law. The facts shown by the orders of council were that he (Foster) was acting on the authority of and in co-operation with his colleagues, and in accordance with law. Mr. Foster produced checks for every payment for every service, and declared that every dollar had been paid as represented, and that every other allegation would be shown to be false if Mr. Mills cared to formulate his charges and summon the parties here to give evidence.

Sir John Thompson moved the third reading of the Dominion Elections bill. This bill is made up of half a dozen bills brought in by members of both parties. Mr. Barron moved that a clause be added providing that returning officers be punished by fine or imprisonment in cases were ballot boxes or ballots were tampered with, unless it could be proved that the offence had been committed without the officer's connivance.

The discussion occupied the whole afternoon and covered a wide range. The amendment was declared lost. Several other amendments shared the same fate.

News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Benj. Shane, a farmer at Greenock settlement, drove to St. Stephen Saturday, and while leaving a store was taken suddenly ill and fell to the sidewalk. He died at midnight.

A barn at Millstream, Kings county, occupied by Henry Hayes was destroyed by fire last week. The contents were burned. Supposed to be incendiary.

At Zealand Station, Douglas, a few nights ago, D. Jewett was awakened by the noise of two men attempting to enter his store. On going out to investigate he was seized thrown to the ground, his pockets were gone through. His shouts brought some neighbors to his rescue, and the men ran away. They were in soldiers' uniform.

A young lad named Thos. McKenna, of Morrison's Mills, had his hand cut off while working at a trimmer at the mill Wednesday morning.

The English farmer delegates are expected in this Province this week. Mr. W. H. Boyce, of Fredericton, has been selected to show the delegates over the river counties. By instruction of the local government the secretary for agriculture has communicated with the officers of the agricultural societies, asking them to give the delegates all possible information.

A row occurred at Cocagne, Kent Co., Wednesday evening, in which two men named Johnson and Carroll were severely stabbed. About twenty-five men participated in the row. The wounded men were brought to Shediac. Both were stabbed about the breast. The doctor does not fear any serious results. Both men belong to Smith's mills, near Cocagne.

York Municipal elections, Tuesday Oct. 6th.

Mary Sullivan, an inmate of the Mater Misericordiae Hospital St. John, while insane, threw herself from a third story window of the building and received injuries which caused her death an hour later.

The Woodstock Creamery has an order from Jamaica for butter.

The house of Ira C. Hicks, near Moncton was destroyed by fire with most of its contents. Insurance \$700.

The Kent election resulted in the return of Legere by a majority of 778 over Goggin. Mr. Legere was the government candidate.

Rafting was finished at the Douglas boom a week ago. More lumber has been rafted at this boom this season than in any previous year.

Hoegg's canning factory has about one hundred hands employed in its various departments.

Men are being hired for the lumber woods, wages ranging from \$16 to \$20 per month. Kilburn, Linch, Welsh, Connors, Dicky, D. and W. Richards, Hazelton and others have started crews.

At Red Rapids, Tobique, a little girl of four years, daughter of Wm. Perry, was burned to death on Tuesday of last week. While her mother was in the garden, the child's clothes took fire, and she was burned so severely that she died in three hours.

Constable Herbert Pride was stabbed by Walter Scott at a picnic at Fredericton Junction, Wednesday. Scott was drunk and making a disturbance, and Pride arrested him. The injuries are not dangerous.

The season's cut at the Marysville mills has been a great one. More deals, laths and shingles have been shipped than ever before.

Kouchibouguac proposes to have a starch factory.

The I. C. R. paint shed, St. John, was burned Saturday night.

The tides in the Petitcodiac have been very high this month. Dykes on the Moncton side of the river have been broken and marshes flooded.

Alex. Gibson jr., has a field of potatoes at Marysville that is well worth looking at. The field is expected to yield 700 barrels or about 1800 bushels. There is very little rot among them.

The store of Jos. J. Melanson, Bathurst, was broken Friday night and goods to the amount of \$30 to \$40 stolen.

The bridge at the mouth of Nashua is almost impassible.

There was a bad washout on the W. C. R. at Swenden's Hollow, ten miles below Annapolis, on Monday of last week. For two or three days passengers and freight had to go between Digby and Annapolis by steamer.

Messrs. Rhodes, Curry & Co., have secured the contract for building the new seminary at Wolfville. The amount is in the neighborhood of \$23,000 and the work is to be completed by Aug. 1st, 1892.

Mrs. Bowen, of Halifax, while trying a few days ago to separate two boys who were fighting had an eye knocked out by one of the contestants.

On Wednesday, Charles Dickens, of H. M. S. Pelican, was drowned in Sydney Harbor.

Two ships of 1700 and 1800 tons each, were launched at Maitland, N. S.

A Lockport, despatch says: Capt. McAlpine of the sch. Glenora, reports having passed the sch. Eureka of Lunenburg, on the Middle Banks on the 11th inst., with the sch. Morris Wilson on her beam ends in tow. It is supposed all the Wilson's crew were lost. The list of the crew are: Capt. S. Knickle, Norman Tanner, S. Schmare, Allison Conrod (married), G. Herman, J. Freichtenburg (married), A. Tanner, E. Knickle, R. Schmare, D. Conrod, H. Smith, A. Delorie, A. Smith, S. Walter, J. Tanner, J. Zwicker and Wm. Knickle. The last two are boys.

A fine brick of gold weighing 23 1/2 ounces, the product of 20 tons of quartz, crushed in the Eastville mill, South Uniac, N. S., was brought to Halifax a few days ago. The value of the brick was over \$4,500.

While the schooner Bear River Packet was lying at her wharf in Bear River, N. S., last week a thief entered the cabin where Captain Woodworth was sleeping, removed a bunch of keys from the captain's clothes, unlocked a chest in the cabin and took \$125 in money.

K. D. C. has been awarded a Silver Medal at the Jamaica Exhibition (the highest award for any medicine). Its merits prove its greatness.

Oliver C. Cummings, of Truro, was killed Thursday morning at Salt Springs station, on the Intercolonial, while boarding the train. The body was found between the platform and rail with the head smashed. It is supposed he missed his footing getting on board.

The Nova Scotia provincial exhibition promises to be a success. In all there are over 4,000 entries.

Building operations, at Pictou, are brisk. Over \$40,000 is being expended. New Glasgow is about erecting a \$20,000 Y. M. C. A. structure.

The fishing vessel, Morris Wilson, of Lunenburg, was lost off the banks in the hurricane on the 7th inst., with her crew of 17 men.

The bridge across the Narrows to Dartmouth is to be rebuilt at once by the Dominion Government.

The trouble between the master and journeymen painters of Halifax over the apprentice continues. The strike is taken part in by some masons, carpenters and others. Masters are now forming an association for mutual protection.

Other Provinces.

Hon. Mr. Justice Tessier has resigned his seat on the Quebec Bench on account of age and infirmity.

Two thousand millmen are on strike at Ottawa.

A man named Joseph Jobin made a desperate attempt to commit suicide at St. Benoit infirmary asylum, Montreal. He hung himself up three times, but the attendants cut him down.

At Sorel, P. Q., a man named Trudeau, shot and killed Louis Colnoir, a hired man, as he was going to his room. Trudeau had mistaken the victim for a burglar.

There was a collision between a freight and express on the C. P. R. near Kamloops on Tuesday. Considerable damage to rolling stock, but no loss of life.

A young girl of John Woods, Mt. Albion, Lot 48, P. E. I., while gathering grain in her father's field, was bitten on the hand by a rat. The hand swelled and became very painful, and it was feared that blood poisoning had set in, but under the care of Dr. Taylor she has now improved, and is considered quite out of danger.

It is stated that the lieutenant governor and his ministers have agreed upon Chief Justice Johnson as a commissioner to inquire into the Baie des Chaleurs scandal.

A heavy storm passed over Ottawa on Friday. A portion of the heavy glass roof over the House of Commons chamber was blown in, falling with a crash upon the rear rows of seats on the ministerial side. Fortunately the accident occurred about one o'clock, when there were very few members in the chamber, otherwise some fatalities might have occurred.

The discovery of rich anthracite coal deposit is reported on Red Deer River, north of Banff, N. W. T.

An insane Swedish settler named Westerlund, murdered his three-year-old daughter at New Stockholm, Man.

The total number of applications for hundred acre lots by the fathers of families of twelve children amount to over 1,500, which represents a population of perhaps 20,000. Nearly 1,100 claims have been granted and already 800 families have settled on the lots. The Quebec Government gives a free grant of a 100 acre lot to every father of twelve or more children who makes application.

United States.

Booth & Co.'s leather factory at Gloraville, N. Y., was badly damaged by fire and water. Insured for \$200,000.

Ernest Bock, bookkeeper of the Prussian Mortgage Insurance company of Berlin, who embezzled 380,000 marks and fled, was arrested at New York. He had on his person 11,000 marks.

At Eastport, Me., a large mastiff owned by Stephen Harris was eating a piece of meat when the three-year-old son of Robert Lingly playfully attempted to take it away. The threatened strike of the window glass workers of Pittsburgh, U. S., has been averted, and there will be a general resumption of the factories on Oct. 1st. An agreement has been reached by which the men will work at the old wages for the ensuing year. The resumption gives employment to 10,000 men and boys.

British and Foreign.

Alarming accounts of brigandage growing out of famine come from South Russia. Murders and outrages by starving peasants are of daily occurrence. In many villages complete anarchy prevails.

The village of Refel in the Tyrol was destroyed by fire on Sunday during the absence of its inhabitants at a religious festival.

An official telegraph reports 1500 persons perished in the destruction of Consegua by the overflowing of the Anaguillo, Spain. Hundreds of others were injured by falling buildings. Enormous numbers of cattle perished at other places and many persons were drowned and much property damaged.
