I sometimes feel as though I would be glad to visit many of our weak churches throughout the country, if it were possible. Brethren, pray for us.

RUM MEN'S REVENGE.—On the night of the 17th ult., at Cantreville, C. Co., Mr. C. M. Sherwood's shade trees were cut down; in Mr. S. F. Sherwood's flower house the plants were destroyed; and in Mr. G. McClintock's orchard seventeen apple and plum trees were girdled. These gentlemen are active in temperance work, Mr. McClintock being the C. T. A. Inspector for the County. It is believed that these outrages are in revenge of some recent prosecutions of violators of the law. They are quite in keeping with rum men's methods.

Geo. Botsford Esq., for many years Clerk of the Legislative Council of this Province, died in this city last Wednesday. He was over eighty years old, and had been in feeble health for two years.

Mr. Gladstone is ill, and his friends are said to be quite uneasy about the state of his health.

FATHER CHINQUY intimates that he will lecture in the Maritime Provinces during the summer.

REV. DR. SUTHERLAND, of Toronto, has been chosen to succeed Dr. Inch in the Principalship of Mount Allison College. It is not yet known whether he will accept.

THE MARITIME CONVENTION of the W. C. T. U. closed a very interesting session in St. John last week. The representation from the Maritime Provinces was large, but only fair from the Upper Provinces. Miss Willard was present, and, of course, added much to the interest of the session. All the departments—about twenty-five—we think—of work in which the women are engaged, received careful attention. Amongst the resolutions passed were the following:

Believing that the liquor traffic cannot be licensed without sin, therefore resolved that as a society based upon non-sectarian, non-political lines, we reaffirm as our platform total abstinence as the safety of the citizen and prohibition the security of the state.

That while we rejoice that scientific temperance instruction has been made compulsory in parts of our dominion, we will renew our efforts in those provinces where a compulsory law does not exist, and to this end would respectfully urge upon the ministers of education to place scientific temperance instruction upon the prescribed list of subjects for the examination of both teachers and scholars, recommending that the use of a duly authorized series of text books be compulsory under the forfeiture of school grants.

That in view of the fact that women have been placed upon the school boards in parts of Great Britain and the United States and Canada, and that they have shown their fitness for this position by advancing its work, we would respectfully urge that women would be made eligible for office and represented upon the school board of our dominion.

That we record our thanks to the Heavenly Father for the advance that has been made in the department of unfermented wine for sacramental purposes and do earnestly ask all ministers and congregations where unfermented wine has not been introduced to carefully consider the expediency of using it.

This union confidently believes that the time has come when it should take steps to secure the full franchise of woman, and would urge the thorough circulation of the petitions which are already in our hands for the enfranchisement of women, and also urge that the provincial unions petition for provincial franchise.

Believing that the scriptural injunction "keep thyself pure" comes to all individually, both as men and women, and that in God's sight all are equally responsible; therefore

Resolved, That we take a more determined stand on this question, urging each member of our union to make her home such a stronghold of purity that no man or woman known to be leading an impure life can partake of its hospitality, and that we endeavor to make our efforts as far-reaching as possible in creating a more wholesome sentiment concerning personal purity.

That the Dominion Union is pledged to discountenance by its influence the objectionable style of evening dress which obtains in society gatherings throughout the dominion, and desires to place on record its disapproval of round dances as leading to social impurity.

A SOCIABLE.—At Long Island, Tobique, on the 19th ult., we had a sociable, which was pleasant. The ladies provided the edibles, which were readily purchased by the men. Fifteen and a half dollars were realized, which goes to the pastor, Rev. L. A. Cosman. There was music M. S. Vincent and Miss Sallier presiding at the organ, and everything was most decorous and pleasant.

SUNDRIES.—An eleven-year-old Kansas boy has been granted a teacher's certificate. To same trouble to those who may desire to count them, the information is given that the ordinary watch gives 116,144,000 ticks during a year. Four thousand women are employed in the government departments at Washington. The work is easy and the pay good. Frank Smeltzer of Van Buren, Ark., has a strawberry patch of eighty-five acres. He employs 600 hands to pick the berries.

INCORRECT.—The statement which went the rounds of the papers that Rev. "Sam" Small was a defaulter, and that his name was dropped from his Conference roll, was incorrect. His bishop says his accounts were correct in every particular. Mr. Small has had the man who started the report indicted for libel.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD'S PORTRAIT. Every person in the Maritime Provinces has heard of the late premier of Canada, Sir John Macdonald, but not one in ten has seen the great leader. Progress of St. John, N. B., the splendid sixteen page paper that has won deserved popularity so quickly, has no politics, but for half a dollar in stamps, it offers a handsome cabinet photograph of Sir John and a three months' subscription to Progress. It will not be surprising if thousands of persons—on both sides of politics—take advantage of this offer, and thus secure a good picture of the man who has governed Canada so long. The portrait is a perfect copy of one now in possession of Sir Leonard Tilley, governor of New Brunswick, who received it a few days before Sir John Macdonald's death.—4 ins.

Literary Notes.

"Sketches, Sermons and Sayings, by Sister Skraggs" is the title a little book, in paper covers, issued from the press of the Messenger, Owensville, Ind. It hits at the peculiarities, the weaknesses, prejudices and notions which are found in greater or less degree, in every congregation. It ought to do good. The author is Rev. J. E. Cox, pastor of a Free Baptist church in Ohio. It costs only 25 cts.

The issue of *The Dominion Illustrated* for the 20th inst. is devoted almost exclusively to an account, with full illustrations, of the funeral of Sir John A. Macdonald. No such outburst of popular sorrow over the death of any man has ever been evoked in Canada. *The Dominion Illustrated* sent its own photographers and artist to Ottawa and Kingston, and the number is a memorial worthy of the occasion, and one that throughout Canada will be preserved as a sad souvenir of the man whose death has left so great a void in the public life of the country he has served so long.
