The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Fourth Quarter-Lesson XI.—Dec. 13.

CHRIST RISEN.—John 20:1-18.

GOLDEN TEXT.—It is Christ that died, yea, rather, that is risen again. Rom. 8:34.

THE BURIAL. Jesus died about three o'clock Friday afternoon. Joseph of Arimathea asked permission of Pilate to care for the body of Jesus. He with Nicodemus took the body from the cross, wrapped it in linen clothes, with an hundred weight of spices to preserve the body, and laid it in a new tomb belonging to Joseph, in a garden near by, and rolled a stone against the door. The women saw where the body was laid, and went home to prepare spices and ointments for the completion of the embalming and then rested over the Sabbath.

MEASURES TAKEN TO MAKE SURE THAT JESUS WAS REALLY DEAD. It was of the utmost importance that Christ's death should be proved beyond the possibility of doubt. Every precaution was taken, not by his disciples, but by the enemies of Jesus. (1) The Roman centurion assured Pilate of the death of Jesus. (2) The soldiers pierced his body with a spear, and from the wound flowed blood and water, a proof of death. (3) At the request of the chief priests, the stone against the door of the sepulchre was sealed, and (4) a Roman guard was placed around the tomb.

THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS. On the third day Jesus rose from the dead. It is of the utmost importance that we remember that the body Jesus rose with was the very same body which died on the cross. Jesus takes special pains to show his disciples that he is the same. He declares that he is flesh and bones; he bids Thomas put his hands in the prints of the nails and in the wound made by the spear; he eats before them the same kind of food he ate before he died. Jesus body was doubtless changed at the ascension, into a spiritual body.

THE STORY OF EASTER MORNING.—Vers. 1-8. The first day of the week. Sunday, the day after the Jewish Sabbath. *Cometh Mary Magdalene, accompanied by other women. They brought spices for embalming the body of Jesus. Early when it was yet dark. Just before dawn they started, and reached the sepulchre about sunrise. Unto the sepulchre. The tomb was cut in the side of a rock, like a cave, large enough for several persons to enter. The entrance was protected by a large stone, sometimes round, like a large millstone. Seeth the stone taken away from the sepulchre. Mary Magdalene drawing near the tomb, sees that the stone is removed. The lesson is very beautiful. We have only to go on in faithful obedience, doing each day our simple duty and never worrying about the difficulties that may lie in our path. An unseen helper ever goes on before us and prepares the way for us. Then she runneth, without entering the sepulchre. She was afraid that the body had been stolen. The disciple whom Jesus loved. John, the author of this gospel. They have taken away the Lord. She thought his enemies could not allow even his dead body to rest in peace. Went forth, out of the house. So they ran, showing their eagerness. The other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to the sepulchre. It is probable that John was the younger and the more active. Saw the linen clothes, yet went he not in. Perhaps from a feeling of awe, and mystery, he would pause and think, before he went further. Simon Peter... went into the sepulchre. Peter was the bolder, the more practical and unhesitating. The napkin... wrapped together in a place by itself. The disposition of the clothes was a sign that Christ had not been hastily removed. Hence it could not be that the body of Jesus had been stolen. He saw and believed. Peter was the first to enter; John the first to believe. There was no other way to account for the state of things. He probably recalled the repeated promises of Jesus that he would rise again. And this belief in the resurrection of Jesus quelled all the doubts which must have arisen in the apostles' minds during these sad days. For as yet they knew not the scripture, etc. The Scriptures referred to may be such as Ps 2:7, which Paul (Acts 13:33) applied to, or Ps 15:9, which Peter (Acts 2:24-27) interpreted of the resurrection. But still more emphatic are those two classes of Old Testament prophecy, one representing Christ as suffering and dying, as Isa. 53, and the other as a triumphant, everlasting king of a kingdom which shall never be destroyed, as Isa. 9:7; Dan. 2:44, 45; 7:13, 14; Ps. 72:8, which only the resurrection could reconcile and explain. Went away again to their own home. Their lodgings in the city. But Mary stood without. As soon as she had told the disciples her fears, she returned to the sepulchre. And*

as she wept she stooped down and looked into the sepulchre. She was anxious to see whether she might not, after all, be mistaken about the absence of the body. And seeth two angels in white. In white raiment. White signifying the purity of their character. The one at the head, the other at the feet. The angels' presence showed the divine hand and care. She saith unto them. While the other women were terrified, Mary seems to have had no fear. She turned herself back. She was outside the cave looking in, and now she turned away, perhaps hearing footsteps. And saw Jesus standing, and knew not that it was Jesus. Why did she not recognize him at first. (1) She had her eyes dimmed with tears, and (2) her mind occupied and excited with other thoughts; besides, (3) she was not at all expecting to see him alive; (4) his garments certainly must have been changed, as the soldiers had those he was accustomed to wear; (5) she may not have looked up to his face; (6) the long agony on the cross must have made some difference in his appearance. She, supposing him to be the gardener. * * No other person would be likely to be there at so early an hour. And I will take him away. See that it is done. Jesus saith unto her, Mary. This word spoken in the old familiar tones, led her instantly to recognize him. She saith unto him, Rabboni. My master or teacher. As Mary uttered the word, she must have endeavored to fall down at the feet of her Lord, embracing them. Jesus saith unto her, Touch me not. This prohibition cannot mean that there was any reason in the nature of his body why she should not touch him, for he allowed the other women to touch him, and he told Thomas to touch him and see that he was unchanged. For I am not yet ascended to my Father. This is the reason given why Mary should not cling to Jesus at this time. It means, do not stop now to embrace me, but hasten away to the disciples, for you will have other opportunities to express your devotion to me. But go to my brethren. For the first time, Jesus speaks of his disciples as brethren. I ascend. The next step in the work of redemption was at hand. My Father and your Father. The same good Father would watch over them, and work in them, as had watched over him and worked in him. Mary Magdalene came and told. She obeyed the command of Jesus.

LESSONS FROM THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS.
 The resurrection of Jesus is the crowning proof that he is the Son of God.
 It is the proof of immortal life beyond the grave.
 It proves that we have a living Saviour, sitting on the right hand of God.
 It proves that our Saviour has power over all our enemies.
 It is the assurance of our own resurrection.
 It takes away the darkness from the tomb.
 It teaches the moral resurrection, that being dead to sin we should be alive unto God.
SOME PRACTICAL HINTS.
 How often we say, as we approach a difficult duty, "Who will roll away the stone?" only to find, if we go straight on, that God in his own way has removed the obstacles.
 The very efforts of opposers to destroy and hinder the Gospel are made to minister to its success.
 Our eyes are often hidden from seeing our Lord because he appears in unexpected ways and strange providences.
 Those who love Christ most diligently and perseveringly are those who receive most.
 God's promises and prophecies are fulfilled to the letter.

W. C. T. Union.
OUR MOTTO.—If God be for us, who can be against us.
The World's Convention.
 The following brief reports of speeches of welcome to the W. C. T. U. Convention in Boston, were intended to be published last week, but were crowded out:
 —Dr. Lorimer, in his address of welcome, said:
 Welcome to this old town of revolutionary memories, whose great heart has ever throbbed in sympathy with human suffering; this city of Garrison, of Phillips, of Channing, of Emerson, of Sumner and of Alcott, and of honorable and devout women not a few. And this Temple, called into being as a church to protest against chattel slavery, against social inequalities in worship, and within whose walls the earliest advocates of freedom from the liquor curse found their most responsive audiences.
 These—city, church and clergy, extend to the delegates of this magnificent "Union" a respectful and affectionate welcome. The apostolic injunction we gladly recognise and

obey to-night, "We receive you in the Lord, as becometh saints, and we are ready to assist you in what soever you have need of us; for you have been succourers of many and of ourselves also; unto whom not only I give thanks, but also all the churches of the Gentiles", (Rom. 16:2, 4).

For years woman seems to have felt that her part in christian, philanthropic and temperance work was only to urge on the other sex, rather than to originate plans of her own, inaugurate any reforms, or direct any movement of forces. This species of incense was peculiarly grateful to the drowsy masculine god, large in his own esteem, whose favour on behalf of her happiness and for that of her children she ought to propitiate. Having become impatient of the conservatism and tardiness which characterized the endeavours of the brethren, comparing the "petty done with the undone vast," and realizing the friends of sobriety and social order were being circumvented by the Napoleonic genius of evil, because, like the Austrians, they dawdled, hesitancy was thrown to the winds, and our women pressed forward, "All in the valley of death, Rode the six hundred." As you are christian women, christian women united, and united christian women relying on Christ to overwhelm and crush a most unchristian traffic, you are welcome, thrice welcome to our hearts and homes.

—Rev. Dr. Dunn, editor of the Boston Traveller, in his remarks of welcome, after referring to the wonderful success that has attended the Union, said: "I am not surprised when I recall the nature of the solemn compact to which the sainted women who initiated the crusade eighteen years ago subscribed. We, the ladies whose names are hereto appended, agree and resolve that, with God's help, we will stand for each other in this work, and persevere therein until it is accomplished, and see to it, as far as our influence goes, that the traffic shall never be revived." Man has the ballot-box, and is inclined to consider himself the sole custodian, but woman can have the press, she will ere long secure the ballot and all the right which justly belong to her. The success of the W. C. T. U. is but another instance of that which the history of all times goes on to prove, that woman has ever proved herself equal to any emergency, and has never shrunk from any duty to which, in the Providence of God, she has been called. That to this work woman has been called no sane man will doubt. Man has done much to lessen the evil and reclaim the victim; with woman's help the work will be accomplished.

—Several Fredericton ladies who attended the Boston Convention, having returned, were present at the meeting of the Union here on Wednesday last, and gave interesting accounts of the great meeting. The large and representative attendance, the enthusiasm, the speeches, the spirit of devotion, &c. &c.
 The delegate of the Fredericton union, Mrs. Randolph, will, we presume present a report of the Convention, and, if so, we expect to publish it.
