Fourth Quarter—Lesson v. — Nov. 1

CHRIST THE TRUE VINE. John 15: 1-16.

GOLDEN TEXT.—Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit.—Job 15: 8.

THE ALLEGORY OF THE VINE AND ITS BRANCHES.—Vers. 1-3. Some think this allegory was suggested by the "fruit of the true vine" they had just used in the last supper.

The True Vine. I am the true vine. The genuine, the ideal, the perfect vine. What he meant was, that he, the Father, and the disciples, stood in exactly the same relationship as the vine, the husbandman, and the branches. This true vine is Christ; not the man Christ Jesus, but the living, abiding Christ, the Christ who is with his people always, even unto the end of the world who reproduces himself in every true disciple.

The Husbandman. My Father is the husbandman. Not the hired laborer, but the owner of the vineyard.

The Fruitless Branches. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit. These are the external professors, the merely baptized members, who have no life and never had. It includes those who are joined to Christ by intellectual conviction, who accept of him and his teachings with their minds, but do not obey him nor love him. He taketh away. Because their presence injures the other branches; and their remaining is of no benefit to themselves.

The Fruitful Branches and their Fruit. And every branch that beareth fruit. Every true disciple is a branch; every true church is a branch. It is not measured by the results, the amounts of money given, the number of souls saved, as we are too often inclined to measure fruits; but by the love, the obedience, the grace, the devotion, which lead to these onward results. He purgeth. Better, he cleanseth. The very fruit itself must be thinned out in order that larger fruit of better quality may be produced. The object of all this redemptive work is in order that the soul may bring forth more fruit. This pruning explains the reason for many of our losses and trials. Now (already) ye are clean. Cleansed, as described in the previous verse. Through, because of, on account of, the word, which I have spoken unto you. You are already cleansed from past sin through your acceptance of and obedience to my word. Jesus comforts them with the assurance that they are cleansed, that they are bearing fruit, though they need further cleansing in order that they bring forth more fruit.

THE BLESSED EFFECTS OF ABIDING IN THE TRUE VINE.—Vers. 4-16. Abide in me, and I in you. Abide in me; see to it that I abide in you, As the branch, etc. The union between the branch of a vine and the main stem is the closest that can be conceived. All true spiritual fruit is the effect of his life flowing in us. Abiding in Christ. To abide in Christ means to keep up a habit of constant and close communion with him, to be always leaning on him, resting on him, pouring out our hearts to him, and using him as our fountain and life of strength. He that abideth in me... bringeth forth much fruit. This saying is true of individuals, of teachers, of ministers, and of churches. To be fruitful, to really make this world better, and do for it what Christ began on earth, we must abide in him. No Christless church can be truly successful. Teach Christ, live Christ, abide in Christ, and the fruit is sure. For without me. Better, apart from me, not simply without my help, but separated from me as a branch cut off is separated from the vine. Ye can do nothing. There will be no true good works, no true success. He is cast forth as a branch. That is cut off and thrown outside the vineyard into the brush-heaps for burning. And is withered. Loses its power of bearing fruit; in time loses even the appearance of life. And they are burned. As dead branches of a vine are burned; destroyed. The soul which is separated from Christ is separated from the source of spiritual life, withers away and is eventually destroyed. If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you. To have his word abiding in us is to keep his sayings and precepts continually before our minds and memories, and to make them guide our actions and rule our daily conduct and behavior. Ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you. Because such are so imbued with God's will that they will ask what is God's will to give, for God's glory, in submission to his wisdom and love. Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit. In the fruitfulness of the vine lies the joy and glory of the husbandman. So shall ye be (become) my disciples. Learners in the school of Christ, followers of his teaching. As the Father hath loved

The Great Petition.

Miss Morgan, the British secretary of the World's W. C. T. U., is working diligently on the great petition. The good Templars at a recent meeting in Edinburg, took fifteen hundred headings to circulate, which is a grand action on their part, and Lady Henry Somerset has seen General Booth, who promises his full sympathy in the cause, and the matter will soon be taken up by his officers. He says he hopes to send us one hundred and sixty thousand names. We hope that by the diligent efforts of our English sisters, our Canadian sisters and our white-ribboners in America, the number of signatures may have reached a million by the time we meet in Boston, November 13 to 18. We propose to have the petition there and with it to festoon Faneuil Hall or Tremont Temple, as the case may be. Will not each white-ribboner say to herself: Have I signed? Has my family signed? Has it been circulated by our local union? and if it has not, let her drop a postal card to me at Rest Cottage, or to Mrs. Mary A. Woodbridge, of Ravenna, Ohio, without delay. We do not, of course, call upon our corresponding secretary to the World's W. C. T. U., Mrs. Mary Clement Leavitt, to help us with these details after these many years of arduous labor, but we fully recognize that she has made the great petition known as no one else has done. Miss Jessie Ackerman, the new president of Australia, is circulating the petition, and we hope for encouraging returns from that great country in time for the Boston convention. According to present estimates, the petition will be not less than ten miles long. We are sorry to be obliged to say that no country has worked with less system or assiduity to bring about this result than our own dear native land. This is doubtless due to the fact that our women have had so many other engagements and such intricate lines of work to follow out. I am sure they will not permit this to be the case when we meet in November, but that, having responded so grandly to every other call of the World's W. C. T. U., they will make a speciality this time of rolling in the signatures. There is no time to lose. This is humanity's concentrated world protest against the traffic in brain poisons, and a little time put in now will make it the splendid demonstration for which we have prayed, pleaded and worked, and the returns will yield the largest capital on her investment in time, made by the white-ribboners in the noble defense of God, home and humanity.

At the present time, unfermented wines are known to be used at the Communion in over 250 Presbyterian Churches in Scotland; and at the late Reformed Presbyterian Synod it was stated that no member of the denomination was connected with the drink traffic.
