THE DEEPEST LAKE KNOWN.—By far the deepest lake known in the world, is Lake Baikal in Siberia, which is every way comparable to the great Canadian lakes as regards size, for while its area is over 9000 square miles, making it about equal to Erie in superficial extent, its enormous depth of between 4,000 and 5,000 feet, makes the volume of its waters almost equal to that of Lake Superior. Although its surface is 1,350 feet above the sea level, its bottom is nearly 3,000 feet below it. The Caspian Lake, or sea, as it is usually called, has a depth in its southern basin of over 3,000 feet. Lake Maggiore is 3,000 feet deep, Lake Como nearly 2,000 feet and Lago di Garda, another Italian lake, has a depth in certain places of 1,900 feet. Lake Constance is over 1,000 feet deep, and Huron and Michigan reach depths of 900 and 1,000 feet.

COMPLETED TO DEADWOOD.

AN EXCHANGE reports a curious case where failure to get married has produced embarrassment in church relations: "A bachelor was elected a deacon in a congregation of a neighboring town. As one of the apostolic directions for the primitive church was that a deacon 'should be the husband of one wife,' and 'should have his children in subjection,' there are those who think the deacon-elect ineligible." Yet not all deacons who are married keep their children in subjection.

PREBYTERIAN. Rev. Mr. MacGregor, of Amherst, N. S., preached in the Presbyterian church, this city, last Sabbath. His sermons are highly spoken of.

MANNA.—Last August there was a fall of manna in Asia Minor, which was baked for bread after the manner of the biblical tradition. It has been examined by Frenchmen of science, and identified as lichen of the family *Lecanora esculenta*. Some will doubtless say, no doubt, manna fell naturally for the support of the Israelites. But manna fell six days out of seven, but not on the seventh, through a long period. That manna, when gathered on Saturday, would keep over the Sabbath; on other days it would not. The rain that fell in answer to ELIJAH's prayers was like other rain; the circumstances under which it fell proved the miracle. It never was pretended that manna was wholly unknown in the East.—*Advocate*.

According to the census which has just been taken there are 244,704 Indians in the United States. Of these 128,611 belong to the self-supporting class. President Harrison has approved of the act to prohibit the sale of tobacco to minors under sixteen years of age in the District of Columbia. Miss Galt, daughter of Chief Justice Galt of Toronto, and niece of Sir A. T. Galt, has joined the Salvation Army as a lieutenant and is now stationed at the Montreal barracks. So large is the immigration of Italians that the Papal authorities at Rome have decided to assign at least one priest to each of the Catholic churches in New York City. Rev. Mr. Mowatt having got his piano injured en route to Montreal, the New Brunswick residents here will soon present the rev. gentleman with a fine new instrument, valued at \$500.

MR. J. SCOTT HUTTON, Principal of the Halifax institution for the Deaf and Dumb, died last week. He had been ill a good while. For many years Mr. Hutton was at the head of the school for the Deaf and Dumb, and has been regarded as one of the most accomplished teachers and friends of that afflicted class to which he has devoted his life. He was 57 years of age.

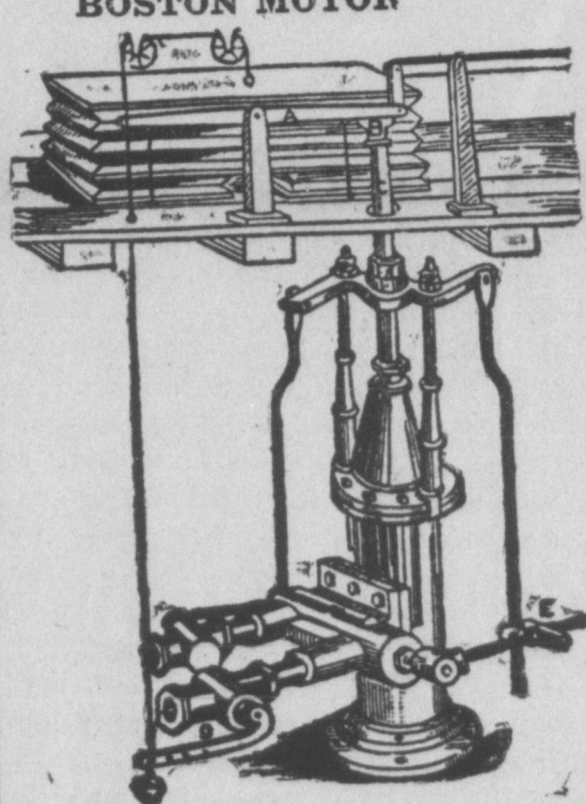
