The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Third Quarter—Lesson VIII.—Nov. 22.

CHRIST BETRAYED.—John 18:1-13.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*The Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners.*—Mark 14:41.

THE WALK FROM JERUSALEM TO THE MOUNT OF OLIVES. When Jesus had spoken these words, the prayer in previous chapter. He went forth from the upper room. Over the brook Cedron. The deep ravine east of Jerusalem, between the city and the Mount of Olives. Where was a garden, Gethsemane, on the slope of the Mount of Olives. Into the which he entered, and his disciples, for that hour of agony and prayer. And Judas also... knew the place, for Jesus oftentimes resorted thither with his disciples. A quiet resting-place, for retirement, prayer, perhaps sleep, where not only the twelve, but others also, may have been wont to meet the Master.

THE PLOT OF JUDAS. While Jesus was discoursing with his disciples, Judas was with the Pharisees, arranging the details of his treachery.

AGONY AND PRAYER IN GETHSEMANE. Leaving eight of the disciples near the gate as a guard, Jesus takes Peter, James and John farther into the garden. Then leaving them, he goes alone and prays in an agony that causes him to sweat, as it were, great drops of blood. Three times he prays that the cup may be taken from him, and yet he says, "Not my will, but thine be done." He was bearing the sins of the world. He was facing death in its most terrible form. The tempter no doubt assailed him with fiery darts.

The Answer to his Prayer. An angel came and strengthened him. He was delivered from his fears. He was strengthened to go on with his work of redemption.

JUDAS BETRAYS HIS MASTER.—Vers. 3-9. Judas then, having received a band. The Roman cohort, which consisted of from 300 to 600 men guarded the city. Probably only part of the band was present. And officers. The officers, were members of the temple police. With lanterns and torches. To search the shady recesses of the garden with the cohort was a great multitude. Jesus therefore knowing. He was not taken unawares. Went forth. From the shady retreats of the garden faced the soldiers, and asked them, Whom seek ye? Jesus of Nazareth. The answer may reveal the light in which Judas had represented Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus said... I am he. Judas also, stood with them. What did Judas gain? Thirty pieces of silver. Then shame, remorse and awful anguish, the suicide's rope, and the potter's field. \$18 60, and eternal infamy, and everlasting shame and contempt. They went backward, not fell backward, and fell to the ground. This was the manifestation of a superhuman power from Jesus. Then (therefore) asked he them again. Perhaps to lead them to repentance, or to draw them to himself, and away from the disciples. If therefore ye seek me, let these go their way. He would save the disciples. He also tested them as to how closely they would, of their own accord, cling to him in his hour of trouble. That the saying might be fulfilled. This was not the complete fulfilment of these words, but one instance of their fulfilment.

PETER'S COURAGE AND RASH ZEAL.—Vers. 10, 11. Then Simon Peter, having a sword drew it. Peter wished to prove his readiness to risk his life for the Lord, and to fulfil his vow. And smote the high priest's servant, and cut off his right ear. This was a rash act; it compromised Jesus in his teaching that his kingdom was spiritual. Peter might have been arrested for rebellion, and perhaps the other disciples with him. The servant's name was Malchus. Jesus did all he could to repair the injury done by Peter's rash act. He forbade his disciples to use weapons, and thus quieted the fears of the officers, and they allowed the disciples to escape. Then said Jesus unto Peter, Put up thy sword into the sheath. The answer of Jesus lays down for the church its line of conduct under persecution. The cup which my Father hath given me. What God had arranged for him to suffer in making atonement for sin. Shall I not drink it? Shall I refuse to carry out the divine plans for the redemption of the world? The fact that the cup was given him by God was sufficient. Then the band... took Jesus. The guard took possession of him, pinioned him, and led him away.

THE DISCIPLES ALL FORSAKE THEIR LORD. All the disciples forsook their Master and fled. The disciples failed in faith and courage when their great trial came. But we must remember the terrors of that night, the thronging dangers, the weariness and excitement that preceded, and the doubt whether

they could do any good by remaining.

THE PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION BEFORE ANNAS.—Ver. 13. And led him away to Annas first. Annas, though deposed by the foreign power that ruled Judea, was still the legitimate high priest. Annas sends Jesus to Caiaphas the high priest, and he, while waiting for the council asks Jesus some questions. Jesus replies that everything had been done in public. Whereupon an official officer struck Jesus. The council having assembled, they proceeded to bring false witnesses against Jesus. The high priest solemnly adjures him to say whether he is the Messiah. Jesus acknowledges that he is. Immediately the council declares him to be "guilty of death." But they cannot legally vote his condemnation at this illegal hour and place, and therefore adjourn till daylight to their own hall.

THE THREE DENIALS OF PETER.—The first two denials were in the early part of the trial, soon after his entering. The third must have been toward the close of this first trial; for it was at the hour of cock-crowing.

He had been self-seeking, striving to be accounted greatest; he had been self-confident; he had separated from his brethren; he had ventured into evil company. Men fall in private long before they fall in public.

"He went out and wept bitterly." His repentance was complete. To the repentant Peter restoration was possible; and after a season of bitterest sorrow it was granted fully and freely. Peter was permanently changed for the better by his experience.

PRACTICAL HINTS.

The most terrible battles are fought, and the most glorious victories are won in the souls of men.

Every life has its Gethsemanes of sorrow and conflict, and may have its victories.

It is not strange that some bad professors creep into the church, since one in twelve even of Christ's own disciples was false.

It is a terrible thing to succeed in a bad undertaking. A bad man's success is the most awful failure.

Jesus has most tender care for his disciples' safety.

Never refuse to drink the cup God puts to your lips.

The world at times seems to conquer, and to have God's people in its power, but at these very times it is an instrument for advancing God's truth.

PURE UNFERMENTED GRAPE JUICE.—After carefully picking wash one gallon of Concord grapes. Add two quarts of water, boil fifteen minutes in a preserving kettle. Strain through a fine wire sieve, a flour sieve will do; put a plate over the fruit with a weight on it to extract the juice. Strain a second time, placing flannel in the sieve, to remove the pulp. Return to kettle, bring to a boil, add half a pound of sugar to each quart of juice. As soon as the sugar has blended bottle in gem jars while boiling hot, or in common bottles, corking well and sealing with wax.

On the evening of October 20, in the Metropolitan M. E. Church Washington, D. C., a great temperance meeting was held, perhaps the largest ever convened in the national capital. The business committee of the Ecumenical Conference gave the use of the church to the white-ribbons, who had invited Lady Henry Somerset to come to Washington to speak as their representative. Mrs. Sarah D. La Feta and Miss Ames, acting upon advice from Miss Willard, arranged the meeting. No greater compliment could have been paid us by the Conference, which adjourned in the afternoon that the evening might be left open, and "the women," as many prominent ministers expressed it, "have the last and best say." Three thousand persons packed the great edifice, and a thousand more convened in the vestry and were addressed by the same speakers. Bishop Hurst presided, as was fitting, for women have not a better friend among ecclesiastical leaders than this most scholarly of Bishops. Bishop Newman conducted the devotional exercises, and Bishop A. C. C. of Canada, gave a stirring address. Rev. Dr. J. W. Hamilton, of Boston, spoke in his usual eloquent vein and said, "All the greatest ministers in the Methodist church have not been able to secure such an audience as has assembled upon invitation of the women. Surely this is woman's century." Miss Katharine Willard sang imitatively "More Holiness Give Me," and "My Ain Country," after which Lady Henry Somerset proceeded to address the great assembly. Her eager hearers saw a woman in the early prime of life, of medium height, face clear-cut and symmetrical, dark eyes full of kindness, the brow shaded by dark brown hair. They heard a voice of great purity and sweetness, with an enunciation so perfect as to penetrate the farthest corner of those crowded aisles, and they recognized a spirit wholly devoted to the cause of Christ, the comforting of humanity, the cure of the drink habit, and the legal and political overthrow of the liquor power. Expectation was high, but it was not disappointed. The closing plea for personal consecration to the cause was full of pathos. Then came "Our Hannah" Whittall Smith, with her straightforward, hearty words full of suggestion and hope. The meeting was a masterful success—confessedly the largest held during the famous "Ecumenical."

SOME RAILROAD FACTS.

A steel rail lasts, with average wear, about eighteen years. The cost of railroads in the United States has been \$9,000,000,000.
