### News of the Week.

#### New Brunswick

Captain Newcombe, of the Parraboro schooner Wiona, wrecked in the river below Moncton a few weeks ago, has instructed his lawyers to sue the city for \$2,000 damages for failure to provide him with a berth at the wharves, which necessitated his returning down river.

John Craig, an employee of Miller & Woodman's mill, at Milford, was badly burned Friday. While standing near the furnace he had a fainting spell, and fell forward on the furnace, sustaining severe burns about the face and head.

Early Friday morning some evil-disposed person placed a piece of a telegraph pole across the I. C. R. rails between the Penobscot and Sussex. The timely discovery of the obstruction prevented an accident. The I. C. R. police are investigating the matter.

Councillor McKenzie, of St. Stephen, was badly injured by the breaking away of a staging on which he was working yesterday.

James Gibbons, driver of the alms house wagon, St. John was severely and perhaps fatally injured Saturday morning. He attempted to get on a load of manure, which he was taking from the rear of No. 1 fire engine station on Charlotte street. The horse started suddenly and Gibbons fell off backwards, landing heavily on his right shoulder and side. When picked up he was unconscious. Several ribs are broken and he is internally injured.

Section Foreman J. Smith of the C. P. R., met a horrible death Friday. He was travelling along on a hand car and about two miles east of Brownville, in a rock cutting, he met a freight train going in the opposite direction. He had no time to get out of the way and before he had hardly time to realize what happened, the freight crushed into him. He was of course instantly killed, his body being terribly cut up. Supt. Van Zile left on the Montreal express last night to investigate the sad affair.

Saturday morning Sarah Martin the thirteen year old step daughter of Robert Stewart, St. John, was seriously, if not fatally burned. She was raising the cover of a stove when the flames set fire to her dress and before they were extinguished she was badly burned about the neck and body. She was moved to the General Public Hospital and was resting easy. At an early hour Monday, her condition was considered precarious.

The American Bobbin, Spool and Shuttle company, of Boston, are about starting business on an extensive scale on the North Shore. They have purchased large tracts of land on the Sugary, back of Newcastle, and will operate a large number of portable mills cutting lumber into squares. Next spring they will build an extensive factory at Newcastle and also contemplate purchasing the Piccadilly factory in Kings County. The company is a large one, having twenty-eight factories in the United States.

Walter Thomas, 52 years of age, left the home of his brother, Wm. Thomas, at Bocabec, on the first of August, and said that he was going to St. George. As none of his friends have heard anything from or about him since, they fear that some mishap has befallen him.

#### Nova Scotia

Wednesday morning the body of Edwin G. Potter, of the firm of Potter Bros., Annapolis, was found on the flats back of the garrison at Annapolis. He had evidently fallen off a dilapidated wharf the night before and had been drowned. The coroner's jury said "Accidental drowning."

A Kentville despatch says: The steamer Washington, Salvagee, master, arrived at Kingsport, N. S., on Saturday, from Havana, to load potatoes for that port. This will be her third trip since September. Twelve loads of potatoes have gone from this port and vicinity since September, all for Havana. The shipments amount to seventy-five thousand bushels.

D. Wilson of Mapleton, Cumberland Co., N. S., has gathered his cabbage harvest. He raised this year 6,000 heads. After supplying his customers he will manufacture sauerkraut by the barrel for the market. Mr. Wilson's success in cabbage raising is phenomenal. Not one of the various cabbage enemies of the insect world but his inventive genius has found an exterminator for it.

A find of gold is reported from Peverill's mills, Bedford. A find is also reported to have been made at Wagamankook, Middle River, C. B., and an American gentleman has taken out 150 acres there, other areas having been taken by other parties. Mining operations have been begun there and a large staff of men are at work.

The governors of the Montreal hospital have decided against admitting ladies to the chemical lectures of the institute.

Wednesday night a large mob of French students attacked the French Baptist church, in which an ex-priest was delivering an address on "How he came to leave the Church of Rome." The students entered the church and scattered assafoetida over the floor. The stench was unbearable. They stopped the service and would have committed violence had not a large body of police broke in upon them. Two arrests were made. When the students got outside the police charged them with drawn batons and eventually drove them off.

A couple of dealers stated on Saturday that they believed the yield would run up to thirty million bushels. The C. P. R. is sending out a train load of grain almost every hour.

The inland revenue receipts for October show an increase of upwards of twenty per cent over October of last year.

The statements published regarding hog cholera in Ontario are grossly exaggerated. Very few cases have occurred, and in all instances prompt measures were taken by the department of agriculture to stamp out the disease.

The dry goods store of Blais & LeFebvre, Notre Dame street lower town, Quebec, was burned Thursday the second story of the building was occupied as a boarding house by Messrs Potvin. Several boarders, who were in bed had hardly time to escape. The total damage was between \$30,000 to \$40,000.

Owing to the lowness of the water in the St. Lawrence, the Montreal city fire engine had to be brought into requisition to pump water to operate the Hudson cotton mills and prevent 1,000 hands being thrown out of employment.

The monument erected by the Quebec citizens to Major Short and Sergeant Walleck who lost their lives through the premature explosion of two barrels of gunpowder while they were blowing up the buildings in the left fire of 89 was unveiled by Mayor Fremont.

The figures of the census taken in Toronto by the police force at the instance of the municipal authorities give the population as 188,914. The figures of Dominion census for Toronto were 181,220. The municipal census therefore shows an increase over these figures of 7,694.

A correspondent in the P. E. I. Examiner says there is less drinking in Charlottetown than in any other city of its size in the Dominion. Then God help the cities. Some of us used to think it was bad enough there when they had the Scott Act, and it is doubly as bad now.

#### United States

Within the past few days a number of lumbermen have been in Bangor making arrangements for their winter's business. The cut this year will be about three-fourths as large as last winter, and when one imagines that nearly 60,000,000 feet was cut, this winter's business seems pretty small.

The outlook for a profitable business, even with the smallest operators, is not good and many of them cannot fully settle in their minds whether to operate or not. During the past summer the lumber market has been very dull and only those who sold their last winter's logs early in the season have made any money.

M. M. Keaton's plaining mill, door, sash and blind factory at Houlton was burned at two o'clock Sunday morning. Loss \$2,500, no insurance. The workmen lost their tools. There were many orders in for work and the loss comes in a hard time of year.

#### British and Foreign.

Influenza is raging in Posen and many deaths are already reported. Influenza has also appeared in the northern suburbs of Berlin, and already the cases are numerous.

Here is a fact to pick on. Eleven gentlemen met recently at lunch at Shanghai, and finding that all were total abstainers, compared experiences. They had each lived in the trying temperature of North China for from 25 to 35 years, and not one of them had once been sick from climatic cause.

The parliament of South Australia has appropriated \$25,000 to purchase land near Peterburg for workingmen's homes. The free education bill, championed by labor organization, has been carried by two-thirds majority.

Two hundred families were rendered homeless Thursday morning by a tenement house fire in the east of London. One woman died in the street from exposure.

Acts of brigandage by men rendered desperate by hunger are increasing in Russia. In Kazan, Koursk, and Voronezh marauding peasants are plundering freight trains and sacking farms and residences. Starving people devour any refuse they can find. The mortality among children from typhus fever and hunger is frightful.

LARGE CITIES. London is the largest city in the world, with its population of over 5,000,000 souls, concentrated within an area of one hundred and eighteen square miles. To the acre it has only an average of eleven persons, the same as Chicago, while Philadelphia has twelve, Brooklyn forty-three, and New York fifty-nine. For an old city, London is but sparsely populated, which fact contributes largely to its general healthfulness. Its numerous parks and squares are a wonderful advantage to the people. This is seen in its low death-rate—17.5 per 1,000 of the population. This is a better showing than either of our four largest cities makes, the rate for Chicago being 19.16, Philadelphia 20.7, Brooklyn 24.3, and New York 26.6. In fact very few American cities can show as low a death-rate as London.
