**CLARK'S HARBOR, N. S.**—Sunday, Sept. 20th, was a good day. 213 were in the S. School, 175 at the morning service, and 350 at the evening service. At the prayer meeting the previous Saturday evening a number rose for prayer.

**FROM REV. J. J. BARNES.**—It will, probably, be interesting to your numerous readers to hear from the First District again. Well, God is blessing us here, and we are prospering. Our cause along the upper St. John River moves steadily ahead. We have been unusually busy this year in the labor of finishing and furnishing two of our meeting houses, notice of which you have already had. Our cause in Upper Kent has revived very much during the present year. We are now planning to build a meeting house there; the Fitzherbert Meeting house still stands, but is unfit for use; it is the oldest house in the community. We are seeking to get a room in a private house to occupy till we can build a meeting house. In years long gone by, when our much honored fathers (a few of whom still live) toiled, in all conditions of and in the face of all difficulties, up and down this country we had a strong, healthy and vigorous church here. During the present year we have held regular Sabbath services in a school house near Wright Settlement, two miles back of Upper Kent, which is, no doubt, among the chief causes moving our people in Upper Kent to build a house for God.

**Rev. H. Hart** is now spending a month laboring among the destitute churches of this District, in fulfillment of District Meeting appointment. He writes encouragingly of his work. He says that our people at Salmon River are building a meeting house. May God bless and prosper them in this noble undertaking.

At Rowena, V. Co., on the Tobique, the Lord has marvelously blessed us of late. A revival of religion, having its starting place in a prayer meeting conducted by Bro. Henry Boone, has spread to the adjoining settlements.

On hearing about this good work I laid aside my duties at home and went to aid Bro. Boone. As the interest went forward and spread to other settlements I thought of our Lord's parable of the "Mustard Seed." On Sabbath of the 6th inst. I baptized nine persons, and organized a church with 14 members. On Sabbath 13th, I baptized 5 more, and the church was increased to 21 members, the most of whom are heads of families. The church is well organized, and among the strongest in the District. I turned away from this good work much against my own will and the earnest invitations of the people to remain and continue the labor in the adjoining settlements, to which the interest had already extended. But I could no longer remain without much loss to my churches at home.

Bro. S. J. Perry, on his way to Tobique, spent a few days with me and rendered valuable aid. Bro. Perry is delighted with the agricultural aspect of this part of V. Co., and has decided that, in the event of his moving his family to this section, he will purchase a farm, probably in Tilley, which is said to be the best farming district in the Province.

Our people in Rowena are now talking about building a meeting house. They have exceptionally good facilities for building. The village, a thriving place, is growing around a good saw mill, superintended by Bro. H. Boone, deacon of the church. It is advantageously and pleasantly situated, on the bank of Tobique river about four miles from the St. John river, and

hard by the T. V. Railway. On one side of the village is Finnermore Settlement, a thriving farming district; on the other side is Tilley, divided into north and south ranges. Persons thinking of settling on farms in Tilley should be about it at once, as the place is rapidly filling up.

**FOURTH DISTRICT MEETING.**—This meeting was held with the Patterson Settlement church, Sunbury Co., commencing Saturday, Sept. 13th 1891. The conference meeting Saturday morning was led by the pastor, Rev. W. H. Perry. There were also present Revs. J. G. McKenzie, J. T. Parsons, G. F. Currie, G. W. Foster and A. H. McLeod and church licentiate I. Lewis, a good number of delegates and others from the various churches of the District. The meeting was one of encouragement and strength, a large number testifying to the goodness of Christ and their determination to prosecute the christian journey. A number of aged people—fathers and mothers in Israel—gave expression to their firm faith in Christ as their "all in all," declaring that the "path of the just shinneth more and more unto the perfect day." All felt "it was good to be here."

At 2 p. m. the business session commenced. The weather being all that could be desired, the house was well filled to hear the reports of the churches.

There are in the District fifteen churches, all in Sunbury Co., except Upper Gagetown in Queens Co. Of the fifteen churches twelve reported by letter. Nine have had pastoral care a whole or part of the time. Nine have had regular prayer and conference meetings; there were added by baptism 58, by letter 5; the net increase 17; money raised for support of ministry \$1036.11, for church improvements \$1160.05, for church expenses \$124.76, for Home missions \$17.00 Foreign Missions \$40.83, Sundries \$199.64, Total \$2478.39.

At 7 p. m. the Woman's Foreign Mission Society held its annual session. The President, Mrs. Dr. Secord, occupied the chair. After singing, and reading of scriptures, prayer was offered by Mrs. W. Patterson. The report of the Secretary, Mrs. J. W. Hoyt, was adopted and encouraging speeches made commending the ladies and their work by Revs. G. W. Foster, G. F. Currie, W. H. Perry, A. H. McLeod, J. G. McKenzie and J. T. Parsons, and licentiate I. Lewis. A generous collection was taken, and an impressive mission meeting brought to a close.

On Sabbath a prayer and social meeting was held at 9 a. m. Many testimonies, interspersed with songs of praise, occupied the time till the preaching hour.

The house was filled to overflowing to hear Rev. J. T. Parsons. His discourse was clear and persuasive. At 3 p. m. Rev. J. G. McKenzie preached an earnest and inviting sermon, after which the ordinance of the Lord's Supper was administered to quite a large number of communicants. At 7 p. m. Rev. G. F. Currie preached a practical and profitable sermon to an appreciative audience, after which a number of testimonies were given. All the services of the day were interesting and profitable. There was also preaching at Blissville in the morning by Rev. G. W. Foster, and in the evening by Rev. J. T. Parsons, and at Mill Settlement at 3 p. m. by Rev. A. H. McLeod.

Business session convened at 9 a. m. Monday, Rev. W. H. Perry in the chair. The meeting being duly opened Rev. G. W. Foster was elected chairman for the ensuing year. A committee appointed to summarize the church reports submitted a report which evoked a lengthy discussion, and many valuable remarks were made by ministers and laymen. The committee in their report congratulated the District upon its healthy condition and that so many churches sent delegates to District Meeting; they recommended the churches to make earnest effort to secure regular pastoral care, and also earnestly urged the necessity of Sabbath Schools sending their reports to District Meeting as required by Conference. After appointing committees and hearing reports of committees, meeting adjourned to meet at 2 p. m.

The afternoon session was opened by singing and prayer. The meeting went into committee of the whole on correspondence in a matter of difficulty in the Blissville Church, and we trust the matter has been amicably settled.

The committee of the whole on licentiate referred Bro. I. Lewis to his church to use its discretion as to relicensure. A vote of thanks was tendered the people of the place for their kindness, and the hospitable manner in which they entertained the District Meeting. Thus closed an important and interesting

meeting, the next annual session to be held with the church at Lincoln, Sunbury Co., on the second Saturday in September 1892.

**THIRD DISTRICT MEETING.**—The annual meeting of the Third District was held at Bear Island, commencing at 2 p. m. Friday 18th inst. The ministers present during the session were, Revs. Jos. McLeod, F. C. Hartley, A. H. Bonnell and A. G. Downey, and Licentiate R. W. Carpenter and A. W. Currie. Rev. F. C. Hartley was made chairman. Reports were received from nine churches. A committee appointed last year to visit Upper Hainesville church, report ed having attended to the work assigned, and with good effect. Rev. Jos. McLeod made report of visits to certain churches at the request of the D. Meeting a year ago. The summary of church reports did not present a very cheering statement. Five pastors had been at work during the year; the number added by baptism was 28; the net gain in the nine churches reported was two; what showing would be made by the twelve churches not reported can only be conjectured.

There was some discussion of the situation, and a committee was appointed to consider and, if necessary and possible, assist in such rearrangement of pastorates as will assure care to all the churches. A report from a committee on temperance, appointed last year, was submitted and adopted. A resolution based on the report, was moved but was not voted on, the D. M. adjourning before a vote could be taken. There was preaching Friday evening by Rev. F. C. Hartley. Saturday afternoon there was a largely attended conference meeting. It was a season of much interest, a very large number participating. Saturday evening there was a mission meeting. The pastor, Bro. A. W. Currie, presided, and addresses were made by Revs. Jos. McLeod, A. G. Downey, H. A. Bonnell and Licentiate R. W. Carpenter. There was a full house, and attentive listening, and it is hoped the mission cause was helped. Sunday was a beautiful day, and large congregations assembled. Prayer meeting at 9:30 a. m. The preaching services were, at 10:30, Rev. Jos. McLeod; 3 p. m. Rev. A. G. Downey; 7 p. m. Rev. H. A. Bonnell. The Lord's Supper was administered in the afternoon. The choir did its part well through the session. The hospitality of the people was equal to the large demands upon it. The next annual session will be held at Stanley, at 2 p. m. The social conference of the session will be Saturday at 2:30 p. m.
