Parliament.

The railway subsidy bill passed through committee and was read a third time. The bill for the transfer of certain public property to provincial governments went through committee and its third reading.

The controversial elections bill also passed through committee. Sir John Thompson moved an address to her majesty setting forth the necessity for the absolute control by the Canadian parliament of the subject of Canadian copyright; and praying that immediate effect be given to the Canadian copyright act, 1889, and that imperial legislation be adopted to remove all doubts as to full control by the Canadian parliament of the subject in so far as the Canadian people are concerned.

Sir John Thompson moved that Thomas McGreevy, having been found guilty of contempt of authority of the house in having failed to attend in his place, and having been judged guilty of the offences charged against him in May last, be expelled from the house. The motion was carried without any remarks.

Sir John then moved that the speaker issue his warrant for a writ for a new election in Quebec West. The motion was adopted without discussion.

Supplementary estimates for the extra indemnity of \$500 each to members and senators passed unanimously. All the measures indicated in the governor's opening speech have been carried through.

Prorogation took place at 3.30 p. m. Wednesday. The Governor General's address in proroguing Parliament contained the following paragraphs: An agreement was made in June last between Great Britain and the United States for the practical cessation of seal fishing in Behring Sea during the past season for the benefit of the protection of seal life pending an investigation by experts, in which this country has taken part, into the question of the necessity of measures for preventing its extinction. The report of the experts has not yet been received and the negotiations for the settlement of the questions which have arisen on the subject are pending, but are still incomplete.

Notwithstanding that the result of the census shows a less important increase in population than was expected it is satisfactory to observe the evidence of the general prosperity of the country, and the beautiful harvest with which Providence has blessed us this year will give a fresh impetus to the settlement of the Northwest and to the enterprise and industries of the country generally.

The extensive frauds upon the government by a group of contractors and the irregularities of certain persons in the civil service, which have been discovered in investigations by your committees, are much to be regretted. The punishment with which many of them have already been visited, the steps which are to be taken in regard to others, and the operation of the statute you have passed for their repression in future, will, I trust, have the effect of preventing their recurrence, and it is the intention of my ministers to procure the issue of a commission to investigate the organization of the civil service and report as to measures for its improvement.

The question of the restriction or prohibition of the liquor traffic has also been occupying the attention of my ministers, and a commission will issue during recess to enquire into and report upon this important subject.

News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Daniel Desmond, who struck Paul Lacombe at Campbellton with a stick from the effects of which he died, is charged with manslaughter.

Hon. Richard Hutchinson, for many years an extensive lumber merchant in Northumberland Co., and twice a member of Parliament, died last week, at the age of 80. He was a highly esteemed man.

Fanning and McRoberts, charged with assault and robbery of Robert Moore in St. John were tried before Judge Peters last week, under the speedy trials act. Fanning was sentenced to five years' imprisonment and McRoberts to three years.

It is stated that the receipts of the St. John exhibition will meet the expenditure.

At Doaktown on Tuesday last the house of Mrs. N. Freeze was burned. No insurance.

An old house near Welsford, owned by Hazen Crozier, was destroyed by fire last week. A sty and a number of pigs were burned.

The Fredericton Boom company's rafting returns show 115,250,000 feet of lumber to have been rafted during the season of sixteen weeks—the quickest work ever done on the river. Between four and five millions of the corporation drive has not yet reached the booms, and large crews are at work endeavoring to get it down. This, when it comes, will be rafted at the Glazier booms.

K. D. C. has been awarded a Silver Medal at the Jamaica Exhibition (the highest award for any medicine). Its merits prove its greatness.

The notorious Cook house on the Shediac road, about six miles from Moncton, was burned to the ground Wednesday.

At the Sussex Camp, Capt. Hemming's tent was entered Wednesday night by some one who broke open a bureau drawer and stole a cash box containing a check for \$83.33, one for \$13.67; also about \$50 in cash.

John Bain, a well known and much respected farmer of Flat Lands, near Campbellton, committed suicide by hanging.

Fire from sparks from burning sawdust at a mill set fire to James Kilam's dwelling house at Notre Dame on the line of the Buctouche and Moncton railway. It was a total loss. No insurance.

The checks stolen from the tent of Capt. Hemming, with a portion of the money was recovered in the field just outside the camp. Of the fifty dollars stolen forty was found in the box.

A shocking death occurred at a party Friday evening, given by Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Arnold to the officers in camp at Sussex. Mrs. Suratt, a widow from Boston, asked her partner to stop dancing and walked with him from the parlors into the hall, where she fell to the floor, dying almost instantly.

Nova Scotia.

The Nova Scotia provincial exhibition opened in Halifax Monday. The exhibit of live stock is much the best and largest ever seen in Nova Scotia.

Wednesday night fire broke out in Merlin's planing mill, near Canard's wharf, Halifax, and spread rapidly among the wooden warehouses to the south and over the wharves and shipping. Within an hour the planing mill, Wilson's blacksmith shop, John Taylor & Co's fish warehouse (filled with pickled fish) Brookfield Bros' lumber warehouse and yards, all on Taylor's and Brookfield's wharves were destroyed. Meanwhile the fire had spread to Liverpool wharf on the north and burned out Butler's spar yard, B. Swarston Miller's agent; the Halifax broom factory, J. B. Neilly & Co., commission merchants, and Shafner Bros., oil dealers. Large quantities of petroleum were stored on this wharf and there were great fears of an explosion. This was prevented by rolling the oil into the dock. The fire spread simultaneously to the South wharf and soon the immense fish warehouse of John Taylor & Co. was a prey to the flames. A score of schooners at the burning wharves and those to the north were quickly moved out into the harbor.

In addition to those mentioned the following are burned out: Shafner & Adams, sailmakers; John Cronan, grocer; C. E. Creighton, & Co., wholesale grocers; Miss M. A. Regan, variety store; Hannah Kent's residence; J. Forbes, fancy goods; Robert Carson, jeweler; John E. Butler; T. A. S. DeWolfe's Son; John Brommit's residence; Henry McNeil, variety store; William Castel, hair dresser; Mrs. Mary J. Morley, variety shop; American Metal company's office; T. J. Mulchey, cooper; Edward Heany, residence; John V. May, variety store; Mrs. Mary Reach, grocer; The wharf and stores of J. T. & A. W. West, West India merchants; Donald D. Walter, boarding house; Abraham Young and Peter Rioux, variety. The troops in the garrison did splendid work. The Royal Engineers were blowing up buildings to stay the spread of the flames. It is impossible at this time to make an accurate estimate of the damage done, but it is supposed to amount to about \$250,000, with insurance amounting to about \$125,000.

K. D. C. diffuses new life and vigor throughout the entire system.

St. Paul's Episcopal church at Londonderry caught fire Wednesday and was burned down. The rectory was saved with difficulty.

The new steel bridge of 140 span, across Salmon river at Murray's siding on the I. C. R., was open for traffic on Monday.

In Halifax, on Wednesday, a one-year-old girl, child of George Power, was drowned in a tub of water. Its mother was washing up the kitchen and she went out to look for another child on the street, leaving the infant. On her return it was lying in the wash-tub beneath the water, dead.

The Annapolis apple evaporator is running full blast. There are about fifty hands at work.

By the collision of two teams on Granville street, Halifax, Saturday morning, Mrs. Sydney Shatford was very seriously injured.

Some work is still being done on the Chignecto ship railway. Sleepers are being removed and new ones are being laid on the line of rail.

The Morrison foundry at Stellarton was burned Sunday morning. Loss about \$30,000.

A hunting party in Queens, N. S., killed three moose one day last week, one of which weighed 700 lbs when dressed.

A brick of gold weighing over 65 ounces the result of about fifteen days work, was the clean up at the Rossignol Mine, Whiteburn, N. S. last week.

Other Provinces.

R. N. O'Brien, who was tried in Montreal on a charge of libelling Prince George of Wales by representing that Prince George went on a debauch, was found guilty. Counsel for the prosecution announced that as public justice had been vindicated the crown would agree to a suspension of sentence, and O'Brien was released.

It is reported that the Canadian tug Bertha Endris left Sault Ste Marie Monday night for Michipicoten, with a crew of five men and a large amount of machinery. When off Point Iriquois the tug foundered and all on board were drowned. All lived in Canada.

There are twelve cases of small pox at Carleton on the Baie des Chaleurs.

Last week a large party of farmers from South Dakota arrived in Manitoba bringing their stock and effects with them. They are but the advance guard of a great many others, who are still to come.

A Winnipeg despatch says, the last two weeks in September show that 450,000 bushels of new wheat have been sold and delivered in elevators along the line of railway. Only 250,000 bushels was the quantity moved during the same period last year.

A serious form of diphtheria is spreading very alarmingly in Quebec and neighborhood. Local papers are calling attention to the critical situation, and imploring health authorities to act promptly.

In Belleville, Ont., last week Mayor Porter was fined \$100 and sentenced to one day's imprisonment for personating voters at the last dominion general election.

Judges Jette, Baby and Davidson have accepted the position of royal commissioners to investigate the Baie de Chaleurs scandal.

A tragic ship wreck is reported from Exploit, Newfoundland. The schooner Blossom, Capt. John Marsh, was returning from Labrador, when the vessel struck Gull Island. She rebounded, struck a second time and broke in two. Five men and one woman were on board. One man jumped and clung to a cliff against which he was dashed. He was rescued next morning but the remainder were drowned.

Shipments of produce from P. E. Island are unusually heavy. The crops are turning out equal to the most sanguine expectations, and prices are up to the average.

United States.

Six boxes of giant powder exploded in a hoisting house at Ground Squirrel mine, Butte, Mont., Friday evening. Fifty houses were more or less damaged. Several persons were injured, three fatally.

The orange crop of Florida is of the very best quality. It will amount to between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 baskets, and the price will be extremely low.

A terrible prairie fire has swept along the Missouri river and the west of it burning over a strip 300 miles long and 100 miles wide. An immense amount of property was destroyed.

A general strike of railroad coal miners at Pittsburg district is inaugurated. It is estimated that close upon 10,000 men quit work.

Forest fires in parts of Minnesota have destroyed much timber land.

As he did not return, his parents began a search. They found the cow, with the tether on her head, the end being tied around the boy's waist. It is supposed he tied the rope around his waist in play and the cow taking fright at something, ran away, and dragged him to death.

Will Silverstone, a young man of Calais, started to walk from Yonkers to his home in company with Jack Seroy, also of Calais. When at Beaches meadow Silverstone complained of sudden illness and died on the roadside within a few minutes. He had been drinking heavily.

A fire consumed the finishing and stone sheds of Gross Bros., marble quarry, Lee. In the building was stored 1,000 finished headstones which are practically ruined. The loss is estimated at \$15,000; insurance small.

It was snowing in Montana last week.

The heaviest fire ever known in Machias, Me., started Wednesday, on Donworth wharf. Four million feet of lumber, mostly valuable dry pine boards, and two tenements were burned. Four families were burned out.

Reports of extremely low water come from all along the Kennebec river, and the drouth has now reached a point where it is serious. In Bath the city supply has been practically exhausted and steam fire engines are kept constantly ready for use in case of fire. Farmers are everywhere hauling water for their stock.

In Danbury, Conn., W. A. Anderson & Co.'s grain elevator was burned a few days ago. The fire originated from spontaneous combustion. Loss \$21,000; insurance, \$15,000.

British and Foreign.

The Turkish barque "Figi" from Hamburg, was wrecked 160 miles from Melbourne, and 11 out of 26 persons on board were lost.

The distress among the Russian peasantry is increasing. Potatoes are failing in many districts, and a new insect known as the zooka, more destructive to corn than the Hessian fly has appeared. The whole population of some villages in Astrachan are dying of starvation. The doctors prescribe corn instead of medicine. There are stories afloat of parents eating their children at Nijni Novgorod.

A tribal war is reported to be raging on some of New Hebrides Islands, and cannibalism, it is stated, flourishes in consequence.

Gen. Boulanger committed suicide in Brussels on Wednesday.

From most of the Turkish provinces abundant harvests are reported, especially in those in Asia Minor.

A serious epidemic of influenza prevails at Melbourne.

The fact that Russian papers are devoid of news about the famine is a bad sign. The intensity of distress may be judged from the fact that in many places the elementary schools have been closed on account of the lack of funds.

Chinese advices say that terrible hail storms occurred in parts of Hang Chow, doing great damage. One village had every house levelled to the ground. Heavy rains and cyclone at Shanghai early in September unroofed houses and blew down trees. Five lives were lost. A terrible fire occurred at Chung King and another at Nankin. Over 110 of the best shops in Nankin were destroyed.

An attempt was made Wednesday night to blow up a railroad bridge near Reichenberg, across which a train bearing the Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, was to pass.
