

work, the missionaries of the society distributed by sale and gift 7,447 Bibles and 11,214 testaments. They made 49,460 visits to families for religious conversation and prayer, and delivered 14,003 addresses. Between 4,000 and 5,000 persons professed conversion in connection with the evangelistic services conducted by these earnest and faithful men, and at least 130 churches have been developed from the Sunday-schools established by them, while regular preaching services have been inaugurated in many other places as an outgrowth of this Sunday-school work.

REVIVALS.

Nearly 1,000 conversions are reported as the result of Evangelist C. H. Yatman's special work in Denver.

Forty-three boys between the ages of twelve and sixteen, under the influence of the Young Men's Christian Association of Hartford, have declared their intention to lead Christian lives.

The most remarkable revival that Cleveland, O., has ever known has been going forward for some weeks under the direction of Evangelist Mills. It will be remembered that Dr. Pentecost conducted a series of fruitful evangelistic meetings in that city some years ago, but the results of the present revival are said far to exceed that of the Pentecost movement. Upward of seven thousand persons, it is said, have signed cards announcing their purpose to become Christians.

REV. A. H. BONNELL, of Southampton, was in the city last week. He had been making a brief visit to Russia. He reports the interest in his field as fairly good, gaining somewhat.

MELBOURNE, Australia, has increased rapidly in population in ten years. The late census returns show a population of 489,000 as compared with 283,000 in 1881. This increase of 206,000 inhabitants in ten years gives the title of "Marvellous" Melbourne some point.

THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY falling on Sunday, Monday 25th inst. has been proclaimed a public holiday.

ANOTHER SENATOR, Hon. E. Leonard, died last week. He was a Liberal in politics, was seventy-seven years old, and his home was in London, Ont.

WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE.—The Nova Scotia Legislature has rejected the bill for the enfranchisement of women. Thirteen members voted in favour of it.

DIED IN AFRICA.—Rev. Arthur Hoadley, for some time rector of St. George's church, Moncton, died March 20th, in Africa, where he was a missionary.

PROMINENT MEN SICK.—A number of members of Parliament are reported sick in Ottawa—a larger number than usual. Among them are Sir John A. Macdonald and Hon. Mr. Laurier. The Prince of Wales is suffering from La Grippe.

Secretary Blaine is quite ill.

Mr. Gladstone has been confined to his house with La Grippe.

MRS. CLARK, widow of the late Deacon George Clark, of Hampstead, Q. Co., and mother of Rev. J. W. Clark, with whom she has had her home for several years, died on Thursday last. The funeral took place at Hampstead, her old home, on Sunday. We have not heard the particulars of her last illness, but presume it was brief, though for a long time she had been quite feeble. She was a woman of undoubted piety; she said little, but loved God and his people much. She was beloved by those who knew her for her many christian excellencies.

THE ACCOUNTS of the attempt on the life of the Czarevitch in Japan say that it was due entirely to religious fanaticism; that it was either a Buddhist protest against the increase of Russian missions, or that the Czarevitch omitted observance of customary rules of etiquette while visiting the temples, and so made himself an object of attack.

Later reports attribute the attempted assassination to the nihilists. It is also said the injury to the Czarevitch is not so trifling as at first reported.

A NEW METHOD.—A Moscow dentist, report says, claims to have discovered a method of supplying the human mouth with false teeth which will grow into the gums as firmly as natural ones. Dr. Znamensky has performed several successful operations on dogs as well as human beings. The teeth are made of gutta percha, porcelain or metal.

Holes are made at the root of the false tooth and also upward into the jaw. The tooth is then placed into the cavity. In a short time a soft granulated growth finds its way from the patient's jaw into the holes in the tooth; this growth gradually hardens and holds the tooth in position.

THE LYMPH.—The New York Academy of medicine, which has been experimenting with Koch's lymph, has reported the results of the investigations. One of the members, summing up all the reports, says:

"In the lymph we have an agent which can do good and very great harm. We may conclude that it requires care in its use, as well as more experience with it. I am fully of the opinion that it is going to take a prominent place in the treatment of tuberculosis, and that it is going to save more lives imperilled by that disease than any other agent. Still it may kill more lives than it saves if we use it recklessly."

THE MARRIAGE RATE in England, according to the London Telegraph, is steadily increasing. In 1890, 445,376 persons entered the bonds of matrimony, which number was 17,646 more than in the previous twelvemonth. The Registrar-General assumes the mean population of England and Wales for the year to have been 29,407,649, and on this basis the marriage rate would be 15.1 per 1,000 of the population, the highest ratio since 1883. The increase of late years has distinctly kept pace with the improvement of trade. In the balmy days of 1873 the marriage rate rose to 17.6. The number of births in 1890 was 18,429 below the previous year, the proportion to population being the lowest recorded for the last fifty years.

TALMAGE'S CHURCH.—If the people of the Brooklyn Tabernacle are to be felicitated on having such a popular preacher as Dr. Talmage, he can hardly be congratulated on the church he has gathered. Dr. Talmage has forgone his salary for a year and contributed largely for the new edifice, and yet the Tabernacle was opened with a debt of \$250,000, and only \$22,000 was pledged at the dedication services. No church has had so much mystery and notoriety about its finances as the Tabernacle. While other churches could erect their immense and costly houses without any annoyance to the public there has been in the history of three Tabernacles frequent episodes of financial unpleasantness. Over \$15,000 was subscribed at the dedication by about thirty people, so that it must be that the great membership of over 4,000 gave less than \$7,000. If Dr. Talmage would now preach a course of sermons to his people on giving he would certainly present them a portion of meat in due season. But it is to be feared that it would not suit their digestion.—N. Y. Inquirer.

BARON HIRSCH, a very wealthy Jew, has determined to give \$3,000,000 as the beginning of an immense fund to take the Jews out of Russia and settle them in some new country, such as Australia or Brazil. The arrangements for this modern Exodus are said to be in full train, and it is expected that the Rothschilds and other wealthy families will join in this tremendous scheme for the benefit of their persecuted kinsmen.

MAPPING THE WORLD.—Almost the whole of Europe has been covered by exact surveys. Even in the Balkan states, where the easy going and unscientific Turk has done almost nothing to map the country that was long under his control, the work has been done for him by the enterprise of the Russians, Austrians and Germans, who naturally have taken a very great interest in mapping this mountainous and debatable quarter of Europe, says Goldthwaite's Geographical Magazine. The first country on the continent to undertake these minute surveys was France, 1750, and the work has steadily progressed in various countries until almost the whole of Europe has been mapped in beautiful and elaborate detail. We find, however, that in a large part of Scandinavia, Spain and eastern Russia mapmakers have not yet the advantage of these detailed surveys.

Last year there were 1,076 persons killed on the railways of the United Kingdom. The number for the previous year was exactly the same. . . . London is roughly supposed to contain 250,000 persons belonging to the criminal classes.

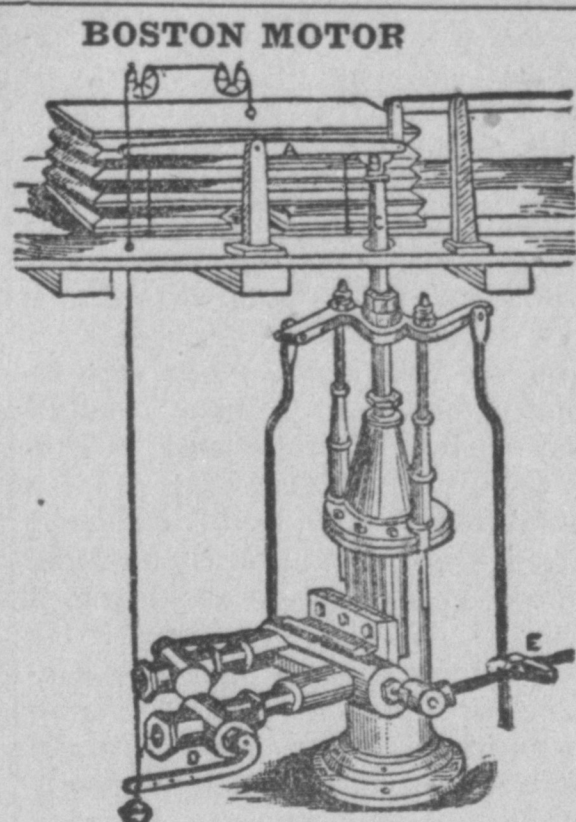
