News of the Week.

New Brunswick

Bart. Pulk, aged 22, was drowned at the ledge St. Stephen, last week, by his boat capsizing.

On Wednesday the four-years-old son of Mr. Fred W. Blizard, St. John, fell backwards into a pail of boiling water, and was so badly scalded that he died in a few hours.

All the lumbermen have come out of the woods on the upper St. John. Robert Connors reports the cut as a good one.

W. A. Quinn, engraving clerk of the house of assembly, died Tuesday afternoon of inflammation of the bowels. He had been ill but a few days. (He leaves a widow and one son.)

The recent attempts to fire one of the Mount Allison buildings have been traced to a theological student named Warman, who is suffering from temporary mental derangement, resulting from a severe attack of grippe. The afflicted young man sustained the highest character, and much sympathy is felt for him.

The St. John Custom house is to be rebuilt immediately, and the cost will not exceed \$100,000.

The annual meeting of the St. John River Log Driving company was held in this city, Wednesday, Wm. Murray was re-elected president and Fraser Gregory, secretary, with Geo. E. Dunn, Charles F. Woodman, Frank Stetson and Robert Connors directors. The driving will again be done by Fred Moore, the contract entered into by him last year being for four years.

The Carleton Co. election last Wednesday resulted in the return of Dr. Colter, by a majority of 256.

Joseph Parchat was killed Wednesday while working on a brow of logs in Coy Brook, Chipman, Queen's Co. He was twenty years old.

An unoccupied building near Hampton station, owned by Brunswick Belyea, was burned to the ground Wednesday night. A small woodshed in the rear of the jail was also destroyed. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary. No insurance.

The dwelling house on the farm a Douglas, owned by Dr. Brown of this city, was burned to the ground Friday.

Mayor Peters, of St. John, was re-elected without opposition on Saturday.

A house at Little River, Albert county, owned by Thomas Donwright, was totally destroyed by fire last week. No insurance.

The Nashwaak ice went out last week, and carried with it about half a million feet of lumber belonging to Alex. Gibson.

The highway bridge across the river at Woodstock came to its long expected end Friday. The second pier from Woodstock shore and located in the centre of the river channel, from the pressure of ice against it, capsized and tore away the two largest spans, which floated away. F. H. Hale, Jerry Bredon, Wentworth Dalling and Davis Phillips narrowly escaped being in the wreck.

Nova Scotia.

A report is in circulation that a man living near Bull's Run on the Liverpool post road, Lunenburg county, N. S., had beaten his son so badly one day last week that he only lived two days after this inhuman treatment.

There is some talk of the Nova Scotia Central Railway extending its line from Middleton to Margareville, N. S.

Geo. Skeffington, I. C. R. police inspector, has entered an action for \$5,000 damages against S. S. McKenzie of the New Glasgow Eastern Chronicle for slander.

Joseph E. Eaton, aged 53, postmaster at Kentville, N. S., retired Wednesday night in the best of health and spirits, but before daybreak he was a corpse; death was caused by the bursting of a blood vessel in the head. He leaves a wife, two sons and three daughters.

It has been decided to make the Leicestershire regiment at Halifax over 1,000 strong. A request has been sent to the Horse Guards for 200 men. They are expected to arrive here in May.

Other Provinces.

The Legislative Council of P. E. I., has been abolished, the abolition to take effect at the dissolution of the present Legislature.

Thursday a man named Alfred Luaignau was trampled to death on the street in Montreal, by a drove of cattle he was taking to the abattoir.

In the Ontario legislature the bill providing for the admission of women to the study and practice of law in the province was carried by a vote of 41 to 40.

The Canadian Pacific railway has notified its agents all along the lines of that road not to accept any more grain for Montreal for storage. Almost 2,000,000 bushels are stored here.

The Manitoba government has introduced a redistribution bill. It increases the representation from 38 seats to 40. The redistribution is based entirely on the system of representation by population.

A despatch from Sudbury, Ont., says that a powerful French syndicate has been organized for the purpose of acquiring nickel lands in Algoma and establishing thereon large refining works, where nickel steel will be manufactured on a large scale.

Horace Haz, out on a shooting expedition, near Masog, Quebec, prematurely discharged his gun. The charge struck a younger brother, Charlie, passing through his heart and killing him instantly. Overcome with grief, Horace attempted to take his own life, but was prevented from doing so by his companions.

About ten years ago diphtheria visited the house of Mr. John McArthur, of West River, P. E. I., and took from him all his children six in number. Last month that dread disease again entered Mr. McArthur's home. Three little ones were again found within, and in ten days they were all in the churchyard with the other six.

At St. Roch's church Quebec during a funeral service of a man who dropped dead, a woman left her pew to pray in one of the side chapels, but on the way she made a false step and was thrown heavily to the floor, falling on her head and literally crushing in her skull, breathing her last in a few minutes.

A London cable to the Montreal Star says: Emigration continues good. The Allan steamers have already carried 3,845 passengers to Canada this season, an increase of 823 over last year. The other lines have also an increased business. The Allan liner Sardinian, the first steamer to Quebec, carries a fine lot, mostly for Winnipeg and the west. The emigration of Germans and other foreigners was never before so excellent.

United States.

Petar Eno, a brakeman on the Boston and Maine railroad, murdered his wife, Minnie, at Lawrence, Mass., Tuesday. He met her on the street and after a short talk shot her.

In St. Paul, Wednesday morning an explosion occurred in the basement of the St. Paul White Lead and Oil Co.'s building, on Levee West, St. Paul. The building was a total loss. The stock was valued at \$60,000, the machinery at \$15,000 and the building at \$30,000.

British and Foreign.

A despatch from Caracas, Venezuela says another plot against the life of President Palacio has been discovered. The guards about his residence have been redoubled and every possible precaution taken to protect his life. Reports from the different states indicate a rapid growth of the insurrection.

In Belfast, Wednesday, Allan Spiller became enraged at his wife, battered her head into jelly. Then he cut her throat. After he killed his wife, he turned upon his two children, and struck them again and again with the hammer. Death soon ended their tortures.

British ship "Erato," from Iquique, capsized Thursday and sank at Hamburg. Fifteen persons aboard her were carried down and drowned.

The Times correspondent at Buenos Ayres says: Sac Paulo letters state that yellow fever is spreading from the coast to the interior. The European governments should strictly prohibit emigration to Brazil.

In St. Petersburg, a terrible explosion occurred at the factory for the manufacture of smokeless powder. The shock of the explosion was tremendous. The whole of the city was shaken and houses swayed on their foundations as though from the effects of an earthquake. Nine workmen were in the building, and every one of them was blown to pieces, limbs of some being found two hundred and fifty yards away from the building. Adjoining factories were greatly damaged and five workmen in them were injured.

ASTRONOMERS are practically unanimous in the belief that the immense eruptions in the sun, indicated by spots on its surface, cause storms and great electrical disturbances on the earth. They make out a sunspot cycle of about eleven or twelve years. During the period of sunspot minimum we have droughts and calms, and during the period of maximum the reverse. The Government Astronomer at Madras reports that the size and number of sunspots have been increasing for several months, and expresses the belief that the unusually prolonged period of minimum is past, and that the drought-stricken Peninsula of Hindustan will have a series of prosperous years. Prof. Rees, of Columbin College, corroborates this, and says there have recently appeared on the sun two enormous groups of spots, and so we may look out for spotty, or perhaps "measly," weather this year.—Standard.
