The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Fourth Quarter-Lesson IX—Nov. 27.

THE APOSTLES TURNING TO THE GENTILES.—Acts 13: 44-14: 7.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*I have sent thee to be a light to the Gentiles.*—Acts 13: 47.

Paul and Barnabas had reached Antioch in Asia Minor, and preached in the synagogue on the Sabbath, chiefly to Jews. His sermon made a great sensation. He was asked to preach again the next Sabbath, and a number of people became disciples of Jesus. Of course the week between was spent in more private labors to make known the Gospel.

The Gospel brings blessings to all who receive it, but excites the opposition of an evil world.

—CROWDS TO HEAR THE GOSPEL.—

Vers. 44, 45. *And the next Sabbath.* After the one in which the address of our last lesson was given. Almost the whole city was gathered together. Not only Jews and proselytes, but the heathen. During the week Paul and Barnabas would be engaged in teaching the people; and in consequence of this, the report of the new doctrine would be spread throughout the whole city, and all would be anxious to hear it. It is clear that the Jewish synagogue could not have held such a crowd, and we are led accordingly to the conclusion, either that they thronged round portals and windows while the apostles spoke within, or that the crowd gathered in some open space or piazza in which the synagogue was situated, and were addressed from its entrance.

Crowds are not success nor a proof of success. Some of the most important discourses of Jesus were spoken to one hearer or to a few. But crowds are a means of success, and render success possible. The discourses of Jesus to Nicodemus and to the woman at Sychar have been heard round the world. Some one has said that "a large Sunday-school is often a large failure." That may be, but a small one that might be large is a crime. The best of work may be done with small numbers, but not with a church or school that has not done its best to gain as many as possible to learn its blessed truths. When the Jews saw the multitudes they were filled with jealousy. Our word zeal is derived from the Greek word here used. They were boiling over with zeal for their form of religion, which filled them with indignation at the doctrines of the apostles, and jealousy of their success.

Jealousy is always a selfish feeling, and therefore base. From the difference between their own interpretations. And contradicted. Denied, argued against, which, if done in the right way and with the right spirit, was eminently proper. But the word implies not argument, but assertion and denunciation. And blasphemed. To blaspheme is here, not to take God's name in vain, but to speak evil and slanderous words. They used abusive language, calling hard names, and saying false things about the apostles.

Note. (1) It is very noticeable that a large part of the sarcasms and epigrams against other people find their point in a perversion of the truth, and their venom is the poison of a liar. (2) No weapon acts in the end more like a boomerang, injuring the one that throws it, than this of slander and abuse. The GENTILES RECEIVE THE GOSPEL: THE JEWS REJECT IT.—Vers. 46-51. Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly. The opposition, instead of daunting them, made them come out more boldly and decidedly in favor of receiving the Gentiles. It was a costly step, and required great courage. It made bitter enemies of those who could persecute them, and do them all manner of evil. It separated them from their friends and co-religionists, and joined them to Gentiles just out of their heathenism. It shut them out from a part of their work, and those who should aid them. It was necessary that the word of God should first be spoken to you. Because it was God's purpose and command; it was God's command, because the Jews were most prepared to receive the truth, by their long training under God. Judge yourselves unworthy of everlasting life. God, and the apostles for him, had invited them to eternal life, but they decided for themselves that they were unworthy. God did not shut them out of heaven, they shut themselves out. Lo, we turn to the Gentiles. And they shall come into the kingdom which you refused. For so hath the Lord commanded us. By showing them that Isa. 49: 6 and similar promises were to be applied. I have sent thee for a light to the Gentiles. This was the mission of the Jews, to be carried out through Jesus their Messiah. The religion of the Jews was never intended for themselves alone, but for all the world. By refusing to give it to the world, they lost it themselves. So it is still both with

individuals and with churches. Salvation unto the uttermost part of the earth. The Gospel is not narrow, but world-wide. And this is one of the great proofs that it is divine. Other religions are for a race or nation or state of civilization. This is for all. They were glad. Glorified. Praised and extolled. The word of God. It was enough to fill them with joy that instead of one narrow and obstructed gate, with Jewish keepers, the 12 gates of the Heavenly City, in every side were flung wide open with "Welcome" over every one. As many as were ordained to eternal life believed. Nothing is said as to how God appoints, or that it is an arbitrary act; while we know that whatever God does is in accordance with the free wills with which he has endowed us. There is a divine side to our lives, and that divine side is here expressed, but the human choice is not denied. Spread abroad. From one disciple to another, like leaven. The Jews urged on the devout women of honorable estate, or rank. These were proselytes, devoted to the Jewish religion, and having great influence in religious matters. Good persons, on account of their very love for the good, may, it mistaken, do a great deal of harm. All their devotion and zeal becomes a power to do wrong. Thus many good men have persecuted those better than themselves. The chief men of the city. Who would care much more to please their fellow citizens, the Jews, than these wandering men, who seemed likely to make trouble and create dissension. Cast them out of their borders. The persecution was probably a tumultuous outbreak, and the apostles, for the sake of peace, retired from the place. Shook off the dust. So Christ had commanded them to do as a testimony, not in anger, but to show them that they did not leave them willingly to go to ruin, but the blame must rest upon themselves. Came unto Iconium. 60 miles to the south-east. It is now called Konieh, and has twenty to thirty thousand inhabitants.

JOY AND COURAGE. JEALOUSY, SLANDER, PERSECUTION.—Ver. 52. And the disciples. Both the apostles and the Christians in Antioch. Were filled with joy. It might have been expected that they would leave gloom and despondency among their discouraged converts; but it was not so. They left behind them the joy of a new hope, the inspiration of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of those who had learned of the heavenly promise. And with the Holy Ghost. And this was the source of their joy, their strength, and their firmness. Great is the power of Christian joy. The opposite state of mind was in the persecutors. Persecution, jealousy, slander, awaken no joy, no peace, no courage. They proceed from a bad spirit, and kindle painful feelings. MIRACLES OF GRACE. BITTER PERSECUTION. They entered together. Sometimes they preached in different places, and sometimes they united their forces. So spake, that a great multitude... believed. They spake, so plainly, so convincingly, and with such a manifest concern for the souls of men; they spake so from the heart, so earnestly and courageously, that they who heard them could not but say, God was with them of a truth. Yet the success was not to be attributed to the manner of their preaching, but to the Spirit of God, who made use of these means. Both Jews and Greeks. Paul probably preached in Greek. The multitude of the city was divided. The very things which produced strong conviction in some awakened bitter antagonism in others. When there was made an onset. The Greek word refers to a set purpose, not to its being actually carried out. No stone was thrown. The Jews with their rulers, the rulers of the Jewish synagogue. They... fled. In obedience to the Lord's command. Unto the cities of Lycaonia. Wolf-land; a wilder and less civilized region. Unto Lystra and Derbe. Lystra was about forty miles southeast, and Derbe twenty miles further. Wherever they went they preached the Gospel.
