News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

A house at Nashwaskis, two miles above St. Mary's ferry, occupied by John Hazlett, and barns attached thereto, were burned to the ground. The furniture of the house was saved. The buildings are insured for \$300.

A Moncton lad named William Beatty was sentenced at Hillsboro, Monday, to two years in the penitentiary for stealing some articles from the Calhoun, Hopewell Cape, a few weeks ago. Beatty and another lad recently went on a thieving excursion to Albert Co., which terminated for one in the penitentiary.

The New Brunswick Foundry has just completed a two-hundred horse-power girder frame engine for Alexander Gibson's new shingle mill, for which they have also finished ten shingle machines. In the setting of boilers and furnace and in general equipment, this is one of the finest shingle mills in Canada. Everything is modern, and all the latest improvements are embodied in it.

Morton Reicker of Moncton, sentenced to three years in the penitentiary for forgery, attempted to cut his throat with a razor in the prisoner's box and afterwards by swallowing ammonia but was unsuccessful.

The public works department has sent an officer to Tracadie for the purpose of preparing plans and estimates for the proposed new lazaretto. The Newcastle Advocate says there is some talk of transferring the Chinese lepers quarantined at Victoria, B. C., to Tracadie.

A new shingle mill is being erected by Mr. Samuel Laughlan at Black Point, Northumberland county.

Cornelius Buckley, while under the influence of liquor, fell off Magee's wharf St. John, Wednesday afternoon. He received a bad shaking up and was cut about the head.

At Stanley, York county, Logan's hotel was burned Wednesday. It was insured in the Liverpool and London and Globe for \$800. The loss is over sixteen hundred dollars. The contents were partially saved in a damaged condition.

The house of Mrs. Yerxa at St. Stephen was consumed by fire Tuesday. Mrs. Yerxa and her infant escaped through a window. Insurance \$700.

Brewer's steam mill at Keswick is being put in order to saw two million feet of hemlock logs. All the boards to be sawn from this lumber have already been sold at remunerative prices to parties in the United States.

Almost sixty prisoners, of which number eighteen are females, are confined in the county jail at St. John.

Logs are coming into the Fredericton booms freely. The Miramichi drives are getting along well also. William Richards says that fully two and a half millions of his lumber is now in the Miramichi boom limits, and that the balance, including that hung up last year, is all in safe water on the Taxis and Miramichi rivers. The lumber of Randolph & Sons, D. H. Keswick, Mr. Beveridge and W. H. Lawrence is all considered fairly safe to come out all right.

A good deal of bogus money is afloat about Fredericton. It is said to be New York green goods swindlers' stock. A \$20 bank note was presented at a Queen street millinery store yesterday and on examination found to be counterfeit.

Fire early May 15, totally destroyed the farm house at Coverdale, on the opposite side of the river from Moncton, with nearly all its contents, including one hundred and eighty-five dollars in cash. The insurance is only \$500 and the loss will be heavy.

Mr. George Kitchen has commenced to build the new bridge across the St. John river from Woodstock to Grafton. A large number of men are employed. Excavations are being made for one pier on the Woodstock side, and the retaining wall is partly up.

The Port Elgin woolen mills are also to begin operations again at the last of this month. William Read is now absent in the states purchasing machinery for the new mill. The woolen company has a very fine engine now, and when the new looms are obtained will be in a position to compete with any woolen manufacturing company.

The logs put into W. H. & J. Rourke's stream drive back of St. Martins are now all safely secured in the ponds at the mills.

On Friday afternoon a young son of Joseph W. Wylie of Carleton, was seriously injured by being run over by a Shore Line locomotive. The boy who is about thirteen years old, was taking a ride on the cow-catcher and fell off. His leg was broken above the knee and a deep gash inflicted just above the ankle.

Haley Bros. & Co. have purchased the spool and bobbin factory and saw mill in connection therewith at St. Martins. The mills have been closed down for a long time and they will be put in operation at once by the new proprietors.

The Port Elgin furniture factory is to begin operations in a few days. Messrs. Hazen Copp and Curtis Tremholm have bought up the greater part of the shares, and with such business men as these at the head of affairs, it is expected that the factory will be run on a paying basis.

On Saturday last a drowning accident happened at the mouth of Big Black river. John Stevens with a number of his crew were dropping down to a jam in the stream, when striking the logs a swell capized the batteau, throwing the occupants into the water. After some time all were rescued, except a young man named Guerrette. He was swept under and drowned.

Extensive changes are in progress at the C. P. R. Depot, Fredericton. The old train shed has been taken away and the station building modernized. A new freight shed has been erected between the station building and the repair works. This building is 160 feet long, and will give increased facilities for handling freight, so much and so long needed here. The station building itself is now undergoing thorough repairs.

There are 3765 men employed on the I. C. R., 1000 of the number being in Moncton.

Nova Scotia.

Aaron Palmer's house, Amherst, N. S., was partially destroyed by fire May 10. The furniture was mostly saved.

About 30 men employed at the reservoir of the water works went out on strike and endeavored to get the pipe layers to do the same but failed. They will likely be glad to go to work again.

A fire occurred at Halifax Monday night in the three story brick building on Hollis street, owned by the Queen Hotel Co. It started in Ruggles' tailoring establishment. To extinguish it the building had to be drenched with water. Ruggles' stock was partially removed, but the loss will be about \$2,000; insured.

Hay has declined in Weston, N. S., from \$14 to \$10 per ton.

The mills of Young Bros. & Co. at Newville and River Hebert, N. S., are now in full operation. Chas. W. Young says his firm will cut 8,000,000 this season.

Now it is said the ship railway will be under full work in July. Some of the contractors are expected in a day or two. It is to be hoped this grand undertaking will be at last pushed to a successful issue. [Amherst Press.

Mr. Dobson, manager of the Sherwood quarry at Wallace, who is in the habit of getting up and walking about in his sleep, got up on Wednesday night, broke a large pane of glass in the window and jumped a distance of fourteen feet to the ground, inflicting severe cuts on his legs.

The Kentville Star says that farmers are alarmed in plowing up their fields which grew potatoes last season, to find quantities of potato bugs alive in the ground, and some who have not forgotten the labor of picking and destroying them last year, speak of planting small fields this season.

A steam fog whistle at Chebucto Head light house, on the west side of the entrance to Halifax harbour, will be put in operation on the 1st June next. The machinery will be in duplicate in case of accident. The signal will consist of single blasts of 10 seconds duration, with intervals of 50 seconds between them.

A fire at Kentville early May 15, completely gutted Leander Neary's boarding house, many of the guests having a narrow escape.

James Thompson brought in from the Eastville gold mines Mount Uniaque, a wedge of gold, 260 ounces, the product of crushing of 24 tons of quartz. The Bridgewater Bulletin says G. A. Wade deposited a brick of gold weighing 210 ounces with the Merchant's bank last week. [Halifax Herald.

John B. Campbell's steam saw mill at Bass River, Colchester, was destroyed by fire Saturday night last.

The new iron bridge spanning the Missisquoi river on the boundary line between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia was successfully put into position by the contractor. The bridge was built half a mile from the place and hauled to its destination on flat cars and swung into position from either side, being one hundred feet long by twenty feet wide. Inspector McKean, while walking underneath the bridge, received a painful cut on the head and was obliged to go to Amherst to have the wound dressed.

The ship John M. Blaikie, ashore at Anjer, has become a total wreck. She was a fine vessel of 1778 tons, built at Londonderry 1855.

The enterprising citizens of Yarmouth are subscribing funds for the purchase of a telescope which is to be placed in the academy under the control of Principal Cameron.

Other Provinces.

Richard Mitchell, the boycotted Tipperary farmer brought over from Ireland by the Canadian orangemen, was presented with a purse of \$100 in gold. Mitchell has been thus provided with \$900. Mitchell and family will settle in the Northwest Territories.

The boiler in the saw mill at Elmwood Ont. exploded Tuesday instantly killing Alex. Heller, lessee of the mill, and seriously injuring H. R. Clements. The mill is badly wrecked.

In most of the districts of Manitoba nearly all seeding has been done. Wheat acreage will be largely increased this year, and under ordinary conditions Manitoba will produce an enormous crop.

Martha Day, a young girl of 21, living at Montreal, took Paris green Tuesday night and died soon after. A crushed letter was found in her hand in which she gave as the reason for suicide that a young man who had been keeping company with her loved her no longer.

The Star's cable says; The imports from Canada show the great expansion last month of 91,836 pounds, or 406 per cent. compared with last year. The wheat imports expanded 2,100 pounds; cheese, 1,100 pounds, fish, cured and salted, 93,600 pounds. The imports for the four months increased 165,000 pounds, or 76 per cent. The wood imports increased 41,000 in four months. The exports to Canada increased four per cent. in the month and decreased four per cent. for four months.

Most of the lakes and rivers along the line of the Lake St. John Railway, Quebec, are well frozen over.

The strike in Stormont, Ont. cotton mill is over, the weavers returning to work, although Ladeur, whose reinstatement they demanded, is not taken back.

Failures according to the Dun & Russell report for the last seven days are twenty-five and for the corresponding week last year twenty-three.

The Portland cement works at Napane Mills are turning out 270 barrels of water, lime and cement per day.

A cablegram was received at Montreal May 9, announcing that all restrictions had been removed in England and Scotland, and that Canadian cattle can now move freely through those countries. Some 2,500 head of cattle are now on the way to the English markets.

Owing to the heavy rains lately, Raleigh Plains, near Chatham, Ont., are covered with water. Probably 4,000 acres are flooded and the crops are almost wholly destroyed. The loss will amount to \$75,000.

A young farmer named Provost committed suicide near Chateaugay, Que., on Wednesday. He had been plowing in the field and after tying his feet to a large tree threw himself on the ground, put a noose round his neck and with a line attached to the whistle tree the horses were started off on the run. The result was that his head was almost severed from his body when found later on by the father of deceased.

The argument in the Mercier conspiracy case is concluded. Judge Cheveau taking the same on delibere, and setting the cases against Pacaud and Langelier for Monday.

The return presented to parliament shows that eighty-nine Newfoundland vessels employing 813 men fished in waters of Canadian Labrador last season.

United States.

Forty-two miners were killed in an explosion in the coal mine at Roslyn, Washington, Tuesday. Six bodies were taken out.

The Methodist conference at Omaha, Neb., has petitioned Congress to compel the closing of the World's fair on Sunday.

D. M. Justice, a white man, was killed in his house at Good Will, Mercer Co., by a negro miner named Wells. The latter was afterward taken by Justice's friends from the officer arresting him and was lynched. His body was riddled with bullets.

James Donovan was given a verdict of \$16,000 against the Manhattan elevated railway New York, or personal injuries received at the hands of a porter in the employ of the company.

The Mississippi river at Alton Ill., is higher than for nine years. All packet houses along the level have been abandoned.

A four-story frame factory, occupied by F. W. Breed & Co. shoe manufacturers of Lynn was entirely burned early May 14. Loss on the building \$15,000, insurance \$10,000; loss on machinery and stock \$100,000, insurance unknown. Two hundred and fifty hands are thrown out of employment.

The low state of the water in the brooks, streams, rivers and lakes in lumbering regions of Maine is a cause of considerable anxiety to all the lumbermen who are trying to get their logs out into such water as will enable them to reach their destination. A number of the drives are hung up and the greater part of the crews have returned, as nothing can be done at present.

Chas. Ganter left Chas. Sawyer's house, Presque Isle, Me., last Sunday morning to get gum of logs on the river shore and did not return. His body was found in the river by some drivers Saturday. It is supposed he fell in.

Durfee mills, Fall River, Mass. were damaged to about \$20,000 by fire May 14. The operatives had not arrived when fire broke out.

The granite cutters in all the yards in Worcester quit work on demands for thirty-four cents an hour. About 100 men are out. The yard owners announce their intention to resist to the last.

British and Foreign.

Gen. Gresses, the chief police at St. Petersburg, is dying from a mysterious illness traced to poison in his food, and there is no doubt that he is the victim of a Nihilist conspiracy.

The Chronicle's Paris correspondent says: There are over 700 refugees, anarchists and others of criminal antecedent under conviction for attacks on the life or property now in the sanctuary of British territory. They could not live elsewhere 24 hours. This question must eventually be considered by the powers.

The military students at Shun King, China, have taken forcible measures to expel the British missionaries from the city. It is claimed their action was taken with the connivance of the viceroy of the province, Se Chuen, in which Shun King is situated.

Temperance Notes.

The Dominion W. C. T. U., which includes the provincial unions of Ontario, Quebec, Maritime Provinces, British Columbia and Manitoba, number 368 unions, with a membership of 9,000—46 young women's unions and 192 children's societies, the latter having a membership of 19,000. The annual meeting will be held in Ottawa in May.

One hundred thousand men and women are sent to prison in consequence of strong drink. Twenty thousand children are yearly sent to the poor-house for the same reason.

The British Medical Association has declared in favor of the compulsory detention, with view to cure, of habitual drunkards. The next International Congress on the subject of the abuse of alcoholic liquors, will be held at The Hague in September next.

Henry George says that poverty is the cause of drunkenness. That is the reason, probably, that Senator Fair's son, in California, died in delirium tremens a few weeks ago. He had only about a million dollars to keep the wolf from the door.

A column a week could be made of the attacks made upon ministers and others by the allies of the rum-sellers in different parts of the United States. The Congregational parsonage and barn were burned at Epping, N. H., recently. The pastor, W. P. Chaney, has been very active in opposing the liquor-traffic. Recently an attempt was made to burn the church. The rum business is an incarnation of the criminal spirit.
