THE TELEPHONE. -- The great increase in the use of the telephone in England is giving much concern to the government post-office, which is fearful that with its telegraph business. That there certain, as last year the telephone companies in Great Britain distributed 160,000,000 messages, against a total of 66,000,000 by the post-office; but it posed remedy. The government has already a cheap and efficient telegraph service, and if the people find that even with such a service at their disposal the telephone is better suited to their needs they will talk their messages instead of writing them.
