News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Bath, Carleton county, is soon to have a cheese factory. Mr. Thomas McGinley has been soliciting stock for the new enterprise at that place for some time past and is meeting with success. It is expected that the factory will be ready to commence operations next Spring.

Over 13,000,000 feet of lumber were shipped from Richibucto to Great Britain this season, Messrs J. & T. Jardine, forwarded 5,723, 190; G. K. McLeod, 4,599,000, Edward Walker, 2,318,562 and Geo. Irving, 401, 760.

The heavy rains of last week have raised the water in the river at St. Stephen so high that the cotton factory has been unable to operate its machinery this week.

The operations of the Alma Copper Mining company, are suspended until next spring. Some excellent ore has been found and the prospect of large deposits of copper are considered good.

Mr. Jacob Tobin, who is postmaster at Millidgeville, met with a very severe accident on Wednesday. He was driving an express wagon on which were loaded six barrels of flour, when in some manner he fell and one of the wheels passed over his head inflicting a wound of a most severe character. The scalp was torn and it was found necessary by the surgeon who attended to put 14 stitches in the wound.

Inspector of fisheries, R. Hockin, says that on a fair calculation every salmon in the rivers at this season of the year if allowed to deposit spawn unmolested, is worth one hundred dollars to the country. Every good citizen should assist in preventing the slaughter of our fish by at once communicating to the officers any information regarding the infringement of the regulations coming under their observation.

The Provincial Government has issued a proclamation offering a reward of \$100 to any one, not being the guilty party, who will give such information as will lead to the discovery, arrest and conviction of the author, or authors, of the attempt to rob the mail carrier travelling between Campbellton and Paspébiac on the 6th of October last.

A man named James Foster, while working on a Calais lumber wharf broke a blood vessel and died within a few minutes.

Jacob Drake while working around an old wharf at Sand Point fell through. He fell about seventeen feet and when picked up was unconscious, in which state he remained about an hour. The old man received a pretty bad shaking up, but it is not known whether he received any internal injuries.

A rumor is current and has got publicity to the effect that Mr. Rankine Deputy Sheriff, saw the prisoner known as "Jim" at Dorchester and identified him as a St. John man. Mr. Rankine authorizes the statement that he never saw the prisoner, nor did either of his assistants; unqualifiedly denies in every particular the correctness of the reports attributed to him and says he knows nothing whatever of the man. There is no substantial ground for the assumption that the prisoner belongs in this province.

Cheese from each of the factories in Carleton county have been forwarded for the World's Fair at Chicago. Dairying Supt. Robertson superintended the shipment.

Mrs. Ephraim Keith of Moncton, has received a letter from her brother Myer Keith of Fenelon Falls, Ont., asking for particulars about Buck and Jim. He writes at the instance of a Mrs. Smyth of Fenelon Falls, who says she has two sons whose given names are Buck and Jim. Both have been gone from home for some time and have not been heard of lately. She read in the papers of Buck and Jim's deceptions in Moncton and is anxious to know if they are her sons. Papers with Buck's picture and an account of the trial will be mailed her. It is hardly possible that both or either are her sons.

Larry Rivers, a C. P. R. employe, received injuries near Edmundston on Monday, from which he died the following day. He was shoveling in a ballast pit when it suddenly caved in and he was buried beneath tons of earth. Some difficulty was experienced in extricating him, and although everything was done to sustain life he died after several hours suffering.

River thieves have been at work at the Ledge and have stripped Dr. Nason's yacht, hauled up below the

Raven's Head for the winter, of sails, blocks, running gear and about everything movable. The yacht has remained at the same place, under cover, for several winters and this is the first time anything about her has been disturbed. The doctor's loss is about \$200.

Mr. John Hogan, Upper Charlo, raised a large crop of ensilage corn last season. When it was growing it had a magnificent appearance. When at its full growth it was upwards of 12 feet in height. Mr. Hogan has the credit of being the first in the county to raise this excellent plant for food for cattle. His example will be followed by many progressive farmers. From 20 to 30 tons can be raised from 2 acres of good soil.

There were at Indiantown Friday afternoon seven woodboats loaded with hay which had come down from Queens and Sunbury counties. Each boat carried about 45 tons, and the hay, though slightly wet from Saturday's rains, was of a good quality. The hay crop along the river this year was heavier than last season, and the price is consequently lower. Yesterday the sellers were receiving \$10 per ton.

The large saw mills at Grand Bay, owned by Messrs. Dunn Bros., were burned Wednesday morning. The fire broke out between 3 and 4 o'clock and burned furiously so that the reflection was plainly to be seen from the city. The mill proper was 125 feet by 60 feet wide, and the boiler and engine house attached measured 15x120 feet.

Since the mills were repaired they have been operated for Messrs. Dunn by Mr. J. Albert Gregory.

Nova Scotia.

On Tuesday last J. Cameron McDonald, manager of Antigonish Gold Mining Co., Country Harbor, brought in a brick of gold weighing 90 ounces, valued at about \$1,800, the result of two weeks work.—[Enterprise.]

Messrs. Dodge & Burns are about adding a new branch to their business and expect shortly to erect a steam lumber mill in Windsor. Arrangements are so far completed that a large area of timber land has been secured and men are already in the woods getting out logs.

The sealing schooner Marie, owned in Yarmouth, was recently seized in the Okhotsk Sea, by the Russian cruiser Vitiaz. She had 600 sealskins on board. The owners can stand the loss however as the Marie has already sent home 2,000 skins this season previous to her capture.

About 20 houses have been built this summer at Tranton N. S. Ten years ago this place was a wilderness. To-day it is a place of no small importance, with churches, schools, etc., and works giving employment to about 700 men.

\$10,000 was paid out in wages last month at the new works in the new town of Farrona, N. S. This month it will be \$12,000.

The arrest of John Ivers at Weymouth for burglarizing Dunn's store at Bear River last week, has led to the arrest of Richard Halliday on the charge of being implicated in the burglary that happened at Bear River a year ago in which case Ivers figured. Ivers broke jail and escaped before the case came up for trial. Halliday was arrested at Hectanooga by Constable Robert McClelland, who arrested Ivers. McClelland deserves great praise for the manner in which he has conducted himself in running down the gang.

Other Provinces.

A scandal has been discovered in connection with the management of Kingston penitentiary. Stores purchased for the institution have been disappearing mysteriously of late, and as a result of an investigation by Inspector Moylan the accountant, Mr. Scobell, has been dismissed for supplying his residence with fuel and provisions purchased for the penitentiary. Other officials are said to be implicated.

Monday afternoon a little boy, the son of Mr. Frank Conroy of Souris, P. E. I., met with a sad accident that resulted in the little fellow's death. His mother was taking a kettle of water off the stove when the child got in her way. She stumbled, upsetting the kettle of water all over the little child. He was terribly scalded and after suffering all night died Tuesday morning. [Charlottetown Examiner.]

The Canadian failures as reported by Dun & Russell for the past seven days are 29, and for the corresponding week last year 18.

Police Magistrate Bartlett, of Windsor, has sentenced Ezra Sylvester Gaybell, formerly of Norfolk county, Ont. to nine months in the Central Prison, at hard labor for bigamy.

The Toronto News has put in type setting machines, the Montreal Star is putting in 30, and the Ottawa Citizen hasn't a printer in its office, being all run by machines, and the adds set in a job office. The printing business is on the eve of a great revolution.

The following official announcement was authorized: "The governor general has received with great regret a letter from Sir John Abbott intimating that he is compelled by the state of his health to resign his office. Acting upon the advice of Sir John Abbott, his excellency has requested Sir John Thompson to form a new ministry. Sir John Thompson has accepted this duty. But it is probable that a few days will be required before an accurate list of the ministers can be given."

United States

A house in Sharpsburg, a suburb of Pittsburg, Pa. was burned early Nov. 22nd. H. W. Dannehower, his wife and child perished in the flames.

A sad accident occurred at Linneus Me., on Friday last, which resulted in the death of Jennie L., aged 3 years and 5 months, only daughter of Isaac Bishop and granddaughter of David Graham, formerly of Queens. Her mother went to milk, leaving the children in the house. Hearing the screams she ran in to find the child's clothing in flames. All was done that could be done for her, but she only lived eight hours.

Wm. G. McDonald, a Nova Scotian, and a fellow workman employed by the Concord Land and Water Power Company at Sewall Falls, were pulling themselves ashore by a derrick rope, stretched across the river, when the water swept the boat from under them. Both dropped from the rope. McDonald was carried through the falls and drowned. The other man swam ashore.

A few nights ago one of the Christian Scientist leaders of Guthrie, O. T., told those present that if they had faith they could go out and pick up a rattlesnake and the reptile could not bite them. The next day a recent convert named Southern saw a rattlesnake and picked it up. The reptile fastened its fangs in his arm, but he refused to have medical attendance and has since died, despite the many long prayers of his fellow believers in faith.

Rain has fallen in torrents in Oregon and Washington, west of the Cascade mountains. The local railroad traffic on the Puget Sound north of Tacoma is entirely suspended. The damage already done in Puget Sound country will probably reach half a million dollars. The prospect is now that much greater damage will result. The Northern Pacific has repaired the damage to the main line. The landslide on the Union Pacific at the Cascade continues to come down.

The Breakers, the elegant and costly summer residence of Cornelius Vanderbilt at Newport was burned. The fire also destroyed the valuable contents of the villa, including the furniture, bric-a-brac, wearing apparel, rare and costly articles of every description. The fire was discovered by Mr. Vanderbilt himself. Loss \$300,000.

British and Foreign

The Panama Canal investigating committee at Paris on Friday examined M. Delahaye, who did not give details. When pressed he confined himself to mentioning the name of the former minister of agriculture now dead. He added that he could not furnish a list of the deputies implicated, and he did not have the material evidence, only moral proof. He gave the names of several banks which he declared could possibly give evidence. The committee decided to request the minister of justice to place before the committee whatever evidence in the Panama Canal case he had in his possession, with a view to ascertaining the proof of the statement made by M. Delahaye that the documents bear the names of over five hundred persons subsidized by the Panama Canal company.

A horrible crime reported from Zastrzk, in Lithuania. A house in which a horse thief, his wife and five children were sleeping was set on fire by peasants. When the inmates tried to escape they were met by the heartless wretches and driven back into the flames with knives and other weapons. All were burned to death. The culprits surrendered in a body to the police.

The "St. James Gazette" says "that a number of unemployed workmen who meet at Towerhill boast of the possession of fire-arms and declare they are trained in their use." The

"Gazette" add: "It is ascertained that many men who being to the volunteer force failed to return their arms when through drilling. Arrangements are being completed for a midnight march of the contingent of workless men."

The secretary of the master cotton spinners' federation announces that eight-ninths of the spindles organized in federation are now stopped or running on half time, affecting 64,000 employes.

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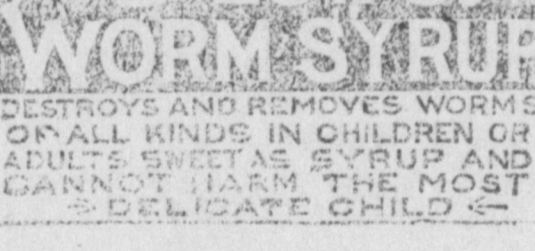
