INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

First Quarter-Lesson IV.—Jan. 24.

HEZEKIAH'S PRAYER AND DELIVERANCE.—Isa. 37:14-21, 33-38.

GOLDEN TEXT.—The righteous cry, and the Lord heareth and delivereth them.—Ps. 34:17.

THE HOUR OF DEEP DISTRESS. When the great Sargon died, at Nineveh, and was succeeded by his son Sennacherib (705), there was a great desire on the part of the tributary provinces, to break away from their burdensome taxes, and become independent again. Babylon, the strongest of these, revolted. It seemed a good time for Hezekiah to assert his independence, while Sennacherib was busy with Babylon. Accordingly, he united in a confederacy with the Philistines and Phoenician cities on the coast, with the promise of assistance from Egypt. Accordingly, the customary tribute was refused to Assyria.

He marched from Nineveh with an immense army, and took city after city by storm, till the cities of the Philistines and the south of Judah, were in his power, and little was left to Hezekiah but his capital, Jerusalem. Hezekiah tried to buy off the invaders by the payment of the former tribute, and other immense and costly gifts. But Sennacherib was inexorable. Nothing would satisfy him but the capitulation of Jerusalem.

HEZEKIAH'S PRAYER.—Vers. 14-20. And Hezekiah received the letter. The one from Sennacherib demanding the surrender of the city. And Hezekiah went up unto the house of the Lord. Not because God could not hear him at home, but because it was the most retired from other cares; was the place God had appointed to meet his people, and thus was most reverential and expressive of honor to God. And spread it before the Lord. It is a part of true prayer to express our feelings to our Heavenly Father. And Hezekiah prayed. Why did God wait for Hezekiah to plead so loud and earnestly? Why does he wish us to wrestle in prayer? It is to cherish and cultivate our faith, bringing us into closer relations to God. The great difficulty with all God's best gifts is on our part, to make us able to receive and use them. O Lord, Jehovah, the ever-living, eternal Being. Lord of hosts. Not merely the hosts of heaven, but all the forces of nature, of every kind, under his control, to work out good to those who love him. God. The personal Creator, who governs and controls all things. God of Israel. The covenant God, who has made promises to his people. That dwelleth between the cherubim. This refers to the visible glory, the Shechinah, and underneath the wings of the cherubim, which overshadowed the seat of mercy. The glory being over the mercy-seat denotes forgiving love on God's part, and obedience to the law beneath on the part of the man. Such a God is able and willing to answer prayer. Thou art the God, even thou alone (all others were pretenders and usurpers), of all the kingdoms of the earth. Assyria belonged to him, as well as Israel. No nation is beyond his power; and therefore he could help against this enemy. Incline thine ear, etc. Spoken after the manner of men, as we still do, although we believe that God is a spirit. Reproach the living God. Hezekiah's plea was for the honor of God himself. Of a truth, Lord, etc. The boasting of the Assyrians was true. And have cast their gods into the fire. The idol gods of the other nations had no power against the invaders. Of course not, for they were no gods, but the work of men's hands. But Jehovah was not an idol. Men did not make him, but he made men. Now was the opportunity to prove to all the kingdoms of the earth... that thou art the Lord, even thou only. It really was a contest, like that on Carmel, under Elijah, when the consuming fire proved who was the true God. All the world was looking at Jerusalem. They knew the Jews' claim for their God. Salvation now, against this overwhelming force, would show to all nations that Jehovah was not like their idols, but was the true God.

Afflictions lead to prayer. Hezekiah saw before him captivity, suffering, probably death, the loss of his kingdom, the extinction of his line, the exile of his people. But above all he saw the fall of true religion, the dishonor of God's name, a religious and moral loss to the world.

THE ANSWER TO PRAYER. Then Isaiah... sent unto Hezekiah. Probably in response to a message from the king. Both were praying. When Isaiah had learned God's will he reported this message to Hezekiah. Whereas thou hast prayed to me. Showing that he trusted in God, and turned to him for help. Therefore. This is the conclusion of Isaiah's message. He shall not come into this city. The Assyrians' boasted plans should fail. By the

way that he came. The highway along the coast, leaving Jerusalem one side. For I will defend this city. Emphasis on the I. You cannot save yourselves, but I will save you. For mine own sake. Not selfishly, but for the sake of his religion and truth, against the idols. For my servant David's sake. To whom he had promised that his line should endure, and his kingdom remain. Then the angel of the Lord went forth. The word of Isaiah had its accomplishment within a few hours. It was a supernatural stroke from God. Smote in the camp of the Assyrians. Where this camp was not stated, but the main body of the army were last reported at Libnah (37:38). A hundred and fourscore and five thousand. Giving some idea of the immense size of Sennacherib's army. And when they arose. That is, the survivors. So Sennacherib returned, and dwelt at Nineveh. Nothing is said here of the length of time he lived after this, but we learn from the monuments that he lived twenty years longer, and engaged in five campaigns, but none of them in Palestine. His sons smote him, B. C. 61. Apparently to gain the kingdom, but they had to flee for their lives, and a younger son, Esar-haddon, one of the greater Assyrian kings, reigned in his stead.

PRACTICAL HINTS.

God has made Sennacherib bear testimony to the truth of the Divine Word.

Trouble is not only one of the punishments for sin, but is a means by which men are led to see the evil of sin, and so seek salvation from sin.

God uses various instrumentalities, compelling even the powers of evil to aid his cause.

God gives many and precious promises to his people to draw them to himself.

Every difficulty, danger, trial, temptation, or blasphemy by which his name is polluted, should be at once spread out before the Lord. But most of all the common things of every-day life.

Working and praying should go together.

There are many times when we are powerless and God alone can give help.

God has many strange and unexpected ways of answering prayer.

The unusual ways of answering prayer, ways beyond human power to execute, lead us to God's hand, and feel the reality of his goodness.

The dinner given by the W. C. T. U. on New Year's day, to the poor children of the city, passed off very pleasantly. A racy description of the same has kindly been furnished for the column by one of the young ladies of the Y. "Are you going to have stuffs and gravy tomorrow?" Misses' asked one of the children who came to get a ticket for the dinner. If stuffs and gravy were what his mouth watered for, then was he fully satisfied, as there was an abundant supply for all. Five long tables spread with snowy linen, at each place a plate, knife and fork, a mug and a biscuit. At twelve o'clock one hundred and twenty children were seated at those tables eagerly watching for the appearance of the good things, the savoury smell of which had sharpened their appetite. After the blessing had been asked by Dr. McLeod, Messrs. Chestnut and Sampson quickly supplied the plates with turkey, etc., which were handed round by the ladies who were careful to see that all were supplied with good things. The guests carried out their part of the programme very expeditiously, two and even three plates full were enjoyed by those who felt equal to the task. Some were ones were not big enough to cut their own turkey but they enjoyed it just the same. After the turkey came apple pie followed by mince. After these were satisfactorily disposed of there were some brief speeches made by Mr. Randolph, Dr. McLeod, Col. Maunsell, Rev. Mr. Weddall and Rev. Mr. Payson. The speakers endeavoured to impress upon the mind of the children that to be happy, and make others happy, they must be good. Rousing cheers were then given in honor of the W. C. T. U., who gave the dinner, the Y's who helped wait on the children, the governor whose portrait was before them and whose good example was before all, and Mr. Randolph who kindly supplied the turkey. Each child was given a card presented by Mr. Frank Risteen, a bag of candy by Norman Edgecombe, nuts and oranges by Judge Fraser, and a little bit of temperance instruction, in the shape of temperance covers, for school books.

To all who sent donations to the dinner or helped in any way the

ladies of the Union give hearty thanks.

Miss Elizabeth Flagg of Wellesley lately delivered an address in Boston in the course of which she remarked:

"We have all heard—I am sure I have ever since I can remember—of the superfluous women of New England; 60,000 right here in Massachusetts. Lady Henry Somerset is not in the least afraid to express her opinion upon politics. This is one of her utterances in Brooklyn: "Those in England who stand by and watch this great fight between the forces of the home and of the liquor traffic in your country, feel that sanctified politics is the one thing that America needs, and that the white ribbon women are leading the way in this great and blessed change." She also said: "I do feel so strongly the fatuity of the position that draws a line between politics and religion. For the teaching of the church of the future will surely be that the casting of a vote is to each individual soul as solemn a responsibility before God as any religious command or ordinance." The meetings in Brooklyn were arranged by Miss Elizabeth W. Greenwood, assisted by her local union. Miss Greenwood has recently been promoted to the office of World's superintendent of the department of evangelistic work. Lady Henry Somerset is now in Montreal, having spoken en route at Sing Sing prison, and stopped for a few days at Niagara Falls.
