## News of the Week.

### New Brunswick.

Mayor Snow, of Moncton, is somewhat mysteriously absent from that city. He was last seen in Hampton on Thursday, and as he has relations in Kings Co., it is thought he may be visiting them.

Joseph Dale, a workman connected with the water commissioners' office, was at his duties in the North End, when he met with a severe accident. He was carrying a large piece of drain pipe, when he fell and broke his left leg a few inches above the ankle. He was removed to the public hospital.

While loading the bark Serelitis with deals a sailor named Karl Bothen was struck on his left leg by a falling deal. The leg was broken at the thigh.

While coupling cars in the I. C. R. yard Alexander Ward had his right hand caught between the draw bar of the cars. Two of his fingers were so badly jammed that he had to have them amputated.

John McCarty, 22 years of age, a seaman from St. John, N. B., was knocked down in Boston by a freight car of the Unionfreight railroad. His right shoulder was fractured, he received a scalp wound and was injured internally. He was sent to the General Hospital, where he died at 6 o'clock Sunday morning.

Mr. Richard Cochrane, of Carleton, was injured at Fairville about ten days ago by being accidentally struck on the head with some brush. One of the small twigs pierced his head behind the ear and affected the brain. He was taken to the General Public Hospital, where he died from the effects of the injury.

A vessel is discharging one thousand tons of Irish limestone at Chatham for the pulp mill. It is said that New Brunswick limestone will not work well in pulp making, though some chemists say the fault lies with the pulp mill plant.

Gibson's saw mills at Marysville had a narrow escape July 25. The night men at the cotton mill discovered fire in one of the mills about midnight and rang the alarm. It was put out without material damage. One of the gates got opened some way and started one gang, which soon caused fire.

Mrs. James Barber, fell down stairs in her house on St. James street, St. John, breaking one of her arms.

A lad named Clowes True, belonging to Lincoln, was found in his father's barn at that place in an unconscious condition with blood oozing from his ears and nose. It is thought that he was squeezed against the stall by his father's horse. True was unable to talk rationally and his condition is far from encouraging.

News was received Sunday of the death by drowning of Mr. Alfred Parks, of Carleton. Deceased was a fireman on river tug "Champion." At Adams Cove, Evansdale, Sunday afternoon, he and the cook went for a swim, and when some distance from shore Parks was seized with a cramp and sank before assistance could reach him. Mr. Parks was about 26 years of age, unmarried.

There was an increase of \$1,701.46 in the customs receipts in St. John, of July over those of the same month last year.

Sheriff Butler of Queens county, with a posse of men, captured on the night of the 27th John Allen who escaped from the sheriff three years ago and had been hiding ever since.

The five year old son of James Huxley, laborer, of Brittain street, St. John fell off the wharf at Lower cove slip, and was very badly hurt. The lad was unconscious for a couple of hours.

A gentleman from England, who is interested in the development of the nickel property at St. Stephen, is at present engaged in examining the mine and vicinity. It is understood that a diamond prospecting drill will shortly be put to work, and samples of ore from various depths will be tested.

Geo. Moore, Canterbury, did on Saturday last, what may safely be termed a big days work. With two mowers, two horse rakes and a small crew of men, he cut down and put into cock, 45 tons of hay.

### Nova Scotia.

Fire at Bear River destroyed the dwelling and barn of Millidge Armstrong, butcher, also a number of sheep and pigs.

The milk condensing factory at Kingston manages to dispose of about 7,500 lbs. of milk each day.

A barn containing about ten tons of hay, belonging to George Forrest, M. P. P., of Amherst was last week totally destroyed by fire through being struck by lightning. No insurance.

John Acker of Nictaux Falls, Annapolis county, was instantly killed by lightning at Bloomington. He was carrying a couple of scythes under his arm and was running to obtain shelter when struck by the fatal fluid.

A terrific thunder storm passed over Shelburne, N. S., on Saturday. Unusually large hail stones fell, breaking many windows. A number of buildings were damaged, several people stunned and an ox killed by the lightning.

The body of what is supposed to have been an officer of the ill-fated ship Peter Stuart, which was wrecked off Yarmouth some two weeks since, was found last Wednesday on a marsh at Rosway, about nine miles from Digby. The corpse was much disfigured, having been in the water a fortnight, and had on a life preserver, pants and about it some small clothes, it is supposed belonging to the suit of the young son of the captain, whom he endeavored to save.

The following extract from a letter received from Baddeck, C. B., shows how serious drought is affecting the island. "No rain for three weeks except a slight shower Saturday. People are hauling water for use two or three miles. The like of the drought was never known here before. Near Mabou the fires are working pretty close to the asylum."

Truro is in the heat of a liquor fight. Two hotels have been mulcted \$50 each.

American capitalists are negotiating for the purchase of the Joggins coal mines.

Forest fires are raging in the vicinity of Sydney. At Bridgeport people had to keep putting water on their houses continually to keep them from catching. Reports received from Glace Bay said the fires burned in the near vicinity and looked quite serious. A big fire which started near Sydney burned a saw mill owned by Cossett, and several other buildings owned by him, also a dwelling owned by Daniel Connell, near the mill.

Alex. McQuarrie, manager of the Annand gold mine at Montague, received a cablegram from Chas. Annand who is now in London, informing him that the sale of the mine to the English syndicate was closed, and instructing Mr. McQuarrie to hand the mine over to the representative of the syndicate.

Fire July 30th totally destroyed Kelley Bros.' steam saw mill at River Herbert, the fire originating, it is thought, in the engine house. The loss is estimated at about twelve thousand dollars.

Fire is raging all around Leicester, Cumberland. J. L. Purdy of Little River, lost about \$1,000 worth of property. Albert Purdy got 4 acres of hay burned, and the fire is still raging through the woods, destroying millions of good logs and timber. Frank Mattinson of Mt. Pleasant lost about \$4,000 worth of property, and some families have had hard work to save their buildings.

### Other Provinces.

The most terrific storm that ever visited Warton, Ont., Saturday. Every smoke stack and boat house, a large two story building and skating rink were blown down, and on one side of Young's mill, the roof was lifted. Business places were badly flooded. The loss will be heavy.

An unknown man was run down and killed by the Quebec express, one mile from St. Eustache, Quebec. The engineer saw him on the track and blew the whistle, but he paid no attention to the warning and before the train could be stopped the wheels were upon him.

Thos. Kelly, of Cleveland, Ohio, who escaped 17 years ago from the Toronto police after sentence for three years in the penitentiary for larceny, and who was rearrested on his appearance in this city a few weeks since, has been released by order of the minister of justice. He has lived an honorable life in Cleveland since his escape, and on this ground has been released.

In the village of Gahen, county Roscommon, Ireland, a few days ago a woman became insane and seized her three children one after the other, and hold them head downward in a pot of boiling water until they were dead. The woman then attempted suicide in the same manner, but was discovered before life was extinct, though not until she was fatally scalded.

Two shocks of earthquake, each lasting about five seconds were distinctly felt throughout Ottawa Valley last Wednesday night. Some buildings in the city were roughly shaken and the vibration was felt at Kazabazua, 100 miles north of Ottawa. At Renfrew village the shocks were so severe that many persons were greatly alarmed.

A fatal accident occurred at Alberton, P. E. I., on Thursday morning last. Jean, the daughter of William Bell, had been working alone in her fathers carding mill and was found lying on the floor insensible with two wounds on the side of her head. It was found that she had sustained a fracture of the skull. The girl seemed to be doing well until Saturday morning, when she expired suddenly without recovering consciousness.

Dun & Russell report the Canadian failures for the last seven days as 22, and for the corresponding week last year 18. Brandstreets report 22 Canadian failures this week and 25 the same week last year.

Stewart Sills is dead in Morden, near Winnipeg of small pox. The deceased was a dry goods merchant in Morden, and this case the only one there so that place is entirely free from disease now.

A dispatch from Sarnia says that sixty Michigan farmers left there for the Canadian Northwest. These people were formerly Canadians who thought to better their condition in Michigan, but they have decided to try their fortunes in the Canadian Northwest, and there is every reason for believing that they will have no cause to regret the step taken.

Chas. Stark & Company, of Toronto, a big jobbing firm, handling watches and sporting goods, assigned with liabilities placed at \$140,000 and assets at \$147,000. The failure has caused general surprise as the firm, less than a year ago, was credited with a surplus of \$80,000. The principal creditors are the Bank of Hamilton for \$49,000; Union bank for \$15,000; and others in Montreal, Great Britain, Belgium and the United States.

Parts of Ontario are almost unanimous in stating that cereals and vegetables have not suffered from the apparent excess of rain and heat recently but that there is an assurance of either good average crops, or of an unusual abundance.

The new dominion cruiser Curlew has sailed for St. John, N. B. On arriving there she will be handed over to the government. The Curlew's duty will be to protect the fishing industry of the Bay of Fundy.

Sixty-two barrels of whiskey were seized in the cave of Bouchard, the lower St. Lawrence whiskey smuggler, after his capture a few days ago.

The Allan steamer Newfoundland has sailed from Montreal with goods valued at \$25,000 for the St. Johns sufferers. Some five thousand dollars more will be sent in cash in addition to the five thousand cables some weeks ago.

At a meeting of the Ottawa, City council on Saturday on the recommendation of the minister of agriculture the government decided to ask for tenders for the extension of the wharf at Grosse Ile to deep water, and also for a new wharf at Albert Head, British Columbia, to which large steamers may be moved for disinfection. It is understood that the dominion quarantines will be fitted with the most approved modern appliances for the protection of the public health from the inroads of disease on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

A cloudburst occurred at Ottawa on Friday. The early part of the day was intensely warm, but shortly before 12 o'clock black clouds gathered and rain poured down in such torrents that the streets soon appeared like small rivers. High winds and lightning prevailed, and during the storm the atmosphere grew quite cold. The lightning struck the tower of the Wellington market, setting the building on fire and knocking the caretaker and several other persons senseless. The storm lasted nearly an hour. Cellars were flooded in all parts of the city. The growing crops were greatly damaged.

### United States.

The greatest fire that has ever visited Bay City, Mich., broke out in the lumber manufacturing establishment of Miller & Turner. At 8 o'clock upward of 300 dwellings had been destroyed. As far as it is possibly known, only one death has occurred, that of a woman who lay sick in a house which was destroyed. Before assistance could reach her the dwelling was a seething mass of fire. The poor creature had to be left to her fate. The entire loss will reach upwards of \$1,000,000.

Blanche Barrows, aged 4, daughter of William F. Barrows; Roland Cushing, aged 5, son of Walter F. Cushing; Eddie Randall, aged 5, son of E. P. Randall; Albert Lewis, aged 6, son of T. A. Lewis, all of Medford, Mass., missing, were found in a closet under a sink in a new house in process of construction, where they had crawled some time during the day. The door shut in some way, snapping the catch and making them prisoners. The three boys died from suffocation and the little girl was slowly sinking, but alive.

George Walker, Herbert Knight and John Gammett, of Biddeford, Me., were drowned by the upsetting of a dory about half-way between Goose Rocks and Cape Porpoise. The fourth occupant of the dory, George Clark, seized an oar, swam to the shore, and was found on the beach late in the afternoon in an exhausted condition and resuscitated. Walker and Knight leave families. Gammett was unmarried.

An explosion at the York colliery at Pottsville, Pa., Saturday, caused the death of fifteen miners and one is lying at the point of death at home. The explosion was caused by gas liberated by a blast in the second lift rushing through the airway to the first lift, where it ignited.

### British and Foreign.

A serious outbreak of diphtheria has occurred at La Poile, on the west coast of Newfoundland. So far there are 16 cases and nine deaths—five of them this week. The mail steamer refused to take passengers from there.

Forest fires are doing a great deal of damage in all directions in Newfoundland.

Confidential reports from St. Petersburg say that the Russian government is convinced that the recent so-called cholera riots were due to nihilists who seized on the outbreak of the disease as a pretext to excite the empire. Revolutionary agents assure the poorer classes that they will be killed in the cholera hospitals, while the rich will be spared.

A St. Petersburg despatch says: Official cholera returns from July 17 to July 21 give the number of cases in Russia as 4,859, and the number of deaths as 2,500.

A FRAUD.—If high license does decrease the number of saloons (and even that is a question), it must be admitted that it greatly increases the power of the saloons that remain; so that experience has demonstrated that the high-licensed rum traffic is just as potent for evil as is the low-licensed. And, by the way, this fact is well worthy the consideration of all Christians who have been deluded into the belief that the evils of the rum-traffic can be overthrown by high license. Haman proposed to pay King Ahasuerus a pretty high fee (ten thousand talents of silver) for a license to kill the Jews; and so the high-licensed delusion and fraud are only a scheme by which the rum traffic, through the payment of a middling high fee, secures a license to besot and murder from 75,000 to 150,000 citizens of the United States each year. ### Off For The Labrador.

Acadian Recorder, Halifax, N. S. Prof. W. M. Reid, J. D. Soomborg, Lyle Vincent and W. D. Vincent, arrived by the Halifax last night. They are some of the party who go to Labrador in the schooner Evelina in the interests of the World's Fair to secure an Esquimaux village with some fifty inhabitants and all appurtenances thereto belonging. The schooner left Cunningham & Curran's wharf to-day on her mission.

A Recorder reporter was talking to-day to Capt. Wm. McConnell, of Port Hilford, Guysboro, who is in charge of the vessel. An interesting incident was mentioned (and although it sounds like a "puff" of a patient medicine it is worth noting.) "Do you see that man over there," said a friend, "that is Capt.
