### Dominion Parliament.

Hon. Mr. Foster said that it was not well alleged that delay had been made in appointing a commission. It was impossible to deal with this matter last session, so that the government had some time to make the selection after parliament closed. It was the intention of the government that the work should be done well and that time should therefore be given to the commission to do this work. So no time was lost with the little delay that occurred in making the appointments and mapping out the work which the commission was expected to do.

The Continental Egg Company of Great Grimsby, England, has sent out one of its officers, Cornelius Howe, with the object of working up the trade in Canadian eggs in Great Britain.

The names of Judges Tait and Routhier will be recommended to parliament as commissioners to investigate charges against Sir Adolph Caron. Judge Routhier is one who just dismissed the suit against Paccaud.

Mr. Taylor wants the government to appoint inspectors of cheese in order to adjust the differences which arise between buyers and sellers.

J. W. Hart of the dairy commissioners staff, will have charge of the experimental dairy station at Kingsclear, N. B. At this station butter making will be carried on during the summer and at the same or some other point in New Brunswick winter butter making will continue to direct the attention of the farmers of that province to the possibility of supplying milk to the creamery during the whole year. Two travelling dairies are at work in New Brunswick, under the control and direction of the dairy commissioners here. In this work the department is co-operating with the department of agriculture of the provincial government. The provincial authorities pay the expenses incurred by these travelling dairies in New Brunswick. They also have three competent men in the field, giving instructions in co-operative dairying, the planting and growth of fodder corn, and organizing local dairymen's associations.

J. E. Hopkins, of the dairy commissioner's staff, will shortly leave for Nova Scotia, where he will visit cheese factories, giving particular directions to makers, in order to improve quality. Later on he will supervise the making of some cheese for export to English markets.

The Criminal Bill was again taken up in committee Tuesday. The senate will adjourn tomorrow until next Friday.

Supply is still engaging the attention of Parliament. There is much discussion. At one session last week the House sat all night and till 10 in the morning.

Further correspondence on the Newfoundland question was presented to both houses Friday. It includes a despatch from Lord Knutsford to the governor general, in reply to a telegram stating the views of the Canadian government as to the manner in which the draft of the Newfoundland convention discriminates against Canada and in favor of the United States. Lord Knutsford traverses the different clauses of the convention, and implies that no discrimination against Canada could be involved in it if the constitution was read in conjunction with the Newfoundland Tariff Act. He says there is nothing in article 4 to imply that Newfoundland would not extend to other countries the scale of duties certified therein, and points out that section 22 of the Newfoundland Tariff Act makes a reduction of the duties on flour and pork on the coming into force of that convention, of general application. Lord Knutsford in closing his despatch adds, however, that the Canadian government may rest assured that her majesty will not be advised to assent to any Newfoundland legislation discriminating directly against the products of the dominion. Canada's offer for a conference suggested that it be held either in America or in England at a convenient time, the latter country being preferred so as to enable an English representative to take part. The conference was contingent on both countries during the present season resuming and retaining the status quo anterior to enforcement of the Bait Act, but as is well known the offer was refused by Newfoundland unless Canada as a preliminary step withdrew her objections to the ratification of the Blaine-Bond convention.

The governor general, received a despatch from the Newfoundland government Saturday, stating that that colony would agree to allow Canadian fishing vessels to obtain bait in Newfoundland ports and reduce duties upon fish and fish oils from Newfoundland. There is little doubt that those conditions will be agreed to by the dominion government.

### News of the Week.

#### New Brunswick.

A large number of beef cattle are being brought to the St. John market this spring from Prince Edward Island.

A young fisherman, named James Allen, of Port Elgin, fell overboard while putting out lobster traps at Cape Spear, Tuesday, and before assistance arrived was drowned. It is supposed that he was drawn overboard by a string of traps, and as he was alone in the boat which was unanchored, the boat drifted away.

The house and barn belonging to Oscar Dugan, seven miles below Woodstock, were burned on Friday last. The buildings and contents were insured for \$900.

A gentleman from Campbellton, says that fishing in that vicinity is the best known for years. The fishermen are reaping a bountiful harvest.

The Fairville fund is steadily growing, but the amount is still short of the \$2,000 originally asked for.

The fire losses in Fairville, aggregating about \$22,000, have been adjusted, generally, by F. R. Boucher, on behalf of the insurance companies. The losses on property not insured would probably exceed this amount by one-third.

The Chatham World tells of two Douglasfield boys who captured the contents of two fox dens—eighteen young and two mother foxes.

A house at Randolph, owned by Randolph & Baker and occupied by Robert Carrier and Walker Smith, was burned to the ground on Wednesday. Insured for \$600.

A store and dwelling at Harvey, York Co., owned by Stanley Grange, was destroyed by fire on Tuesday. Insured for \$1,850.

While Fred Moore and his son Miles were driving along Main street, near Connell's foundry, Woodstock, their horse took fright. Both were thrown out and Mr. Moore himself struck violently on his back, causing him severe internal injuries. It was feared at first that he would be paralyzed, but he is regaining the feeling in his limbs and it is hoped his injuries are not dangerous.

The red granite works at Carleton will be closed in about two weeks. The plant will be at once removed to Calais, and work resumed there.

Several weeks ago the death of a boy named Otis Smith, at Washdenook, was reported, diphtheria being given the cause of his death. The hurried burial existed suspicion, and investigation was made which has brought out the fact that the boy was killed by a blow from an axe in the hands of his brother, who is demented. The parents told the story about diphtheria to shield the boy who killed his brother.

George Travers, at work loading a steamer at Nelson, North. Co., was struck by a sling of deals and knocked into the hold. He fell 31 feet upon an iron tank, breaking his thigh and receiving other injuries.

#### Nova Scotia.

The sale of the Kaye Simonds gold mine at Montagu, owned by John C. Oland, to an English syndicate represented by Woodhouse, Boyd & Harrington, has been completed. The price is stated to be about \$25,000. It is understood the new company will vigorously work the property.

Arthur M. Wrayton was drowned while crossing from the mainland to his home on Emerald Isle, Barrington, N. S. He was 42 and leaves a wife and 10 children. Deceased's father, brother and sister were drowned at the same place a few years ago.

The claim of Mayor Thomas of Truro, for false imprisonment by the government and legislature of Nova Scotia, has been filed at Halifax. It is for \$50,000 damages with \$650 expenses.

Miss Belle Main, daughter of W. D. Main of Amherst, was slightly burned about the head and face on Monday last, through the sudden igniting of some oil while lighting a fire in a stove. The explosion which followed the igniting of the oil, blew the stove top off and caused the flame to go full into the unfortunate lady's face.

A fire occurred May 18, on Hog Island, adjoining Annapolis, consuming a barn owned by Mr. T. S. Whitman and used as a storehouse, together with its contents, including a team of oxen, boats, etc. Shortly after, one of the evaporating buildings caught fire by some sparks being carried against it by the wind.

Annapolis Liberals have selected Henry Munro as their candidate for the vacant seat in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly.

A couple of days ago a dead whale, 57 feet long, drifted ashore near Shulles, N. S. and also a dead shark.

During an altercation at River Harbour, N. S., Albert Bowles (colored) discharged a revolver at Jonathan Smith, a white man. The shot missed its mark. Bowles immediately sent two bullets into his own head, but, as the muzzle of the revolver was close to his head when discharged, the wounds were not immediately fatal, and hopes are yet had of his recovery.

William B. Spencer, a prominent Halifax grocer, dropped dead in his store Friday night. He had been out for a walk, returned, was seized with hemorrhage of the lungs, and immediately expired.

The Dominion Parliament has voted \$1,500 for public building in Halifax, \$15,000 for Dartmouth post office, and \$10,000 for post office and custom house at Lunenburg.

Annapolis had a fire Friday. A house owned by John Orde was destroyed. Insured.

The steam saw and planing mill of J. & A. Carson, at Pictou, were totally destroyed by fire, with all their contents, Saturday night. An adjoining warehouse was partially burned. No insurance.

#### Other Provinces.

Mr. Albert Gaudet, of Summerside, took about two thousand lobsters in his traps on Wednesday last.

The new Quebec Premier has ordered that the bar in the Legislative buildings be dispensed with.

On Sunday of last week the family of R. Switzer, of Tilsonburg, Ont., partook of some toaststools in mistake for mushrooms, but none seemed seriously ill until Monday evening, when medical aid was summoned, but it was too late to save the life of the young child, a daughter about three years old, who died.

It is understood that the deficit of the Quebec government under the Mercier regime amounts to over \$1,600,000. The expenses of the past fiscal year were \$4,600,000, and the revenue \$3,000,000. In the past the Quebec government has allowed subsidies to the extent of half a million to the charitable institutions of the province. The new government has decided to cut them down to about \$300,000, and it has also sent out a circular stating that these charitable bequests are to be done away with after this year until the revenue comes up to the expenditure.

The Ogilvie Milling Co., Winnipeg, has received reports from its agents at all points in the province and Territories regarding the seeding operations which are most favorable as compared with past years. There will be a slight increase all round in the average of wheat. If no setback occurs before the end of the month, as was the case in May, 1891, the growing grain will be considerably further advanced over the condition at the close of the month last year.

Mr. Thomas Jones, of Mitchell, Ont. has paid about \$11,000 to farmers in that district lately for cattle and hogs destined for the British market.

A 12-year-old boy named Joseph Badjero committed suicide by hanging himself with a trace chain in his father's stable at Orilla. He was dead when found.

Greeves, Liberal, has been re-elected in North Perth, Ont., by an increased majority.

Morris motion abolishing the Quebec legislative council was defeated by a vote of 19 to 44, only three conservatives voting aye. It is the general belief that sympathy for Premier DeBoucherville, who sits in the upper house defeated the motion.

C. W. George and Chas. Wells attempted to row across Toronto bay in a small boat. They had not proceeded far, however, before their boat capsized. Both were drowned.

J. J. Curran, M. P. during a speech at the laying of the corner stone of the Board of trade building quoted figures from the census returns, showing that Montreal's industrial establishments had grown from 1,467 in 1881 to 1,736 in 1891, with a capital of from thirty-two to forty-two millions. In 1881 these establishments employed 23,335 hands, and in 1891 38,562, while the value of the products increased from \$52,000,000 to \$72,600,000.

Rev. Father Chirouse was convicted at Lillooet, B. C. of having ordered publicly flogged Lucy, a young Indian girl, on March 8 last. The girl has been accused of immorality and the priest ordered her to receive 30 lashes. The girl was stripped of everything but her chemise, and the lash—a stiff rawhide whip—laid on by a professional flogger. The punishment almost killed the girl. The prosecuting magistrate, Hon. C. F. Cornwall, sentenced the priest to twelve months imprisonment. Kullapowken, chief of the Fountain tribe of Indians, received a sentence of six months for abetting the flogging.

The weather in Manitoba is unusually cold for this season. There was frost Thursday night.

#### United States.

Fred S. Bunker, of Biddeford, Me., aged 38, was drowned, May 16th, while driving logs in the river.

The engineer of the Sunday morning milk train, as it was approaching Rochester, N. H., May 15th, saw a woman lying across the track. He gave a warning whistle, but her only response was to raise her head and deliberately place her neck on one of the rails.

The engine and tender passed over her, severing the head from the body. The suicide was Mrs. Thomas Downing, who supported a large family.

In the House of Representatives, Boston, May 20th, the bill requiring that sales of liquor shall only be made to guests in connection with food was passed to be engrossed: 104 to 86.

There was a blinding snow storm in southern, central and northwestern part of Wisconsin, May 19th. A despatch from Humboldt said: "The heaviest snow storm of the season began here at 2:30 o'clock and still continues."

An Associated Press reporter's trip by boat from St. Louis to Cairo reveals sad pictures on either side of the Mississippi River, which is from 10 to 20 miles wide and is carrying down great piles of drift wood, dating away homes, drowning stock, submerging cotton lands and islands along the section of river traversed. It is estimated that ten thousand people have been rendered homeless and 500,000 acres of grain destroyed completely. To detail the loss is impossible. Every one within the low-lying district along the river has been driven from home and ruined. The scene cannot be described.

#### British and Foreign.

New Zealand has been visited by a tremendous hurricane, by which railway embankments have been washed away, crops destroyed, houses unroofed, and many human lives sacrificed.

A cable from St. John's, Nfld., says it is rumored that the government party intend to accept the modus vivendi with Canada, giving Canadians half.

It is reported that the Newfoundland government was defeated on a vote on the bait question.

Three villages near the town of Erivan, on the Zenghi, have been destroyed by earthquake. Twenty-seven persons were killed, and a large number of others injured. The most solid buildings in the three places collapsed. Many harrowing scenes were witnessed.

It is stated that at a cabinet council in London, May 20 it was decided to dissolve parliament on June 20.

A hurricane, unprecedented in violence passed over Mauritius April 29, causing enormous damage to shipping. A majority of the vessels at the island were blown ashore. The western half of Port Louis, the capital, was devastated, houses blown down and gigantic trees uprooted. The loss of life is appalling. A large number of persons were caught in the falling houses and crushed to death; others lost their lives by being struck by flying debris. Half of the crops—sugar, rice, coffee and pepper—are utterly ruined.

Deeming was hanged Monday morning, at Melbourne, Australia.

The village of Hamley, Wiltshire, Eng., was destroyed by fire Thursday. Three hundred persons are left destitute.
