## News of the Week.

## New Brunswick.

The work of erecting a new cheese factory in Prince William, about twenty-five miles above this city, has been commenced.

The last drive has come into the Mitchell boom, and rafting was resumed there on Thursday. There are 2,000,000 to raft. The water in the river is still unprecedentedly low.

Robert K. Vanenburg of Port Elgin, aged 19 and unmarried, was found lying dead on the deck of a schooner in the river at Port Elgin. A coroner's inquest was held the verdict of the jury being that the deceased was shot by the accidental discharge of a gun in his own hands.

The trial of Geo. W. Slipp, in Charlotte county court resulted in the disagreement of the jury, which was equally divided.

Ald. Connor of St. John returned from the Upper St. John Wednesday night. He reports the work of track laying on the Tobique Valley railway progressing rapidly and says the road will be ready for traffic in about four weeks. The Tobique Valley is to be operated by the C. P. R.

Buck, under sentence of death for the murder of Policeman Steadman, shows no sign of weakening, preserving his stolid demeanor, and frequently swearing at those who call to see him. Jim his partner in crime, is said by the penitentiary officials to be an excellent prisoner. He works in the bucket-making department, chiefly painting; and while very tractable refuses to give his name or any details of his past life.

The trial of Odbur and Charles McMichael for the murder of Fred Titus at St. Marys, will take place in Fredericton in January.

The writ has been issued for the St. John election. Nomination is on November 15th, and election on the 22nd. Sheriff Harding is returning officer.

Potatoes shipments to the United States are being made now from all parts of the Maritime Provinces. Besides the large quantities of potatoes being sent by rail from the upper western counties of New Brunswick about 15 carloads per day are being sent through St. John from parts east and north including Prince Edward Island. Some of the shipments are transferred to the I. S. S. Co's steamers here and forwarded to Boston. Others are forwarded through by rail.

About three days ago a large swarm of bees lodged between the walls in the residence of Mr. John T. Gibson at Marysville. While the workman who are repainting the house were at work the other day they discovered that a large quantity of honey in the comb had been deposited between the walls. Upon taking off several of the clapboards swarms of bees were seen. About 40 pounds of honey have already been taken out and it is said that there is left about 300 pounds.

Gordon McLannaghan, one of the two men who were scalded in the pulp mill Chatham recently, has died at the Hotel Dieu at that place.

A lad named Britt, met with a very painful accident on the government pier. He attempted to jump upon a lorry which was being moved down the track to ward a steamer, and in doing so fell. His right leg was caught by the flange of the wheel, which, passing over it between the ankle and the knee, lacerated the flesh terribly.

A Montreal despatch says: Among the rumors current here is one to the effect that Hon. John Costigan will be made governor of New Brunswick immediately; that his place in the cabinet will be taken by Mr. J. Douglas Hazen, and that an election to fill the existing vacancy in St. John will be held at the same time as that for the selection of Mr. Hazen as minister.

Shortly after the close of the poll at Midgie on Saturday in the course of a fight, William Phinney was twice stabbed in the body by Arthur Estabrook, jr., of Midgie. Phinney bled profusely but was able to walk home. The wounds are slight. Papers were issued on Monday for Estabrook's arrest but so far he has eluded the constables, and it is supposed he has skipped westward.

A gang of 45 French Canadians from the vicinity of Memramcook passed through St. John bound for Houlton to work on the Bangor and Aroostook railway.

Cable advices reported a strong advance in sugars. Light reduces his estimate of the coming crop of beet sugar by over 200,000. All cane sugars are withdrawn from the market and holders are asking much higher prices. The market here has stiffened very much and holders are firm, and asking advance over last week's quotations.

## Nova Scotia.

"The same 'old gang' of summer burglars arrived in town again last Friday night and forced an entrance into the Bank of Nova Scotia agency on Queen street. No attempt was made to open the safe by dynamite or otherwise.—Bridgetown Monitor.

Nova Scotia has a new mining town which is going ahead at a rapid rate. Not long ago a farmer who owned a large farm some nine or ten miles from Pictou sold his property for \$2,100. Since the opening up of the iron works at this place, Ferrona, some 120 houses have been put up for the miners. Shops are going up on all hands, and in the course of a short time Ferrona will be a town of considerable importance.

Hugh McGillivray of St. Peter's, C. B., miner, was killed at Robertson's Cove by the falling of a tub filled with iron ore upon him while at work in a shaft. The shaft is 75 feet deep and when the tub was within eight feet of the surface the hoisting cable broke, precipitating the loaded tub upon the head of the unfortunate man below. Deceased was employed in developing a deposit of iron owned by parties in Antigonish. He leaves a wife and family.

A lad of 15, named Everett Brown, of Wolfville, N. S., strangled himself with a towel last Monday evening. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

At Truro last Sunday morning, Murdoch Haley, a laborer, was awakened by the crying of the baby. He called his wife, and receiving no answer, shook her and was horrified to find she was dead. She had been addicted to drink.

Hantsport is more heavily interested in shipping than in any place of its size in the Dominion. Six steamers and thirty-three sailing vessels are owned there. Fifty sea captains are on the assessment roll of the village and there is scarcely a family that has not some member at sea. There are two large shipyards owned by Messrs. J. B. North and E. Churchill & Sons.

Schooner Aberdeen from Portland, Me., bound to P. E. Island put into Liverpool to land Edward Hamilton, having been picked up 25 miles off Thatcher's Island. He was getting astray from the fishing schooner Matthew McLean, and was 50 hours in a dory before being rescued.

Two boys, aged 18 and 20 years, named Almon and Donville, have confessed that they were the attempted wreckers of the Sydney train. They say they earned a dollar, went to Leitches creek to "blow themselves," and while under the influence of the liquor committed the crime.

## Other Provinces.

The entire business portion of the village of Kagawong, Manitoulin Island, has been destroyed by fire. The loss is placed at \$15,000. The burned buildings include the Havelock hotel.

According to official reports sixty-five British Columbiaschooners cleared for the sealing ground this season. Their crews included 925 white men and 491 Indians. The schooners carried 273 boats and 250 hunting canoes. The total catch was lower coast 4,579; upper coast 4,582; Asiatic 14,905; casual, 1,000. Total 46,465.

The Sir John Macdonald memorial committee decided that Hamilton McCarthy, the Toronto sculptor's proposition to erect a bronze statue of the late premier should be accepted subject to the amount of \$10,000 being raised for that purpose.

A woman named Sarah Burne, employed at the Russell House, Ottawa, was crushed to death in an elevator. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

In an interview regarding the position of the government on the Manitoba school matter, Sir John Thompson said: "The subject has not been taken up and will not be until the pending appeal is heard by the privy council. The hearing of this appeal has been postponed in consequence of the wish expressed by the counsel for the appellants to procure further papers from Winnipeg. Until then, of course, no minister will express an opinion as to what shall be or shall not be done."

At Duck Lake, Grigore Acad was sentenced to six months' imprisonment for giving liquor to an Indian woman on Beady's Reserve. Man. The woman became drunk, and fell into the fire in the tepee, and was found with her limbs and the lower portion of her body burned to a cinder. There is a large hole in her body and portions of her clothes are saturated with blood. The doctor does not expect her to live. There is strong suspicion of foul play.

Last Wednesday night Mr. Thos. Liston, of Kingston, aged 71 years, suffering from rheumatism, rushed downstairs to tell his wife he was dying. He told his daughter-in-law, then gasped and fell dead in her arms. At midnight the wife also departed. They were of one age and will be buried together. Mr. John Liston, the son, has been greatly afflicted. Four of his children were burned to death some years ago.

Mrs. Omer Trudel, a married woman residing with her husband in Quebec was burnt to death in her own house through the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Through her own heroic exertions and those of several neighbors the lives of her three children were saved.

Full particulars have been received of the death by drowning of Chief Factor Belanger and Stanley Simpson of the Hudson Bay Co., near Norway House. The accident occurred on Oct. 1st. Belanger and Simpson clung to the canoe after being upset. The chief factor could not swim and was kept on top of the boat as long as Simpson could hold him there, both finally dropping off through sheer exhaustion. Simpson's body has not yet been recovered.

## United States.

Fred. W. Smith of Carmel, Me., while deer hunting with a party in township 28 forty miles east of Bangor, on the C. J. stage road, was taken for a deer by his companion, Forest Archer, while prowling through the woods. A 38 calibre bullet entered the back of his head and came out over the right eye. Smith was carried to Bangor in an open carriage. Archer is an old hunter and talks coolly of the affair. The party exonerate him from all blame.

Wm. Bonner, aged 28, died at Jersey City, N. Y., Oct. 26. The physician who attended him pronounced it a genuine case Asiatic cholera. It will be investigated.

Mrs. Bridget Lynch of Lewiston, Me., died at the age of 101 years on Sunday morning. She was born in Ireland, and emigrated to America 25 years ago, landing at St. John, and sometime afterwards going on to Lewiston. Mrs. Lynch was a small woman being but four feet seven inches in height. She led an industrious and temperate life and was the oldest person in Lewiston by almost a decade.

Four of the sailors of the Nova Scotia barque "A. B. Cann" have a complaint to make against her skipper, Captain Durkee, who brought her into Hamilton Roads from Iloilo after a gallant struggle against beri-beri and hunger, two weeks ago. They say the barque was leaking when her cargo was stowed at Iloilo, and that the skipper did not take enough provisions along to last him for the voyage. He ran short when six weeks out, and spoke a British barque to get supplies, but the barque had nothing to spare. He declared, the sailors say, that the man were lazy when they were sick. They offered the skipper \$500, if he would use it to pay for a tow from a passing steamship, but he refused.

## British and Foreign.

The minister of marine has received a letter conveying the warm thanks of the Japanese minister of foreign affairs for the recent recognition of the human treatment shown the shipwrecked Canadian steamer by the inhabitants of Looch Koo Islands.

The Star cable says: London, Oct. 28.—The Board of agriculture has not yet given a decision regarding the alleged outbreak of pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian cattle, but Principal Williams and Prof. Owen Williams of the new veterinary college, Edinburgh, report that excreta taken from the animals and examined by them presents all the signs of bronchial pneumonia or cornstalk disease, which is non-contagious. In the face of this the board of agriculture will hardly be likely to schedule Canadian cattle.

Sir Charles Tupper has been appointed British plenipotentiary with Lord Dufferin British minister to Paris, to negotiate a commercial treaty between France and Canada. The French government has expressed its readiness to consider the question immediately. Canadian goods are now admitted into France on the maximum tariff, while the goods of other countries, like Norwegian and Swedish lumber competing with the products of Canada's forests, enjoy minimum tariff. Canada desires the minimum tariff too.

Henry B. Ryder, formerly United States consul at Copenhagen was convicted of theft, fraud and perjury and sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment with hard labor. The charges were connected with testamentary estates that had been intrusted to him in his official capacity.

The pope has granted a dispensation for the marriage of Princess Marie, the eldest daughter of the Prince of Edinburgh, and Prince Ferdinand, the Crown Prince of Roumania. The princess is a Protestant and the prince a Catholic.

The Banking Schooner E. B. Phillips, owned by George Moore of Heats Content, Nfld., foundered in the recent gale while at anchor in the Newfoundland banks, with all on board. The following are the names of the unfortunate men: Edgar Hopkins, captain, leaving a wife and one child; Archibald Hopkins, unmarried; John Hopkins, leaving a wife and child; William Babstock, leaving a wife; Frank Babstock, leaving a wife and child; John Burrage (son of John) unmarried; Jos. Piercey, unmarried; Thos. Legge, unmarried; Silas Reall, unmarried; James Ryall, unmarried; Simon Frost, unmarried. The Phillips was an American vessel, about 30 years old, and said to be in an unfit state for the bunk-fishery. She was not surveyed in the spring and was in a leaky condition during her second trip.

There is no purpose whatever on the part of the present government to annex Samoa or any other part of it to Great Britain. Both Mr. Gladstone and Lord Rosebery are in favor of leaving things substantially in their present condition, so far as the foreign relations of Samoa are concerned, and any reforms that may be necessary in the local administration of Samoa will be undertaken only with the full consent of Germany and the United States. While it is understood that certain British residents of Samoa are anxious for the annexation of that country to England, no official countenance has been or will be given to their efforts while Mr. Gladstone is in power.

## Education in Montreal.

"There are said to be ten thousand children in Montreal who do not attend school because their parents are too poor to pay the school fees. Yet Montreal is the richest city in Canada, has probably as many millions as the whole Dominion combined, has a larger number of subsidized (produced by the N. P.) monopolists, and a larger number of the high taxation policy than any other Canadian city. Montreal furnishes an excellent illustration of the rich growing richer and the poor poorer under the fatuous and unjust policy of taxing the many for the benefit of the few."

Commenting on the above statement the Halifax *Witness* says:

It certainly is discreditable to Montreal to have so many of its youth growing up in ignorance. Ten thousand is not likely to be an over-estimate. The trouble is that Montreal has a sectarian school system, and that fees are so much burdensome, raging as they do from 20 cents to \$15 a quarter. Montreal ought to have a free school system. Its immensely wealthy "orders" and "corporations" that hold property for educational purposes ought to do vastly more than they have yet attempted for the education of the poor. But the real root of the mischief is the sectarian system which certain people are eager enough to press upon others. Sectarism is a poor "national policy" which our Dominion seemed at one time determined to adopt. We hope that instead of extending the pernicious system it will be gradually superseded. Another evil very prevalent among the Montreal people is the drinking habit. We venture to say that many who find it "impossible" to pay school fees for their children, are rarely without their tobacco and their whiskey. Quebec is probably no better off than Montreal as to popular education. The best remedy is for the Province to adopt the Free School system. Even a small tax is irksome and worrying. We do not know that any country which has adopted the Free School system would be willing to revert to the old way of doing things. High taxation is to be deprecated; but the heaviest taxes are those that we make heavy by our own evil ways.
