## The Sabbath-School.

### INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Fourth Quarter—Lesson III—Oct. 16

PETER'S VISION.—Acts 10: 1-20.

GOLDEN TEXT.—Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons.—Acts 10: 34.

We are now near the dawn of a new era in the Christian Church. For 10 years the Gospel had been preached and thousands of converts gained. They were chiefly among the Jews, but the Gentiles had also been welcomed, if they would conform to the Jewish rites and become Jews at the same time they became Christians. Now the Church was to be freed from the trammels of Jewish rites and ceremonies. A new era of missions was to be inaugurated, and all nations were to be invited to Christ.

CORNELIUS. THE SEEKER AFTER GOD.—Vers. 1, 2. There was a certain man in Caesarea. Caesarea, the Roman capital of Judea, was situated on the Mediterranean Sea, 30 miles north of Joppa, and about 22 miles south of Mount Carmel, and 47 miles north-west of Jerusalem. It was a city of importance. It was especially a Gentile city. Called Cornelius. Cornelius was probably a true-born Roman, now living at Caesarea. He was a Roman officer. A centurion, i. e. captain of 100 men. He was a devout man, religious, a worshipper of the God. With all his house. Regulating his household on religious principles. He was a praying man. He prayed to God always. Lifting up his heart in supplication for more light and truth. He was full of good works, giving much alms to the people. He was the first pagan baptized by an apostle.

THE DILIGENT SEEKER REWARDED.—Vers. 3, 8. He saw in a vision evidently. He was not in a trance (or a dream); he was praying when the heavenly visitor entered and spoke. About the ninth hour of the day. Three in the afternoon, was one of the stated Jewish hours of prayer. He was afraid. A messenger, evidently from heaven, would naturally cause terror. We are often afraid of our best blessings. Thy prayers and thine alms are come up. Like incense. For a memorial before God. He has never forgotten to answer them, but only waited till the best time came for the answer. And now send to Joppa, where Peter was preaching. He shall tell thee. The angel did not preach the Gospel, but guided him to one who would do it. What thou oughtest to do. Chap. 11: 15, enlarges on this. When the angel was departed, he called, &c. He that is in earnest will pray and work. He will do his best.

PETER'S VISION: PREPARATIONS FOR ANOTHER NEW ERA IN THE CHURCH.—Vers. 9-16. Peter had been led in the direction of the reception of the Gentiles, by his experience in Samaria, where the Holy Spirit smote Jewish prejudices; by the knowledge that Philip had baptized the Ethiopian; and still more by long residence with Simon the tanner. The next step onward is revealed in the vision God sent to Peter. On the morrow, Cornelius' vision was about three o'clock in the afternoon, so that the messengers could not reach Joppa, 30 miles away, till about noon the next day. Peter went up upon the housetop, for the sake of retirement. About the sixth hour. Twelve o'clock noon. He became very hungry. His hunger was a preparation for the vision which ensued. He fell into a trance. Among scientific men a trance is a recognized mental condition, in which the mind loses the consciousness of outer objects and is borne away, into another world of thought. It differs from the dream in that it is unconnected with any natural sleep, and from the vision, because in the latter, the person retains his consciousness. And saw heaven opened. To show him that the teaching of the vision was sent to him from God. A great sheet knit (tied) at the four corners. What the apostle saw was an extended sheet, the four corners of which were held up by cords from the four extremities of the sky. Wherein were all manner, all varieties, clean and unclean alike, of fourfooted beasts, including wild beasts, which were unclean. And creeping things: reptiles, unclean to the Jews, and representing the lowest and most degraded nations. Rise Peter, kill and eat. This divinely communicated abrogation of the law of Moses concerning the choice among living creatures afterwards informs his waking mind that now all the nations are to be alike included among God's people. Not so, Lord. The command was so contrary to his life-long practice, to his cherished beliefs, that Peter could not obey till he was sure that he understood aright. I have never eaten anything that is common: unholly, forbidden to the Jews. And unclean. No greater shock to a Hebrew could be imagined than to be told to assuage his hunger by eating unclean meats.

What God hath cleansed, that call not thou common. Thou is contrasted with G. D. The meaning is not that "all forms of humanity, though debased in ignorance and vice," are clean, but that all of them whom God hath cleansed are clean, and are to be received into the new kingdom on equal terms with the Jews, without their becoming Jews. We should see in every human being a soul for which Christ has poured out his cleansing blood, and do our utmost that he may receive the divine cleansing. This was done thrice. In order to impress the truth; to convince Peter that it was no dream or fancy; to make him certain that it was from God. Was received up again into heaven, showing that it came down from heaven.

PROVIDENTIAL COMBINATIONS.—Vers. 17, 20. While Peter doubted, perplexed as to what this vision... should mean... the men... from Cornelius... stood before the gate.

Note the insight here given us of the working of Providence, and of God's providential answers to prayer. There is no interference with the laws of nature, nor with the free wills of men. But God by his guiding spirit brings the answer. While we pray for help, the help is being provided and guided. The Spirit said unto him. The apostles were under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Three men. The soldier and servants of Cornelius. Arise... get thee down and go with them. Peter was required to do something to show his obedience and faith, and this while the vision was still an unsolved mystery. Doubting nothing: that is a secret of power and efficiency. For I have sent them. Their coming at this juncture would confirm Peter's faith that his vision was from God.

### PRACTICAL HINTS.

There are good men outside of the Church and Christianity. But as soon as they see Christ, they go to him, receive him, and confess him.

Prayers and alms should go together.

All true prayers are held in remembrance by God.

God's blessings are usually communicated to men through other men.

Individuals and churches are led gradually to larger views, and complete truth.

The new truth is not the denial of the old, but its unfolding, its fulfilment.

Perplexing questions are ever arising in the Church. But it is through these perplexities and questionings that the Church makes progress.

The Holy Spirit will guide aright all true seekers for the truth.

The strength of men is not in doubting, but in firm convictions.

### A Pleasant Meeting.

### THE SECRET OF THE LILIES.

Mrs. Hannah Whitall Smith, in a Bible Reading on "The Secret of the Lilies," deals with our inward clothing, the dress of the soul. All women should read and appropriate that leaf, which will bring our minds into proper condition to take up the study as it relates to the clothing of the outward body. To "consider the lilies, is certainly to note how perfect is their attire, pure, simple, beautiful—no family among the flowers is more wonderfully clothed. They grow according to God's plan, and as if they were sure no plan of their own could be as good or beautiful, they drink the dew of heaven and bow to the storms that come.

Some one has said, "If the head and throat are becomingly attired, it makes little difference about the rest of the dress"; but the return to long dresses on the street is most discouraging to those who rejoiced in the convenient short costume that prevailed long enough to make the world believe all women had become sensibly.

A case of malignant scarlet fever, and beyond hope, recently came to my notice. The mother was in despair; she had been an overfond and devoted mother to this only boy. Anxiously she questioned the doctor as to how the disease could have come to him. She had given up her mission and sewing class lest she might bring home contagion, had not mingled in crowds or allowed her little one to play with other children, the sewerage of the house was perfect, and to her the coming of the disease seemed unaccountable. The doctor said, "Madam, I do not know how your child took the fever, but I trust you love him better than the prevailing fashion of wearing a dress on the street capable of bringing home bacteria of the most virulent character." Does it not seem a strange inconsistency for women who are fighting the foe of intemperance, to follow a fashion which may breed disease and death? Long ago Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes said in "The Professor at the Breakfast Table": "Why there isn't a beast or a bird that would drag its tail through the dirt in the way these creatures do their dresses. Because a queen or a duchess wears long robes on great occasions, a maid-of-all-work or a factory girl thinks she must make herself a nuisance by trailing through the street, picking up and carrying about with her—pah! That's what I call getting vulgarly into your bones and marrow... If any man can walk behind one of these women and see what she takes up as she goes, and not feel squeamish, he has a tough stomach... I would not let one of 'em into my room without serving 'em as David served Saul at the cave in the wilderness—cut off his skirts, sir! cut off his skirts!... Don't tell me that a true lady ever sacrifices the duty of keeping all about her sweet and clean to the wish to make a vulgar show... There are some things that no fashion has any right to touch, and cleanliness is one of those things."

In dress as in everything else relating to the moral and physical, we ought to commence with the children. I am thankful for the improved clothing of infants. So much real happiness comes from freedom of limb to enter into all sports as well as gymnastic exercises, that if we can teach children they are never to outgrow this freedom, and be put into tight, cumbersome clothing, a reform in dress will, of necessity, be brought about. I have great hope for the future from the healthful dressing of the children of to-day. Babyhood is a valuable magazine for the use of mothers.
