## News of the Week.

### New Brunswick.

Dr. Barker received a telegram from Ottawa authorizing the release of the American fishing schooner "Hattie Maud," on payment of court fees, wharfage, and all other claims against her while in port. Mr. Gupill, one of the owners, went to Ottawa in connection with the matter.

Geo. McMinn, late traveller for a Toronto rubber company has commenced the erection of a steam mill on the Kent Northern railway, five miles this side of the junction. The mill will contain a number of shingle machines, and will be placed on the site of the one burned some six years ago.

John McElroy, a U. S. pensioner 50 years old, fell and broke his leg near the old Kirk mill on Long wharf. Before he was observed he had lain there for some hours.

About a month ago a number of cattle were brought down river for a city butcher. A steer escaped from the herd and ran loose on the Adelaide road. All efforts to capture the animal were fruitless, and it is still at large. Several efforts have been made to shoot it but so far none has been successful. Several persons have been badly frightened by the steer and one or two, it is said, have been endangered by it. The police will see that the steer is killed or caught at once.

Mrs. Jewett, widow of the late Tyler Jewett of Macnamara, dropped dead from her chair while eating her breakfast. She got up at the usual hour in her usual health and assisted in getting breakfast. A few minutes after sitting down to her meal she became unconscious, and dropped to the floor and died almost immediately. Deceased was forty-five years old.

The matriculation examinations at the university are in progress. There are in all seventeen applicants for admission, of whom three seek for full entrance upon the second year by means of the senior matriculation examination. Some have already passed the June entrance. The counties of Carleton, York, Kings, Queens, Charlotte, St. John, Northumberland, Kent and Gloucester are represented.

Civil service entrance examinations commence on the 8th of November.

The Scott Act majority, in Northumberland, has been swelled by later returns to 290, but all details are not yet in. The French districts knocked out all calculations by going strongly for the act.

One of the painters working on the Suspension bridge, Charles Hill, fell from the cables the other day and caught among the stringers of the bridge. He narrowly escaped dropping into the falls. Some of his ribs are broken.

F. Byrne of Norton station has about completed his new saw and grist mill at that place, and it will be in operation in a few days. It is fitted with a new style of steel boiler and smokestack. The saw mill is a rotary with a daily capacity of about 30,000 feet. This double mill will no doubt prove a great convenience to the people in the vicinity.

John McCarthy, of Chatham a middle-aged bachelor, was taken home at 12 o'clock last Thursday night, drunk. Friday morning his body was found in the room at the Main Road foundry wharf in a few inches of water. It is supposed that he went to that quarter of the town in search of a drink, rolled off a somewhat steep bank at the roadside at that point, blundered into the water, fell down and was drowned.

A quantity of grain and other produce of the farm from Manitoba and the Northwest, which has been on exhibition at Truro, will be sent to Fredericton to be shown in the exhibition there.

On Friday in Carleton a boy aged nine years, son of Captain Kelson, met with a serious and painful accident. He was running behind a cow, when the animal raised one of her feet and kicked him. She struck the little fellow in the mouth, knocking out a couple of teeth and splitting his upper lip to the nose. Several pieces of bone from the jaw were removed.

The mills at Henry Lake, formerly operated by the Quaco Wood Manufacturing Co. and recently purchased by Haley Bros. & Co. of St. John, were burned on Saturday, together with the dwellings and store near by. Two box cars on the track of the St. Martins & Upham railway were also consumed. The track was rendered impassable for some hours. The mills were insured for \$2,000 and Messrs. Haley were preparing to operate them in a short time.

The caretaker of the I. C. R. cattle yards, St. John. Mr. John F. Steadman, is reported missing since Thursday last, and his absence is causing anxiety.

Last Friday night two Buctouche towns were taken to Richibucto and lodged in jail. The constables were fired upon by a crowd in the Potts' woods, and again by another crowd in Butler's woods. They were probably Buctouche towns, who had driven out in advance. More arrests are to follow. The rest of the town is being closely watched, as it is in danger of incendiary fire.

### Nova Scotia.

The Gloucester schooner Addison G. Proctor, with a partial cargo of fish, went ashore during a storm on Beach Meadows, near Liverpool, and became a complete wreck in a short time. The crew was saved.

John O'Neil, a Halifax cooper, while under the influence of liquor, was dancing a can-can on the roof of his dwelling when he fell off to the ground below, a distance of 30 feet. He was picked up unconscious and will likely die.

Albert Gardner and Freeman Abbott, two fishermen, were drowned at Port Monton, Queens county, Sept. 27th, while attending to their nets. Their boat was struck by a squall and overturned.

Eugene Oaks, of Weymouth, N. S., about 45 years of age, attempted suicide at Clare, where he had gone to attend the session of the Supreme Court. Oaks cut his throat, opened an artery at the wrist and then tried to drown himself. When word reached the court room a general rush was made for the shore. Capt. Stewart rescued Oaks in almost a lifeless condition and had the unfortunate man removed to his home. He may not recover. The cause of his rash act is thought to be due to a suit against him which was in progress at the time for the alleged shooting of a horse.

Some time ago a number of cats were sent from Halifax and other places to Sable Island to destroy the rats which were killing the rabbits. The cats becoming very numerous it was decided to send a number of foxes to the island to thin them out. The foxes did the work too well. They not only mowed down the cats but killed all the young birds and destroyed thousands of eggs. This fact has been brought to the notice of the government with the view of having the foxes cleared off the island.

In the death of John Sabean which occurred last Sunday, the 25th inst., at Port Lorne, the county of Anna polis loses its oldest inhabitant, and perhaps there is no one living in the province of Nova Scotia who has arrived at such an extended age, for he had been spared till 20th day of October, he would have reached the full age of 104 years exactly.

Dr. Buchanan's trial will take place next month. New Yorkers, who evince much interest in the trial, are divided in their opinion as to the result. Smith, the principal witness, is said to have made some new admissions lately, among them, it is alleged, that he stated that the late Mrs. Buchanan told him that she would get clear of the doctor even if she had to poison herself. Dr. Buchanan, whose first wife is a native of Halifax, is still in the Tombs.

Joseph S. Belcher, insurance agent and commission merchant, was thrown from his carriage at Halifax, Oct. 2, by his horse running away, and sustained a fracture of the skull. He was picked up unconscious, with blood pouring from his ears, and he died, consciousness not returning. He was about 60 years of age, a prominent Methodist and a very well known citizen. His daughter, who was also thrown out, escaped without injury.

A cable to R. C. Elkin, announced that Capt. W. H. Johnston of the barkentine Merritt, had been drowned at Connahs Quay, Wales. Capt. Johnston, was about 35 years of age and unmarried. He belonged to Port William Station, Nova Scotia. He was a very successful navigator and managed the vessels under his charge with the utmost care.

### Other Provinces.

A boiler exploded in the saw mill of Jos. Lalonde at Embury Village, Ont., Wednesday. Two men were killed and three injured.

Mr. Andrew Gallant, Post Master at Fifteen Point, imported three pounds of white banner oats, last spring, from the Experimental farm at Ottawa. This quantity he sowed on a piece of ground 35x12 yards, from which he harvested three stocks and ten sheaves, yielding four bushels and thirty-two pounds of good clean seed oats.—Summerside Journal.

Laflamme, Q. C., has entered an action for \$5,000 damages against Rev. Wm. O'Meara, curate of St. Gabriel, for alleged libel. The curate is said to have declared from his pulpit that Laflamme was an atheist and infidel.

A despatch received from Vancouver, B. C., declares the sensational report telegraphed from there to the effect that cholera existed on board the Canadian Pacific Railway steamship Empress of India has no foundation whatever. The vessel left Yokohama nine days ago with a clean bill of health and since that time has touched at no port.

It is announced that on Wednesday, Oct. 12 Clifford Calverly, of Toronto, will walk across the Niagara river at the falls, on a three quarter inch cable.

A former named Schmidt, living near Woodlee, Ont., fell from a fence receiving injuries which resulted in his death.

Mercier's country property has been sold to Leclair, to a contractor of Montreal and a friend of the late Quebec premier for \$10,000. At the same time his St. Denis street property was purchased by Sam Dano of Montreal, who had a mortgage of \$3,000 on it, for \$10,000.

There was a sad accident at Hunter River, P. E. I., on Saturday last when the five-year old son of Mr. Daniel McKinnon, station agent, was instantly killed. A New Glasgow man was driving to the station with an express wagon loaded with two barrels of mackerel, and the boy jumped on behind, as he did so the tail board gave way, and the heavy barrels rolled out, and one of them fell on the child, fracturing his skull and breaking his thigh.

Mrs. Thomas Lyons Ashton of Kingston, accidentally threw some hot water on her four year old daughter. The child was frightfully scalded and died in a few hours.

Dunn & Russell report 31 failures last week. For the corresponding week last year the number was 29.

The Salvation army seeders at Toronto have completed their organization. They call themselves 'The United Workers' Church.' Ex-Brigadier Philpot is president.

George Bruce Mitchell, an extensive hardware merchant of St. Louis, Mo., arrived in Perth Tuesday night to visit his parents there. After getting off the train nothing was seen of him till last night, when his dead body was found in the ditch some distance from the railway station with a terrible gash in the back of his head and a cut on his forehead. From all appearances the case is thought to be one of murder to cover robbery.

During a thunder storm, at Rockwood, Ont., Sept. 26, lightning struck the residence of Mrs. Thomas Maud. Mrs. Maud was killed instantly and her son Joseph was seriously injured.

Hon. Mr. Chapleau has made arrangements with the Canadian Secret Service of Montreal to undertake the work of assisting to put down smuggling, particularly of liquor in the Lower St. Lawrence. Detective Grosse, head of the agency, has received his instructions.

The apple export trade is commencing at Montreal in earnest. The shipments last week were over 20,000 barrels. The quality of the fruit is not quite as good as last year. It is feared the bats will not be able to take all the fruit offered Private cables from Liverpool quote green Canadian fruit at from 11 to 13s. per barrel, and of red varieties at 17s. per barrel.

### United States.

The woollen mills of Sayles & Jenks, at Warren, Mass., were totally destroyed by fire on Wednesday. The loss is about \$300,000; insured for about \$270,000. The mills employed about 200 hands.

Fred Wicks, an audacious forger, who has been wanted by the Winnipeg police for several months, was captured on a farm near Carman, Man.

Gabriel DeRosa, the Italian who stabbed and killed his brother Baptiste in a quarrel on Aug. 15th, was found guilty of murder in the first degree. The prisoner was not affected in the least, having evidently expected the verdict. A sentence of imprisonment will be imposed, the capital punishment law having been abolished in Maine.

The steamer H. M. Whitney, of the Metropolitan steamship line, was run into and sunk at 7 o'clock, Sept. 28, in Boston harbor by the Warren line steamer Ottoman, which was coming to the city from quarantine. The Whitney is valued at \$250,000; cargo, \$150,000 to \$200,000. It is thought the vessel can be saved.

The business portion of Bellingham, Minn., was over one-third destroyed by fire, Sept. 28, causing a loss of \$45,000, insurance \$10,000.

Henry Poor & Son of Boston, leather merchants for several generations under the same firm name at 60 South street, have assigned. The immediate cause of the assignment was the burning of the firm's tannery at Winn, Maine, last month, which delayed their delivery of leather and made it difficult to borrow money to meet the maturing obligations. Liabilities are about \$275,000; assets nearly \$500,000, consisting largely of property in Penobscot county, Maine.

During a drunken quarrel at Fall River, Mass., Oct. 2, John Kennedy was stabbed with a pocket knife by his brother-in-law, Maurice Kennedy. Kennedy soon died. Kennedy was arrested. The latter claims he acted in self-defence.

T. J. Lyons, of St. Joseph, Mo., attempted to lecture at Cheyenne, Wyo., Sept. 26, on Romanist Influence in the Public Schools. He was frequently interrupted in his remarks, and at last called upon the police and ushers to clear the hall. Amid a scene of wild confusion this was nearly accomplished. Lyons then took a revolver in each hand and started to leave the hall. At the door Patrick Nolan, a policeman, attempted to disarm him. The crowd closed in upon the two and Lyons commenced shooting. The firing became general and fully 30 shots were fired within a minute. Patrick Moore was shot twice and fatally wounded. Policeman Nolan was stabbed in the face and neck. Lyons finally reached his hotel, where an excited crowd gathered and threatened to lynch him. Later he was arrested and locked up. It is supposed Lyons came to this city under the auspices of the anti-Catholic organization.

At Alton, N. H., Sept. 26, a man named Harriman assaulted an Italian employed on the water works. Some of the Italians met several young men of the town and one of them drew a revolver and fired twice into the party. One ball took effect in the body of B. L. Perkins, aged 24, inflicting a wound which caused death. The murderer has not yet been apprehended. The selectmen offered a reward of \$200 for his capture.

Four men fell 200 feet down a shaft in the Eureka mine in Bessemer township and were killed.

Fire broke out in a livery stable at Wells River, Vt. Sept. 26, and before it was gotten under control nine buildings were consumed. The buildings destroyed include the Wells River House; loss \$12,000, covered by insurance. A heavy rain alone prevented the entire business portion of the village from being wiped out.

### British and Foreign.

The Welsh newspapers declare that Mr. Gladstone has invited an eminent Welsh ecclesiastic to draft a bill for the disestablishment of the church in Wales.

A force under command of Col. Sir W. Lockhart has started on a trans-Indus campaign from Allahabad. The ostensible object of the expedition is to restore peace among the Black Mountain tribes. The British had frequent trouble with these tribesmen. Some Indian newspapers urged the government to put an end to the constant irritation caused by the Black Mountain tribes by annexing the district outright. Col. Lockhart's force consists of 5,000 mixed British and Indian troops.

The sealing schooner "Leon" has arrived at San Francisco from Petropavlofski, and reports the seizure by Russians of two more Victoria sealers and confiscation of their cargoes of 1,800 skins. The crews will be sent to Yokohama.

The government has been notified that a treaty was ratified between Great Britain and the United States on August 1st, under which exchange each country undertakes to restore seamen who may desert from any ship belonging to a citizen of their respective countries while in the ports of the other country, but stipulating that it will not apply to citizens of the country where the desertion takes place.

Seventy-seven per cent of the master cotton spinners of England have decided to enforce a reduction of 5 per cent in the wages of their employees. The men stubbornly refuse to accept the proposed reduction and intend to strike. It is generally admitted in Manchester that a stoppage of work will not be a bad thing for trade, as it will enable the spinners to reduce the present heavy stocks.

Lord Beresford, alias Saney Lascelles, a noted English forger, yesterday was sentenced to six years at hard labor in the penitentiary. He will be taken to the coal mines in Lade county.

Yales Thompson, has sold the Pall Mall Gazette to Mr. Knightly, member of the National Liberal club. It is rumored the paper will become Liberal-unionist in politics.

Lowenfield, proprietor of Kop's ale, is said to be the real purchaser of the Pall Mall Gazette for whom Knightly acted.
