INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

First Quarter-Lesson X. - March 6.

THE DOWNFALL OF JUDAH.

-Jer. 39: 1-10. GOLDEN TEXT. - Behold, your house is left unto you desolate. - Matt. 23: 38.

OBSTACLES IN THE WAY OF THE TRANSGRESSORS. God did everything he wisely could to prevent his people from rushing to their own destruction. (1) He laid upon them several lesser evils as warnings. These were devastations of the country from which a few years were not sufficient to recover. Then Jerusalem was captured and part of its treasure removed, but the city was not destroyed, and the temple stood. Kings were made captive as a warning to coming kings; but new kings were chosen, and the kingdom remained. Leaders of the people were carried captive to Babylon, but their places could be filled. These were warnings, not destruction. (2) These sieges were at intervals of six and twelve years. The doom came slowly, and in mercy, to give time for thought and repentance. (3) Prophets were sent to warn and entreat. Jeremiah had been speaking God's Word to them for forty years in Jerusalem. For nearly ten years Ezekiel, also, from the land of captivity in Babylonian, had been uttering earnest words to the Jews in Palestine. We cannot understand the history of these times without reading these prophecies; nor do we see the meaning of the prophecies without a clear and comprehensive view of the history and the times.

THE GREAT SIEGE. - Vers. 1, 2. Lasting a year and a half, from December, B. C. 588, to July, 586. In the ninth year... in the tenth month of the Jewish year, the month Thebet, corresponding to parts of our December and January, varying with the new moon. Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon. He made Babylon glorious during his reign of 43 years. And all his army. This consisted of the fierce and cruel Chaldeans, with warriors from the surrounding nations, enemies of the Jews. Besieged it. Surrounded it with their armies to prevent all provisions from entering, and to starve it to submission. They built around the city movable wooden towers, sometimes provided with battering-rams, which the besiegers advanced against the walls, thus bringing their fighting men on a level with their antagonists. The hub of the battering-rams shook the walls day and night; catapults of all sizes hurled stones into the town, and darts tipped with fire kindled the roofs of houses; mines were dug under the walls, and attempts by ladders were renewed at every opportunity.

Jerusalem was at this time a city of 20,000 inhabitants. The besieged citizens constructed counter-engines. Houses were demolished, that new walls might be built of their materials, inside each spot weakened by the battering-rams. The ramparts were defended by archers and slingers. The rams were caught, when possible, by doubled chains or ropes to weaken their blows, to capsize them. Famine within the walls aided the besiegers without; and it was speedily followed with an outbreak of pestilence. Food was well-nigh gone. There had long been no bread. Mothers were at last driven to murder and eat their children. In the eleventh year... the fourth month. The middle of June to the middle of July. The ninth day. About July 1. The siege lasted a year and a half.

THE FALL OF JERUSALEM. - Vers. 2, 3. The city was broken up. A breach was made in the walls, and the city was entered at midnight. The entrance was effected by the northern gate. And all the princes. Probably the generals who captured the city. Only four are named, not six, as appears at first sight. Sat in the middle gate. The "middle gate." The Object of this position was to take possession of the city, and also to decide as to what should be done with the prisoners and property taken.

THE FATE OF ZEDEKIAH. - Vers. 4-7. Zedekiah the king... and all the men of war fled. As the invaders were entering from the north, the king fled toward the south, between the two walls of Moriah on his left, and Zion on his right. This path came out in the king's garden, which was laid out near Siloam in the broad space formed by the junction of the Hinnom and Kidron valleys, at the south east corner of the city. And he went out the way of the plain. That led to the plain leading eastward over Olivet to Bethany and Jericho. The Chaldeans' army pursued and overtook him. They brought him up to Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon to Riblah. Riblah was an ancient city, about 200 miles east of north from Jerusalem. Nebuchadnezzar was at this time conducting military operations against Tyre as well as against

Jerusalem, so that Riblah was a favorable centre of operations for him. Gave judgment upon him; i. e. brought him to trial as a common criminal, not as a king. Slew the sons of Zedekiah in Riblah before his eyes... he put out Zedekiah's eyes. The punishment of Zedekiah was doubly cruel; first, his being made to witness the execution of his own sons, and then his being deprived of sight, so that the last scenes impressed upon him would be the death agonies of his children. Slew all the nobles of Judah. His friends' deaths, too, would never be forgotten. Bound him with chains, to carry him to Babylon. And he was kept in prison there till the day of his death.

Lessons from Zedekiah's Experience. (1) He went on in a wrong course against the Word of God, the warnings and entreaties of the prophet, and the experience of his brothers. God made the way of transgressors hard, not merely at the end, but all along the way, by the obstacles he placed in the downward course. (2) The opportunity to be saved was frequently given him; the way was clearly pointed out. (3) He was afraid to do right because of his companions. But they perished, and he with them. (4) There comes a sad "too late," when all efforts to escape are useless.

Remarkable Prophecies fulfilled. God spoke by the tongue of Ezekiel one of the most mysterious and curious predictions in the Bible. He declared that King Zedekiah should be led into Babylon a captive, should there live and there die, and yet he should never see the city. So singular is this record that we must read the verses just as he wrote them out (Ezek. 12: 10-13). Now put with this a parallel passage. Jeremiah was thrown into prison by his monarch. While there under bonds he in like manner predicted the downfall of Jerusalem; and he said that Zedekiah should speak with Nebuchadnezzar mouth to mouth, and see his eyes. Find the exact words (Jer. 32: 3-5).

Mark how the providence of the Almighty stoops, as it were, to work out the details of this almost contradictory prediction. Just two verses in the chapter before us here meet the whole difficulty (2 Kings 25: 6, 7). Nebuchadnezzar was at Riblah, not yet returned to his capital; and the unhappy king of Judah was brought to him, and condemned to have both of his eyes put out. When this was done, the suffering man was led into Babylon. There Zedekiah wore his life away, sad and sightless. So he saw the king, but did not see the city; and thus it was that an Assyrian heathen had unwittingly fulfilled a prophecy of God's Word.

THE COMPLETE DESTRUCTION OF THE CITY AND TEMPLE. - Vers. 8-10. Burned the king's house. The palace, and the temple. And the houses of the people, i. e., all the palaces not the poorer houses. Brake down the walls. Making the city a mass of ruins. Carried away captive into Babylon the remnant of the people. Who had survived the horrors of the siege. And those that fell away. Who had deserted to him during the siege. The rest... that remained. After the several deportations of captives in previous attacks upon the city, 12 and 18 years before. Left of the poor of the people. Who were supposed to be unable to revolt. Among those who remained was Jeremiah.

LESSONS FROM THE CAPTIVITY. The First Object of the captivity was to cure the people of the sin of idolatry. The nation was entirely delivered from the tendency to idolatry, and never afterwards relapsed into it. The Second Object was to cure them of their reliance upon rituals and forms and externals in religion. Hence God allowed even his chosen people, and the city, and the temple dedicated to his worship, to be destroyed, as soon as these became a substitute for true religion instead of an aid to it. The Third Object was to sift the people for the renovation of the nation when the time should come to plant it again in Palestine. The captivity served as a missionary scheme to spread the knowledge of God over the world. It was an aid in preparing the world for the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. The captivity led to the reunion of the twelve tribes again. All the tribes were amalgamated together by the exile and return.

Anniversary Meeting.

The F. W. C. T. U. celebrated its 14th anniversary on Wednesday 17th inst. The audience was not as large as might have been expected, probably due to the unpleasantness of the weather, the evening being cold. At eight o'clock the president, vice-president and other officers of

the union, with his honor Gov. Tilley and Rev. Dr. McLeod took seats on the platform.

The meeting commenced by singing hymn, "Stand up for Jesus." Reading of Scriptures, the good Samaritan, and prayer by Dr. McLeod.

The Secretary's report was then read by Mrs. McLeod, in which it was shown that notwithstanding the many discouragements, much good work in the various departments had been accomplished, and expressing trust in God, looked hopefully into the future.

The Treasurer's report by Mrs. Phillips followed, the details of which were very interesting and encouraging, clearly demonstrating that the union had succeeded financially beyond the most sanguine expectations.

The music which was under the management of Mrs. Lemont, assisted by Messrs. Winter, Crewdson, Spurden, Mrs. Randolph and others, Mrs. Weddall presiding at the organ. "Prohibition is the watchword," was finely rendered, followed by the reading of an original article by Mrs. Sampson entitled, How a W. C. T. U. came to be formed in F. T. O., proving that in the providence of God, the Christian women have been appointed to this work, and although frowned on by some, if God be for us, what are all they that are against us.

Sir Leonard Tilley then gave an interesting speech saying, that when he received the invitation to be present at this meeting, although he had other engagements, such was his interest in this work, he decided to lay aside everything else and attend the entertainment.

He referred to the changed opinion with regard to woman's work, and spoke of a meeting which he attended in Albany, many years ago, in which woman's rights were advocated and found that many of the ideas then advanced are to-day reality. In referring to the franchise, he believed that the time would come when the women would have the privilege and right of the ballot.

He spoke of the effective work now being done by the W. C. T. U. The educating influences of this and kindred institutions was fast preparing the way for the much desired prohibition of the liquor traffic, referred very kindly to the members of the Infantry School corps, many of whom were present, urging them to sign the pledge which would be a safeguard to them through life. Then followed an interesting report of work done by the young ladies of the Y. W. C. T. U., read by Miss Sterling.

Singing by the choir, "Home protection song."

Mrs. Randolph read an account of World's Convention of the W. C. T. U. in Boston.

The president, Mrs. Hart, made reference to a department of work which had been somewhat neglected that of honorary membership, which admits gentlemen with full privileges except that of voting, and His Honor at once made application for membership. The choir then beautifully rendered "There are bands of ribbon white around the world."

A collection was then taken and the entertainment closed by singing the Doxology.
