The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Second Quarter-Lesson I. - April 3.

THE WAY OF THE RIGHTEOUS.

OUS.—Pa. 1:1-6.

GOLDEN TEXT.—Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful.—Ps. 1:1.

THE BOOK OF PSALMS. This book was the Hebrew Hymnal, The Book of Praises, used in worship, especially after the exile.

It is divided into five books, ending with Ps. 41, 72, 89, 106, and 150.

The first book was probably collected by Solomon (B. C. 1000). The second and third books by Hezekiah (B. C. 700). The fourth and fifth books after the return from Exile under Ezra and Nehemiah (B. C. 500-450).

A DESCRIPTION OF THE RIGHTEOUS MAN.—Vers. 1-3. The Psalmist has set down the result of a lifetime of observation, confirmed by the experience of generations.

Blessed is the man. He is blessed in body and in soul; in time and in eternity. *That walketh not,* etc. The negative side of the righteous man's character, his aversion from evil.

We have three degrees of habit, in "walketh," "standeth," "sitteth." Whatever the "wicked" is or does, the righteous is not so.

But his delight is in the law of the Lord. Bad men may sometimes obey the law, but only the good man delights in it. To delight in God's law, to love it, is certain proof of a good man.

This delight does not look at what the law promises, nor what it threatens, but at this only, that "the law is holy, just and good." In the law, the written Word of God, God's law is the expression of God's character; hence he who loves God loves his law.

Of the Lord. Jehovah, i. e., the self-existent, living, eternal God. *And in his law doth he meditate day and night.* Whenever opportunity offers. Both intentionally and unconsciously the good man's thoughts turn to God. The righteous man is happy in the character of his mind.

And he shall be like a tree. The points of resemblance are many and striking. The tree has the properties of life, growth, and fruitfulness. *By the streams of water.* The palm-tree often flourishes in the desert, but its roots always strike down until they reach the living water.

The Christian is sometimes planted in the desert, but God always sends the streams of living water to nourish him. The Holy Spirit guiding and refreshing, the Word of God consoling and instructing, were always in his soul. *Like a tree planted.* The righteous man is not a wild tree, but a tree planted, cultured by God, suggesting God's unceasing care. *That bringeth forth its fruit in its season.* Bearing the fruits of the Spirit, love, joy, peace, etc. Fruit is the infallible test. If there is no fruit, or if the fruit is not good, he is not righteous. If there is goodness in the soul it will produce good fruit. It is also fruit in its season. At every time and on every occasion when God expects and circumstances demand; as patience under affliction, generous gifts in prosperity, words in their season, help for the needy. *Whose leaf also doth not wither.* Leaves are not merely professions of fruit; they are the means by which the fruit grows; they are the lungs of the tree. The tree will die if the leaves are stripped off and kept off. Without leaves there can be no fruit. So all the instrumentalities, or means for bearing fruit, are given to the Christian, faith, love, divine help, promises, motives; and these never fail him so long as he is planted by the waters of God's Word and Spirit. So, too, in those dry times, trouble, sickness, and death, when the worldly streams run dry always, the Christian supplies of comfort and peace which never fail. *And whatsoever he doeth shall prosper.* The righteous man here described will have true prosperity. Nearly all the outward failures arise from failing in righteousness on the part of somebody. The wicked man that gains all the world by his wickedness is a failure, compared with the righteous man who can say, Although the fig-tree shall not blossom, neither shall fruit be in the vines; the labour of the olive shall fail, and the fields shall yield no meat; the flock shall be cut off from the fold, and there shall be no head in the stalls: Yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation. As there is a curse wrapped up in the wicked man's mercies, so there is a blessing concealed in the righteous man's crosses.

THE CHARACTER AND THE REWARD OF THE WICKED.—Vers. 4-6. *The wicked are not so.* They differ from the righteous in character, in the sources of their life, in fruitfulness, in destiny. *But are like the chaff.* Light, shifting, useless, easily carried away. *The wind driveth away.* The very winds that brought life to them at first will

destroy them when they prove themselves chaff. *Therefore.* Because they are hopelessly worthless. *Shall not stand in the judgment.* They shall not stand acquitted, not stand the trial safely. *In the congregation of the righteous.* They shall not be reckoned or regarded as belonging to the righteous. *For the Lord knoweth,* i. e., regards with watchful care and love. *The way of the righteous,* i. e., the tendency and issue of their character and conduct. He knows their struggles; he knows their prayers; he knows where to lead them, the doors of usefulness, the ways into better life and larger usefulness. *The way of the wicked.* Their life, their whole course of action. *Shall perish.* It contains in itself the elements of ruin. The way itself is ruinous. The path leads to final and complete destruction. There is no escape from the end of the ungodly except by ceasing to be ungodly.

those who are now children will need all the spiritual armour that we, under God, can give them for the conflict.

Mr. Meyer based his address upon Eph. 3 ch. 15 ver. In this passage the Revised Version makes it plain that "every family in heaven and on earth is named from God," name being character. That is, every family is so constituted that from it men may learn to apprehend some thing of the nature of the eternal God and the attitude towards Him into which his love should lead us through regeneration. From experience of a mother's love, we pass into the successive stages of companionship, marriage, parentage; and each stage should give increasing insight into the character of Him who is love, that the transient may be confirmed to the external, and that the human may be fashioned after the Divine.

In God's plan, strict obedience is always combined with blessing, a point to be remembered in the government of Christian homes.

OUR MOTTO.—If God be for us, who can be against us.

The Mother's Meeting, this afternoon, conducted by Mrs. Boyce, was very interesting and instructive. Several ladies took part. After reading of Scriptures, Matt. 23: 1-14, Eph. 3: 14-21, and prayer, the chairman introduced the subject chosen, "Parents and families," by a few pleasing remarks and read several extracts from addresses by eminent ministers given during the week of prayer, of which we subjoin a few.

Rev. Robert Taylor, of Norwood, having referred to the special subject for prayer, "Parents and Families," proceeded: It has occurred to me that possibly some, even of those who are Christians, miss somewhat of the sacredness and solemnity of the family relation. We are so familiar with it, we are apt to overlook that it is constituted by God Himself, and that its foundations lie deep in the nature He, as Creator, has given us. Furthermore, He has given in his word many wholesome rules for the guidance of those who hold this family relationship, while He has also given many great and precious promises of grace and blessing to the families that call upon Him. Connected with these promises we have the fact that He is the Father of all, and in Him every family in heaven and on earth is named. And all this is summed up and centered in the great acts and words of Jesus when He took little children in his arms and blessed them, and said, "Suffer the little children to come unto Me, for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

THE THOUGHT OF GOD AS OUR FATHER.

And going a step further we have in the family relation not only a symbol of the fatherhood of God, but also, I venture to suggest, a shadow of the deepest of all mysteries, the grandest of revealed truths as to God Himself, that of the blessed and Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost. But now a word or two of exhortation. If the relation of father, mother and child be a symbol and shadow of these verities, "what manner of persons ought we to be in all holy conversation and godliness?" We pray that parents may instruct their children in Bible knowledge. One of my earliest recollections is of a godly old minister who, after expounding to the children the fifth commandment, turned to the parents and said, "Honour thy father and mother. Then you fathers and mothers must be honourable. If you would be honoured you must be worthy of honour." I would the reminder were laid to heart.

Rev. Mr. Kelly said:—Only those who have faith in God and his Word, can look upon the world even with composure, much less hope; but thank God, his truth is spreading as never before. There is very little hope to-day, as far as a large proportion of the adult population is concerned; but the work of the church among the young is a most encouraging field, for, if we can obtain but one holy generation, what a mighty change there will be in the whole of our land, and in our good influence upon the world!

Real family happiness, continued the speaker, does not depend upon wealth and its attendant circumstances, but upon character. It is a lamentable but common error that the devil has a mortgage upon young lives until about sixteen years of age. To act upon such a thought is like putting a newly-born child outside the front door. Surely they who can ask for bread may well be taught to ask for grace. Shall God hear the pleading of a vile reprobate and spurn a child's cry? God's solitude for the well being of the young is seen in some six hundred references between Genesis and Revelation, to childhood and youth, and how much comfort there is in the unmistakable teaching of the blessed Saviour on the Subject. In the coming struggle as to belief and life,

The Duty of the Teacher to the Sunday School.

1 He should find out what teaching is.

2 He should study methods of teaching.

3 He should pray without ceasing.

4 He should be prompt.

5 He should encourage his scholars to be prompt.

6 He should take part, and encourage his scholars to do so, in all the opening and closing exercises.

7 He should use the Bible, not the quarterly, while teaching.

8 He should try to direct the reading of his scholars.

9 He should call on all his class at their homes at least once a quarter.

10 He should invite the class to his home.

11 When unable to be present, he should write to the class, enclosing his contribution.

12 He should notify the superintendent if he intends to be absent.

13 If unable to notify the superintendent he should send a substitute.

14 If obliged to be away from the class for any length of time, or if any of the scholars are, he should write to them.

15 On taking a new class, he should write to all absentees inviting them to be present the next Sunday.

16 He should encourage the scholars to study the lessons.

17 He should attend the teachers' meetings.

18 He should give all he can to the school.

19 He should be faithful in looking after absentees.
