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The remainder of this session was occupied in appointing the necessary committees. Saturday evening at 7.30 an enthusiastic missionary service addressed by Miss Hooper was held. Collection for Woman's Foreign Missionary fund \$9.

Sunday a largely attended and spiritual prayer and social service, led by Rev. A. H. Bonnell convened at 9 a. m.

At 10.30 the new church edifice was dedicated by the following order of ceremony.

1. Invocation by Rev. A. H. Bonnell.
2. Singing.
3. Scripture reading and prayer by Rev. A. G. Downey.
4. Singing.
5. Sermon by Rev. J. T. Parsons, Text Hagai 2-7.

8. Dedication Prayer by Rev. F. C. Hartley.
9. Singing.
10. Benediction by Rev. J. T. Parsons.

At 3 p. m. Rev. A. G. Downey preached from Matt. 27:29 and Rev. 19:12. At the close of which the Lord's Supper was administered to 33 communicants.

At 7 p. m. Rev. F. C. Hartley preached from John 7:24. These services were well attended many persons not being able even to find standing room inside and having to content themselves by standing outside near the windows.

Monday morning regular business was called at 8.45. Rev. A. G. Downey was unanimously elected chairman. The resignation of District Clerk J. A. Vanwart was then read. Upon motion of Rev. J. T. Parsons it was unanimously resolved. That the said resignation be regretfully accepted and that a vote of thanks to Bro. Vanwart for his faithful services during the past year be heartily extended to him.

Upon ballot Woodbury Shepherd was elected clerk.

On motion of Rev. J. T. Parsons it was resolved that this meeting do now elect a new District treasurer. On Ballot Bro. Geo. F. Atherton was elected treasurer.

The report of committee on Delegates to General Conference was adopted as follows:

Rev. F. C. Hartley was appointed to preach the next annual sermon.

The report of committee on summarizing church reports was adopted as follows:

Bro. Moderator: Your committee find that 15 out of the 20 churches in this district have sent in reports showing a membership of 1,472, an actual increase over the report of last year of 42 but owing to the Douglas Church revising its Roll and dropping 93 names, many of whom were dead and the remainder non-resident, there is an apparent decrease of 51. The number of baptisms is somewhat smaller than in some of the years of the past but 32 are reported as following Christ in his ordinances; a number not to be despised and it may be the seed so faithfully sown during the last year will result in a better showing in the future. All of the churches reporting have had pastoral care all or a part of the time and this shows that pastoral oversight has much to do with the life of the church.

The S. School interest so encouragingly reported in all but two of our churches owes it largely to the interest taken by the pastors in this work. There is a good showing of money invested in church property. No less than \$17,000.00 and doubtless the churches not reporting would make the amount still larger. We regret to say that only four of our churches report contributions to Home Missions. It is to be hoped others will still do so before Conference. This is something that none of the churches can afford to neglect as it is from the voluntary contributions of the churches that this important interest is sustained. The interest in Foreign Missions is somewhat better but we think in view of the membership of our churches much more might have been accomplished. We also find the Prayer and Conference meetings among the churches reported are generally well sustained and the communion regularly administered. The money raised for the support of the Ministry though better in some respects than in the years that are past is not sufficient to give the amount of labor that the necessities of the churches demand, and we sincerely hope that there will be a continual improvement in this direction. \$129. the average of the money paid for pastoral care in this district is hardly sufficient to meet the demands of this department of our work. Your committee declines making any recommendations but hope in committee of the whole such suggestions may be made as will result in the best interest of the District and Denomination.
