The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Third Quarter—Lesson VI.—August 7.

THE APOSTLES CONFIDENCE
IN GOD.—Acts 4:19-31.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*They spake the
word of God with boldness.*—Acts
4:31.

VAIN ATTEMPTS TO STOP THE
PROGRESS OF THE GOSPEL BY
THREATS.—Vers. 19-22. *But Peter
and John answered the mandate to
cease preaching the Gospel. The
gentle John was just as firm and
true as the more impulsive Peter.
Whether it be right, etc. The point
of the reply was that they were not
teaching as self-appointed rabbis,
but were only acting as witnesses of
Jesus. "Whether it be right!" That
is the word that thrills the ages.
In the sight of God to hearken. They
will not even hearken to those who
command disobedience to God. *Un-
to you more than unto God.* In this
matter, they should hearken unto
God, and not to man at all. Judge
ye. Your own consciences approve
the principle. *For we cannot but
speak.* To be silent would have
been treachery. So Luther, when
pressed to stay away from the Diet
at Worms, where he was to be tried
for heresy, said to the messenger,
"Go tell your master that though
there should be as many devils as
there are tiles on its roof, I would
enter it." *Which we have seen and
heard.* They could not cease to
testify to the facts they knew about
Jesus Christ. The salvation of the
world depended on the apostles con-
tinuing true to their duty. To yield
would be like putting out the light
of a lighthouse on a dangerous
shore.*

The Rule of Right. Here, then,
ought to be our rule, to do the right.
The right, not the profitable; the
right, not the pleasant; the right,
not the fashionable; the right, not
that which leads to earthly honor.
And to know what is right, we
must betake ourselves, not to any
human statute book, but to the di-
vine law. For the Christian rule
is to do that which is right in the
sight of God. In business the ques-
tion is not what others do, but what
is customary; not what will bring
the largest returns, but what is
right in God's sight. *Further
threatened... anding nothing how
they might punish them.* They were
able to invent no charge which they
felt it safe to adopt. *Because of
the people.* The people just then
favored the disciples. *For all men
glorified God.* To have imprisoned
the apostles would have appeared to
the people as fighting against God.
For the man was above forty years.
An indication of the inveterate
nature of his infirmity. And a
proof of the reality of the miracle
in his cure.

THE APOSTLES SUSTAINED BY THE
WORD OF GOD.—Vers. 24-28. *They
went to their own company.* To the
place of common resort for the dis-
ciples. *And reported all.* The feel-
ing of the Jewish leaders and how
the Lord had sustained them. All
this would strengthen the young
church. *They lifted up their voice
to God with one accord.* A concert
of hearts; the prayer was chiefly
praise; the whole company sang the
second Psalm, and Peter applied the
contents to their situation. *Which
hast made heaven, and earth, and
the sea.* The apostles were strong,
because they relied on the omni-
potent power of their Heavenly Father.
*Who by the mouth of thy servant
David, hast said, Why did the heathen
rage? Why this attempt to throw
off the yoke of the true king? It is
Jehovah himself, in the person of
the King whom he has set on his
throne. Heathen. Gentiles, repre-
sented by the Roman soldiery and
officials. The people. All opposed
to Christ. Imagine. Scheme, plot.
Vain things. In which they could
not succeed, namely the destruction
of Jesus. The kings of the earth.
Represented by the Roman power.
All kings of that day were living in
direct opposition to the principles
of Christ. *Stood up.* Took a fixed
and determined resistance. *Rulers
were gathered together.* Answers to
Took counsel together. *Against the
Lord God the Father.* Against his
Christ his Anointed One, the Mes-
siah. *For of a truth.* Now begins
the application of this Psalm. What
David prophesied has proved true.
Against thy holy. Holy, as here
applied to Christ, denotes not only
character, but office. *Child.* The
word rendered child in our English
version is the same as servant.
Anointed. The form of consecration
to a sacred office. *Both Herod and
Pontius Pilate.* An account of their
union against Christ is given in
Luke 23:12. *The people of Israel.*
The reference is either to the dif-
ferent tribes of Israel. *Were gathered
together.* In purpose and plans.
*For to do whatsoever thy hand and
... counsel determined before to be
done.* The apostles recognized in
the course of the Sanhedrim, not a
mere transient outbreak, but a
manifestation of that hostility*

against the kingdom of Christ, which
ancient prophecy had foretold. They
also recognized a fulfilment of the
divine plan, and therefore were
neither surprised nor terrified. God
had ordained the end, but not the
means which men used. God had
indeed appointed that Christ should
die for all men. But he had not
foreordained or decreed the means
by which his death was brought
about. Even man's wrath is made
to work out God's will. God's use
of man's acts, whether they be good
or bad, in no wise destroys man's
free choice or his responsibility.
But God governs in this world. He
will carry out his plans by man's
good acts, if he will do good; but
by his bad acts, if he persists in
being bad. Here is the hope and
comfort of the Christian.

THEIR PRAYER IN TROUBLE.—
Vers. 19, 30. *Lord, behold their
threatenings.* Thou seest what we
need under these circumstances.
And grant... that with all boldness.
They do not ask exemption from
persecution and trouble; they only
pray that they may do their duty.
*By stretching forth thine hand to
heal.* As had been done in the case
of the cripple. *Signs.* Of the truth
spoken. *And wonders.* To call the
attention of the people to Jesus.
Miracles were a great and essential
power in giving success to the Gos-
pel.

THE ANSWER TO PRAYER.—Ver.
31. By a new baptism of the Holy
Spirit. *The place was shaken.* To
enable the disciples to realize more
clearly the fact of the Holy Spirit's
presence, just as the sound and the
tongues of flame manifested the
same presence on the day of Pente-
cost. *They were all filled with the
Holy Ghost.* They received all their
souls could contain. The fruits of
the Spirit, love, joy, peace, were
more abundant because of this re-
newed gift. *They spake the word
of God with boldness.* So that with
great power gave the apostles wit-
ness of the resurrection of the Lord
Jesus.

PRACTICAL HINTS.
The test of the true disciple is
that he obeys God at whatever cost.
The true Christian must speak
out what he knows and has experi-
enced of the Gospel.

Christian courage is sustained by
the sympathy of other Christians,
by God's promises, and by the pres-
ence of the Holy Spirit.

Lay every care and burden before
the Lord. "And he will sustain
thee."

The real unity of the church is
seen in their unity of spirit, and
shown in the unity of prayer and
praise.

The Christian must expect the
antagonism of wicked men.

In vain do men oppose the Gos-
pel.

God controls the results of the
bad deeds of bad men. In this be-
lieves comfort and strength.

True prayer desires not so much
to escape from trouble, as to do
right in it, and be enabled by it to
serve God better.

There are immediate answers to
prayers even when there are no vi-
sible signs.

Dominion Convention.

The Dominion Convention of the
W. C. T. U. recently held at Ottawa
seems to have been one of unusual
interest. We give some extracts of
the report as it appeared in the
Woman's Journal.

The cosy Congregational Church
was decorated with beautiful flowers
for the occasion which fully com-
pensated for the absence of the W.
C. T. U. banners which usually
grace Convention walls.

In the lecture room a sumptuous
lunch was provided every day by
the Ottawa Union under the gener-
alship of Madames Borbridge and
Young, and swiftfooted "W's" and
"Y's" attended to every want.

On Friday morning Mrs. (Judge)
Foster, Knowlton, Vice President,
in the absence of Mrs. (Judge)
Steadman, the President, took the
chair and proceeded with the open-
ing exercises.

A touching incident was the
reading of greetings sent by the be-
loved honorary president of the
Union, Mrs. Youmans, who for four
years has been unable to leave the
house; and from the president, Mrs.
Steadman, the illness of whose hus-
band prevented her being present.
Mrs. Youmans wrote:—

"As one who stands upon the shore
And sees the life-boat sped to save,
And all to weak to take an oar,
I send a cheer across the wave."

At the close of her letter she put
in a strong appeal against the use
of narcotics. "The pipe or cigar in
the lips of Christian men," said she,
"is the strongest foe we have to con-
tend with along this line."

Telegrams of sympathy were sent
to Mrs. Youmans, Steadman and
Fawcett.

Sixty-eight delegates responded to
the roll call, representing Ontario,

Quebec and the Maritime Provinces,
with Miss Lillian Phelps represent-
ing British Columbia.

In the absence of Miss J. Archi-
bald, Mrs. Rutherford read the re-
port on unfermented wine. It
showed a marked increase in the de-
velopment of this important subject.

Mrs. E. A. Lucas, of Grimsby,
Ont., in her report as Superintendent
of the Department of Heredity
and Health, urged that the better-
ment of the race, mentally, morally
and physically, was the one great
object supremely worthy of effort
and self sacrifice. Recently a friend
of hers was urging a little boy, ten
years of age, to join a Band of
Hope, when he startled her by say-
ing, "You don't know what you are
asking of me. Never drink any more
liquor! I love it more than my life.
I could not live without it." That
was not an acquired taste with
that child; his parents were respon-
sible for it. That the children par-
take of the character of their par-
ents has never been sufficiently
realized. The "divine right" of the
child is to be "well born." The aim
of each one must be to so improve
his or her natural inheritance by
conforming his life to God's perfect
law, by cultivating virtues and slay-
ing vices, that their children will
start out in life on a higher plane
than they themselves have ever
stood, and thus on and on through
the years until perfect manhood be
reached. The need of a vigorous
department of heredity and health
in every union in the Dominion was
very great. In this work the Que-
bec Provincial Union leads the Do-
minion, thirty-two unions out of the
total sixty having taken it up.
Montreal Central Union has had a
series of half hour talks by leading
city physicians, and the Montreal
"Y's" have also had lectures in the
interests of the department.

In the discussion of the Factory
Act the shameful disregard of sani-
tary laws observed in many mer-
cantile houses, and the inefficiency
of existing legislation to cope with
the neglect or indifference of em-
ployers, was much deplored. While
six men and women manufacturing
an article are thus protected, the
sanitary environments of the thou-
sands selling the same article are
left entirely to the discretion of the
employer. Out of this legal neglect
had grown a state of things so evil
as hardly to be credible. The main
evils were lack of proper toilet ar-
rangements, and failure to provide
seats behind counters for women
clerks. The enforcement of the new
act to provide proper accommodation
for women in mercantile houses and
offices being left in the hands of the
municipal councils, it was left for
the local unions to deal with them.

Miss Douglass said that the question
was a difficult and delicate one, but
that public opinion on the subject
must be roused, and urged that each
union have the subject ventilated
in the local papers. Miss Barber
thought that the appointment of
women inspectors would meet the
whole difficulty. Mrs. Foster called
to mind the sexton of a certain New
York public school who protested
against women inspectors because,
during his thirty years as sexton,
he had never known an inspector
who asked to examine the basement
until "them women" came along.

Miss Scott promised that if "keep-
ing at it" would accomplish any-
thing, the *Woman's Journal* would
"keep at it."

Mrs. Rutherford spoke of the fact
of which her attention had been
called by a member of Parliament,
that this measure would be strangely
opposed by property owners on ac-
count of the expense entailed. This
opposition must have weight, "for,"
said he, "they come to the Govern-
ment backed by their votes, and you
do not."
