News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Green peas are to be had in the country market now at \$1.25 per bushel. They come from the Reach chiefly.

Mrs. J. Gibson, wife of Marshall John Gibson of Woodstock, died very suddenly at her residence Tuesday of heart failure.

A daring robbery was perpetrated at Moncton, about 12 o'clock, July 13. Two unknown individuals smashed a glass window in front of Messrs. O'Neill & Co's boot and shoe store and were at work when disturbed by a man going up the street. The man heard a noise and returning informed the night policeman of the depredation. In the meantime the robbers had left the store and gone up Botsford street. The policeman followed, but in some way lost sight of them. After searching for some time the officer returned to the scene and found them at work again. On seeing him coming, they ran down the wharf track and were not seen afterwards. A number of pairs of boots were found in the yard back of the store.

D. F. George has about completed all arrangements for the construction of a light draft steamer to run to Florenceville, which will be able to run after the erection of the bridge at Woodstock.

The beautiful residence of Mr. Fenwick Wallace, situated at the lower part of Sussex was completely destroyed by fire, the building being very dry on account of the late dry weather it burned rapidly, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the neighboring houses were saved. How the fire originated is not known. It is insured for \$1,000.

Mayor Beckwith has summoned a citizens' meeting for four o'clock Wednesday to take steps towards raising relief funds for the sufferers at St. Johns, Newfoundland.

A very sad drowning accident took place Wednesday morning up the St. John river at Walsford. While the Misses Russell, daughters of Mr. John Russell, were in bathing, it is supposed they got beyond their depth and were drowned. A later despatch says that the girls were Dollie Russell and Alice Dennison.

The engine for the new Victoria mills has arrived, and is being placed in position. The framework of the mill is now completed. It is a two and a half story structure with a frontage of 147 feet, and extends back 40 feet. Besides this there will be an extension for the manufacture of clapboards. Messrs Hale and Murchie expects to have the mill in full operation in six weeks.

The highway bridge across the Hammond river at Barnesville was burned Monday evening.

The steamer Florenceville has discontinued her trips to Woodstock owing to the lowness of the water.

The following changes have been made in the fishery regulations: In the province of New Brunswick no one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or have in their possession any speckled trout between the 15th of September and the 31st of March.

A young man, Moses Burt, employed in Brewer's mill, Keswick, had his left arm so badly lacerated by being caught in the belting and twisted round a wheel yesterday that the limb had to be amputated.

Solomon Peters, colored, aged 20, belonging to Kingsclear, was drowned in the river near Tapley's bar. Prince William Friday afternoon while engaged in river driving.

Messrs. Lawlor, Connor & Co. have received the contract for the construction of the Woodstock and Centreville railway. This line is about 20 miles long and will run from Upper Woodstock to Centreville, Carleton county. An extension of about six miles to the Maine boundary has been arranged for and subsidized by the Dominion Parliament. The work of construction will be commenced shortly, and pushed along rapidly, it is said.

Nova Scotia.

The wood working factory of Curran Brothers, at Amherst was destroyed by fire last Sunday morning. Loss about \$5,000, insurance \$1,000.

July 14, as Heber Warne, in the employ of Capt. Watt of Digby Joggins, was attending a vicious horse, the animal knocked him down, then seized his arm with his teeth and crushed both bones of the forearm, besides lacerating the flesh terribly. Medical aid was summoned, but it is feared that blood poisoning will follow.

Isaac Blynn attempted suicide, by cutting his throat, last week, near Digby. He had just returned from the States.

Mr. Touquoy brought two beautiful bricks of gold—one weighing 103 oz. 5 dwt. and the other 79 oz.—the result of last month's operations at the Moose River gold mines.—Halifax Echo.

A few days since the fourteen year old daughter of Edward Woodman of Digby, went out picking strawberries stepped on a sharp stick and hurt her foot. The splinter was extracted, and until Sunday last nothing more was thought of the matter, although the wound continued painful. On Sunday the child was taken with lockjaw, and after fearful suffering expired yesterday morning. The peculiar circumstances of the case have caused considerable discussion amongst local medical men.

A weir at Bass River, near Parrsboro caught twenty-eight hundred shad in one tide a few days ago. Every tide the weirs at Five Islands catch from 300 to 700 shad.

Parrsboro has shipped eighteen cargoes of deals and other lumber to Great Britain and Ireland this season.

The figures below show the foreign arrivals at the port of Halifax during the fiscal year ended June 30th: British steamers, 398; British sail, 415; foreign steamers, 49; foreign sail, 140; total, 1,002. The above represented a total tonnage of 644,691. Last year there were 995 arrivals with a total tonnage of 618,678, which is an increase for this year of nearly 30,000 tons.

Swindling pedlars are roaming about the country. The only safety is in not buying anything from them.

The Nova Scotia sugar refinery has been shipping yellow sugars to New York, realizing better prices than can at present be got in Canada.

Shad are plentiful in Minas Basin and Cobequid Bay. Some weirs at Bass River, Economy and Five Islands are getting from 1000 to 3000 at a tide.

The government has cancelled John Nicholson's contract for construction of the pier at Digby, N. S., and it is likely that new tenders will be called for.

Other Provinces.

The retrenchments on the Intercolonial have induced it to pay. The balance for the last month is on the right side. The revenue for the last fiscal year fell about \$685,000 behind the expenditure.

Henry Mitchell, son of Malcolm Mitchell of Brome Corner, Quebec, in trying to save a portion of board fence ventured too near the bank of the river which gave way letting him into the stream. He was drowned.

The Almer Ont. Gazette says of the crops in that vicinity that they are well advanced and in fine condition. Rye, in some cases, has begun to ripen; wheat and other cereals are doing splendidly, although in low-lying lands a few cases have been reported where heavy grain has commenced to lodge on account of the recent abundant rain-falls. Fruit and vegetables are also far advanced, and from present indications will yield abundant crops. On the whole, Ottawa, county has reason to feel well satisfied and heartily for the present crop prospects.

A large piece of trestle work on the Canadian Pacific Railway east of Lake Superior collapsed yesterday while a ballast train was passing over it. Fortunately no lives were lost. Traffic is interrupted, passengers and freight being transferred at the scene of the accident.

As a result of the council meeting the premier wired the administrator of the government of Newfoundland expressing the sympathy of the Canadian government in the St. Johns disaster, and informing him that the government had ordered the Newfield to be loaded with supplies and despatched immediately to St. Johns.

A despatch from Winnipeg says a terrific storm swept over Manitoba on Sunday night. In several districts everything in its path was destroyed, buildings having been blown down, machinery demolished and barns smashed to fragments. One person was killed and many injured.

Potato bugs and turnip flies are devastating crops in P. E. Island. The farmers are sowing turnips over again.

There are 48 cases of small pox in Victoria, five in Vancouver and one in New Westminster. There is none elsewhere so far as is known.

On Saturday last, at Leeds, Megantic county, two girls were killed by lightning. They were scrubbing the floor at the time, and when found were in a kneeling position with their scrubbing brushes in their hands.

Word has been received that a young Montreal artist, obtaining one of the chief prizes out of 316 competitors at the Grand Concours de l'Ecole des Beaux Arts, at Paris.

United States.

The largest fire New Orleans has known in its history broke out July 10th. The loss will be millions. All the finest buildings are destroyed.

The infant son of Franklin F. Wilkin of Beverly, Mass., on Wednesday secured and drank some water poisoned by fly paper and died four hours afterward in terrible agony. The fly paper contained enough arsenic to kill twelve persons but bore no announcement as to its being poisonous.

The Clark Shoe Company, at Haverhill, a co-operative concern founded by members of the International boot and shoe workers, principally to boom the union blue label shoe, has gone up. Charles Wiley, of the firm of Wiley & Brackett, has been appointed receiver. The creditors will receive 100 cents on the dollar, but the members of the company will have to go down into their pockets for it, as one member is reported to have collected nearly all bills and skipped.

A wagon containing ten persons was struck by a portion of a freight train that had broken apart at Witzboro, N. Y., early Wednesday morning. Four persons were killed and two badly injured. All were from New York city and were summering at Bloomingburg.

Devastation and distress are results of the great floods caused by the unprecedented rains of the past week, a West Point, Miss. The damage will not fall short of \$400,000. Hundreds of families are on the verge of starvation. At Waverly, 4,000 acres of crops are under water. Houses have been washed away and the negroes are starving. Clay and Moxibee counties will suffer almost a total loss of crops this year.

A cyclone struck Peoria lake about 10.30, July 13, and capsized an excursion steamer with a party from Pekin. There were forty persons on board. All but eighteen have been accounted for and it is believed these are dead. It is known positively that fully a dozen perished.

The body of a woman about 60 years old was found in a small brook at the bottom of Lyman viaduct, July 13. The medical examiner pronounced it a case of suicide. A slip of paper was found pinned on the woman's clothing, with the name Catherine Leahman written on it in pencil.

The most destructive tornado which ever visited Springfield, Ohio, struck the city—the resident portion—Thursday and demolished thirty residences and partially ruined over one hundred more. Loss on property nearly \$200,000. The tornado was a mile long and three blocks wide. Nobody was killed outright, but two men were fatally injured and eleven persons badly hurt.

The Champion mine at Ishpeming, Mich., has closed down, throwing several hundred men out. The Lake Superior mine may close down soon, throwing out 1,000 men. The situation is the worst in many years in the Lake Superior district.

At New Bedford, Mass. Friday, Mrs. Wm. B. Westgate, while attempting to extinguish a fire in an oil stove was terribly burned about the arms and body.

A very severe storm struck Cincinnati, Friday afternoon. It did great damage to trees, telegraph and telephone wires and poles. It broke hundreds of windows, unroofed several buildings. It also wrecked a street car and seriously injured one man. The same storm swept Hamilton, Ohio, with awful force. Scores of buildings were demolished and two people killed and a dozen injured. Other towns were visited by the storm and considerable damage done.

British and Foreign.

Owing to the report that doctors were causing cholera patients to be buried alive the lower classes of Saratoff Russia, rose in revolt on the 10th inst. and wrecked and plundered the police station, the cholera hospitals and the residences of the chief of police and physicians. Two medical assistants were killed. The mob resisted soldiers who were summoned and the latter fired, killing three rioters.

A land slide occurred at St. Gervais les Bains in Savoy July 1. A number of houses were buried beneath immense masses of rock and earth. Thirty dead bodies have been recovered and it is thought more are still in the debris.

The eruption of Mount Etna is rapidly increasing in violence. Fires in craters show great activity. Loud explosions are continually taking place. A severe earth shock on Tuesday reduced to ruins the village of Giarre, on the coast of Sicily, having a population of about 18,000. No mention of loss of life is made, but it is feared many perished. The whole country suffered from the shock.

All Sorts.

All authorities say that Pekin, the present capital of China, and Nankin, the ancient capital, are hardly half so large as they were a hundred years ago. They show all the symptoms of decay. The more enterprising and energetic individuals are found now in seaports, that offer a marked contrast to the more conservative and literary communities of the interior.

Russia furnishes us the most remarkable instance of death from cigarette smoking on record, and it is to be hoped that it will prove of value as a warning to the young men of this country. While on duty one day in the Czar's apartment young De Reiter, aide de-camp of the Czar, and a son of the Russian Minister of Finance, ventured to light a cigar. The entrance of the Czar interrupted the smoke, and in his embarrassment the young man endeavored to conceal the cigarette by thrusting it into the side pocket of his uniform. The Czar supposing the movement was an attempt to draw a pistol, rushed upon the young aide and struck him with such violence that he fell dead at the monarch's feet.

The amount of whalebone taken annually does not now much exceed 200,000 pounds. The largest part of this is taken by the whalers sailing out of ports on the Pacific coast. A few years ago the amount taken reached as high as 500,000 pounds annually, and in some years it went above these figures. The price has gone up from 50 cents a pound to \$6 wholesale.—Boston Transcript.

Edward Everett Hale, on being asked the secret of keeping young at the age of seventy, replied: "First, never do anything yourself which you can get another to do for you; second, never trouble yourself as to who will get the credit after it is done; third, never work after three o'clock in the afternoon, and sleep ten hours out of every twenty-four.

An Indian boy who was compelled to leave school is reported to have said at the last prayer-meeting which he attended: "It makes me feel very sorry when I think next week my seat will be filled with my absence." It is too often the case that people permit their seats at prayer-meeting to be filled with their absence without being made sorry. But then all can not measure up, spiritually, with every chance Indian who happens along.

Andrew Carnegie was an errand boy in the employ of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company when thirteen years old. Within five years he was appointed chief operator of telegraphy, and a few years after bought a small iron foundry in partnership with his brother and laid the foundation of his present wealth, which he estimates at between \$30,000,000 and \$35,000,000.
