The church at Marysville is engaged in building a house for their minister. They will have it completed in a couple of months.

### To the Free Baptist Churches in New Brunswick.

DEAR BRETHREN:—We were instructed by the last General Conference to address you on the question of Baptist Union, on which you are now asked to vote.

The question of Union of the two Baptist denominations having been agitated, more or less, for several years, a joint committee was appointed in 1886 to consider the subject, and, if possible, arrange a Basis of Union. That committee agreed upon a "Basis of Union." It is published in the Year Book of 1890.

The Churches are now asked to say whether they approve of that Basis. It is important that the vote be full and based upon proper information. We have, therefore, to ask that before a vote is taken the Basis be read in every Church; also, that every member be requested to read it at home.

It is necessary to remember that you are not asked to vote on whether you are willing to become Baptists, or have Baptists become Free Baptists, but whether you are willing to accept the Basis of Union as a statement of your doctrinal beliefs, and to have a union with any person or denomination that accepts the same beliefs.

It is not our duty or privilege in this letter to state our own personal views on the question. We are willing to leave the whole matter with the Lord and our brethren in the Churches.

We are instructed, however, by the Conference, to urge that the vote be a full and clear declaration from every church. And that it may be, we suggest:

1. That due notice be given of the meeting at which the vote is to be taken, and that the object be clearly announced.
2. That all the members of the churches, both male and female, be requested to vote. And that the vote be taken by ballot.
3. That when the time comes to vote the question be put thus: *Are you in favour of the Basis of Union?*
4. That the votes be counted, that a record of the number voting yes, the number voting nay, and the number present not voting, be made in the church book, and that the number voting either way be stated in the report of the church to the District Meeting.

A question so important cannot be decided lightly. And we trust the brethren in all the Churches are asking and will continue to earnestly pray for Divine guidance. If we are directed of God the result will surely be for the promotion of His cause and to His glory.

A PERFUMED CARAVAN.—Every one knows how subtle, penetrating, and permanent is the rich perfume of attar of roses. The larger part of the world's supply of this delicious scent is made in Persia, where there are many hundreds of acres devoted to the cultivation of roses for this purpose.

At certain seasons of the year long caravans of donkeys, laden with the attar, and under guard of soldiers to protect the rich booty from attack by robbers, journey from Central Persia to the little port of Bushire, whence it is exported to Bombay. Other donkey trains similarly escorted proceed to ports on the Caspian Sea, whence the attar is conveyed to Turkey and Russia, which, after Hindustan, are the largest consumers of the costly luxury.

When the wind is in the right direction, the approach of one of these caravans is announced by the scent long before it can be seen, and the line of its progress can be traced by the odor for days after it has passed by.—*From Harper's Young People.*
