THE KING IN ZION.—Ps.

2:1-12.

GOLDEN TEXT.—Blessed are they

that put their trust in him.—Ps.

2:12.

A PICTURE OF THE SCENE ON
EARTH.—Vers. 1-3. Why do the
nations. All the nations besides
the Israelites; and now all people
who do not love and serve him.
Rage. It expresses the impatient
and rebellious actions and feelings
of the wicked. The peoples imagine.
Devise scheme. A vain thing. It
was vain (this resisting God). The
kings of the earth. The leaders.
Set themselves. Assume a hostile
attitude. The rulers take counsel
together. The wicked are not only
opposed to God individually, but
have been plotting how to overthrow
him. Against the Lord, and his
Anointed. Whosoever opposes and
rejects Christ, rejects God. His
Anointed. The original word is
"Messiah," the Anointed One, to
which the word "Christ" is the
Greek equivalent. But the singer
not only sees the gathering host; he
hears their menace of rebellion.
Let us break their bands asunder
(i. e. those of Jehovah and Christ).
The metaphor is borrowed from
restive animals which break the
cords, and throw off the yoke. Cast
away their cords. The same idea
under another form.

A VISION OF THE SCENE IN
HEAVEN.—Vers. 4-6. From all this
wild tempest of confusion upon
earth, the poet turns his eye to
heaven. There, on his everlasting
throne, sits the Almighty King.
He that sitteth in the heavens. God
who reigns in calm tranquility,
infinitely above the reach of his foes.
Shall laugh. Not in mockery, but
in his conscious power to frustrate
their designs. The Lord shall have
them in derision. There is a great
comfort here for all reformers, all
workers for God. Evil is strong,
active, and boastful; it seems to
have its own way; but God is
mightier still, and in his victory
shall be our own. Shall he speak
unto them in his wrath. Not pas-
sion, but intense indignation against
sin. Vex them. Strike terror into
their guilty souls. Yet have I set
my king. They may plot and rebel
and oppose, but in spite of all God's
king shall rule over all. Have set.
Have enthroned. My king. One
who is to reign for me, so that his
reigning is identical with mine.
Upon my holy hill of Zion. Zion
was the fortified hill where was
David's royal palace.

THE MESSIAH PROCLAIMS HIS
DIVINE AUTHORITY.—Vers. 7-9.
The Anointed King, appears and
proclaims the Father's counsel con-
cerning him. I will tell of the de-
cree. The new law of his kingdom.
In substance the decree was uttered
in every promise of the Messiah.
The Lord said unto me, Thou art
my son; this day have I begotten thee.
The day when the promised domin-
ion over the world began. The
meaning of the phrase I have be-
gotten thee is simply this, I am thy
father. Ask of me. God's willing-
ness to give his Anointed the king-
dom of the world. Even Christ
prays the Father, and receives for
the asking. I will give thee. He
transfers them to Christ, because
only through the Messiah can the
nations become the kingdom of God.
Thine inheritance. . . thy possession.
Inheritance, by right as heir; pos-
session, by acquisition as moral con-
queror. Thou shalt break them. A
prophecy of what must happen if
the nations persist in revolting.
Christ himself, while he comes to
save men, and not condemn, yet
asserts again and again the utter
and terrible destruction of those
who will not become the children of
God. With a rod of iron. Not
with the sceptre of peace, but with
the spiked iron mace used in war.
It represents an irresistible in-
strument. Dash them in pieces like a
potter's vessel. A vessel made of
clay, easily broken but impossible to
mend. The Messiah will quell all
rebellion, and overcome all opposi-
tion. The strongest nations are
but as earthen-ware compared with
the strong, resistless power of Christ.
The power of evil seems very strong,
but every one is doomed to fall be-
fore Christ. The forces of intem-
perance shall be destroyed; organ-
ized oppression shall be broken;
heathenism shall fall; infidelity be
overthrown; slavery cease.

THE PSALMIST'S EXHORTATION.—
Vers. 10-12. Now therefore be wise.
In view of the fact that the Messiah's
kingdom and its principles are
bound to triumph. Be instructed.
By the facts announced. Kings
judges. All rulers and leaders of
the people. Serve the Lord with
fear. This must be the choice of
every wise person. And rejoice.
Obedience yields peace of conscience,
without which there can be no real
joy. With trembling. Trembling
does not imply lack of faith, but
only a realization of the momentous
issues at stake, of the dangers es-

caped, and the blessedness gained.
Kiss the son. An ancient method
of doing homage or allegiance to a
king. It expresses a loving homage;
the allegiance of the heart. The son.
The Messiah, the Son of God. Lest
he be angry. As in verse 5. Perish
in the way. Lose the way, i. e., to
happiness and heaven. They must
perish, who will not own Christ as
king. For his wrath will soon be
kindled. It is folly to delay, for ere
long you will be exposed to the
wrath of the Lamb. Blessed are all
they, etc. Those that trust him are
blessed now and hereafter, blessed
in body and spirit, blessed as sons
and heirs of God.

As Christ reveals the greater
glories of salvation to draw men, so
he reveals most clearly the terrible
evils and penalties of sin to warn
them.

The ruin of the wicked is irresist-
ible, complete, irreparable, as the
broken potter's vessel.
All reason, all wisdom, are on the
side of obedience to Christ.

Training Children.

A Methodist minister, Rev. Dr.
Homer, preaching in Detroit recent-
ly, from the text "Train up a child
in the way he should go and when
he is old he will not depart from it,"
said it was a common misquotation
to substitute for the closing sen-
tence "away he goes." It has be-
come a trite saying with many that
preachers' sons generally go to the
bad. Nevertheless Solomon spoke
the truth, and the trite saying was
a transparent slander on the clergy.
From an actual investigation he found
that as a rule the children of min-
isters, taking all denominations,
ranked higher as a class in the social
and business circles of society than
those of any other profession or oc-
cupation. He quoted from a dis-
tinguished modern French author,
not himself a Christian, who, after
enumerating long lists of world-re-
nowned statesmen, orators, scientists,
reformers, and famous men and women
of all lands and ages, who were the
children of ministers' daughters,
among whom were ex-Presidents
Arthur and Cleveland, declared that
the oft-repeated remark concerning
the worthless character of ministers'

children was historically and essen-
tially untrue.

Children usually possess the phys-
ical peculiarities of the father or
mother, and in no less marked de-
gree the mental and moral. Dr.
Homer believed with Beecher that
the time to begin the training of a
child is thirty years before it is
born. From one to three years of
age is the impressionable age—the
most important era in the child's
life. It is what you are yourself
not so much what you say or do,
that shapes the character and too
often fixes the destiny of your little
ones. Let parents look well to
their own habits, if they want a
good, well-developed character in
their children. You cannot whip a
good character into your child.
Whip yourself, if chastisement is
necessary. The chances are that
you yourself are responsible for your
child's conduct.

Teaching a child to be obedient,
respectful, graceful in carriage
manly in speech, and in deportment
is merely conventional training;
right enough as far as it goes, but
is not the training Solomon advises.
One may be a perfect gentleman in
outward conduct, but a devil at
heart. Impress upon the heart of
the child a love of the truth, of
goodness, of purity, and you need
have no fear for the graces of his
demeanor, nor the manliness of his
person and character. This is the
training "in the way he should go"
from which he will never depart.
You cannot do this training by pre-
cept alone. The example of your
own life, not spasmodic but contin-
uous from day to day, from year to
year, is required. Intellectual
truths may be taught without under-
standing them, but moral truths
can only be taught by being your-
self possessed of and saturated with
the moral nature you want to im-
press.

Non-Alcohol Remedies.

"What can we use instead of al-
coholics in emergency cases so often
arising in the home?" questions
many a parent who shrinks from in-

house physician of the National

question.

What besides alcohol will dissolve
camphor?
Sweet oil.

What may be used in the place of
alcohol for a stimulating bath?

1. One teaspoonful of sea-salt to a
gallon of water.

2. Aqua ammonia, twenty drops
to the gallon.

What may be used instead of alco-
hol in collapse?

1. Aqua ammonia, one to five
drops in a wine-glass of water. 2.
Amontic spirits of ammonia, ten to
thirty drops in a wine-glass of water.

3. 1-30 to 1-90 grain of atropine,
given hypodermically.

What remedy shall we use to
counteract the poison of diphtheria?

1. Permanganate of potash in
three-grain doses. 2. Tincture of
chloride of iron. 3. Bichloride of
mercury. 4. Chloride of potash. 5.
Hydrochloric acid.
