Dominion Parliament.

The Redistribution bill occupied the attention of the house June 21st. Mr. MacLean gives notice of a motion to amend the General Railway Act prohibiting railways to charge more than two cents per mile in any portion of the dominion east of Port Arthur. The report of the library committee, suggesting the appointment of Post Campbell to an appointment on the library staff, was withdrawn. The agriculture committee today reported to the house that a bonus be granted to assist in the establishment of creameries and towards changing in the autumn of the year cheese factories into butter factories in order to encourage and promote winter dairying, and also recommended that the house make provision for the inspection and weighing of cheese at export customs ports in order to adjust the disputes between the buyers and sellers; also that in the bill providing for the inspection of apples, a clause be inserted fixing the fee for inspection, the latter clause having been struck out by the senate.

John Lowe, deputy minister of agriculture, stated today that the total foreign born population in Canada last year was 645,000.

The Redistribution Bill will be proceeded with from day to day until the committee stage is passed. Then the Criminal Law Amendment Bill will be pushed.

Mr. Boulton will move in the senate that the Redistribution Bill be referred to the Supreme Court for an expression of opinion as to its constitutionality.

Hon. Mr. Foster has gone to Dalhousie with his wife. He will be absent from Ottawa until Saturday.

News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Word has been received to the effect that William Bane, who formerly resided in St. John, was killed by a train near Bangor on Monday. A despatch says that his body was badly mangled.

The Moncton gaslight and water company have declared a dividend of four per cent. for the half year ending May 31st.

Early Monday morning the post office at Sackville was robbed by daring burglars. The safe was blown open and rifled, eleven registered letters, a small amount of money and numerous stamps and postal cards being taken. Before their departure the burglars set fire to the building, but fortunately the flames were observed by some persons driving past and extinguished before they had gained much headway. The office, however, was completely wrecked. No clue has been discovered as to who the burglars were, but it is presumed they were professionals.

There are suspicions of a foul murder in connection with the drowning of Wilfred Bourgeois at Cocagne, Kent county, whose body was found on Saturday last. Dr. Lager, of Shediac, at the inquest testified that the injuries found on the head of deceased had undoubtedly been made before death, as the blood had flown freely and was considerably clotted. A woman testified that during the night she had heard the noise of a quarrel in the vicinity of deceased's boat. What has increased the suspicion of foul play is that the deceased had trouble during the last provincial election. The matter will be thoroughly investigated.

The annual meeting of the Foreign Missionary society in connection with the St. John Presbytery, held a session in St. Paul's church, Fredericton, June 22. The pastor, Rev. Willard McDonald, presided and delivered an address. Several other clergymen and some of the lady delegates also spoke.

Word has been received of the death of Wm. E. Whitty, a Richibucto man. Mr. Whitty was the mate of the American ship Frank Pendleton, and died of cholera in April last, while the vessel was going from Calcutta to Madras. The deceased was about 42 years of age.

Hale & Murchie have begun the erection of a new saw mill at Fredericton to take the place of the one destroyed by fire some weeks since. It will be well equipped, and Mr. Hale said that it was hoped they would put some of the machinery in operation this fall.

A farmer named McMullen was badly bitten by a stallion at Fredericton Junction on Wednesday. He was harnessing the animal when it turned around and, taking the man by the arm, tore out his muscles, and fractured and dislocated the arm at the elbow.

At Petitcodiac, John Garland's house barn and meat shop, were burned to the ground on Monday evening. The cause of the fire is unknown. The loss is covered by insurance.

Norman Sederquest, fireman of Vroom Bros.' furniture factory, St. Stephen, had his left hand badly cut, June 23rd, while working at the moulding machine.

A gentleman from McAdam Junction tells of the narrow escape of one Langlois, of the C. P. R. stores department, from a horrible death a few days ago. It is said he is not very popular about McAdam and a dynamite cartridge was placed under a car he was in. It failed to explode and was found by the car inspector.

The quantity of lumber hung up at the Aroostook fall is about twenty-five millions. It will require a great rise in the river to break it, the recent rains having had no effect whatever on the water up in the northern part of Maine and New Brunswick.

William Bain, who was injured by a train at Danforth, Wednesday, died on Friday evening. The deceased was a young man and was a son of the late Mr. John Bain, who had been employed for many years at the old I. C. R. freight shed St. John.

Mr. Perley True of St. Marys, aged 74, dropped dead at the Douglas boom house, of paralysis. Deceased was well-known all along the river. He leaves a widow, four sons and one daughter, all residing in Lincoln.

Samuel Jones, Gordonsville, saw the Carleton Sentinel Saturday and requested that a denial be given to the statement that his wife and child have been destroyed by bears. Mrs. Jones when last heard from, he said, was in Houlton. The disappearance of Mrs. Jones has been extensively commented upon in the morning papers.

Word has been received that the tow boat, which left F'ron for the Barony, had gone to the bottom at Spring Hill. She had a large cargo of freight aboard, including a number of mowing machines from Mr. J. F. Vanbuskirk. The boat is considerably damaged.

Considerable excitement was aroused in St. John last week by the disappearance of Edward Montgomery, son of John Montgomery principal of Albert St. School Spruce Lake was dragged and every search made for him but without avail, when all hope was lost on the 3rd day he appeared having, as he said, been lost in the woods.

Nova Scotia.

A fire at Sunny Brae, Pictou, destroyed the grist mill owned by Donald McDonald. There was no insurance.

Two young men named Crossman and Peters left Milligan's lobster factory in a sailboat on Thursday to go to the former's house. On Saturday Peters' body was picked up on the shore. It is supposed the boat swamped and both were drowned.

The schr. Laura, 95 tons, from Anticosti for Halifax with a cargo of herring, as been burned at sea. The crew were landed at Canso. The vessel and cargo, worth \$6,000, were insured in Halifax offices.

The oldest woman in Nova Scotia is dead. She was Mrs. John McMillan, of West Branch, Pictou. Her age was 105 years.

The one hundred and forty-third anniversary of the founding of Halifax was celebrated on Tuesday. The elaborate programme of sports and events was spoiled by a heavy downpour of rain.

The body of Orin Goodwin, belonging in Argyle, N. S., who had been missing for two weeks, was found floating in the harbor Gloucester, Mass, June 22.

The steamer Alpha, which sailed from Halifax, June 22, on the 15th inst. for Bermuda, Turk's Island and Kingston, Jamaica, had not been reported at Bermuda and some anxiety was beginning to be felt for her safety. Pickford & Black received a cable from Bermuda stating that the Alpha had been sighted 80 miles north of there in a disabled condition, having her shaft broken. A steamer was sent from Bermuda in search of the disabled ship.

Harlow's trunk factory, Shelburne, Halifax, was burned June 22. The loss will be about \$12,000; partially insured.

Four cars for the new electric railway of Yarmouth reached that town today. The road will be in operation the end of this month.

Captain Hurlburt of the ship Fred B. Taylor, which was run down and sunk with all hands three hundred miles east of Sandy Hook, was a native of Yarmouth. He was married and leaves a widow, but no children. He has held a master's certificate for four years. Probably all the other officers are foreigners. The Fred B. Taylor was 1,798 tons and was built at Tusket, N. S., in 1883.

A young woman, named Gussie Dennett of Sandy Cove, N. S., was so terrified by the thunder storm of last week that she went into convulsions and is now a raving maniac.

Other Provinces.

The arrivals from sea at Quebec for this season are greater by 50 sailing vessels and 24 steamships than at the same date last year. In shipping from the maritime provinces there is an increase of 27 vessels, steam and sail.

A burglary took place at Itherville, Que. on Sunday morning at Mr. P. McGinnis's residence. Two men entered by cutting a screen in the kitchen door, and, having reached the upper rooms, began ransacking the furniture in Miss McGinnis's room. They helped themselves to some hundred and fifty dollars worth of jewelry and other articles. Miss McGinnis was wide awake while the robbers were operating, but she was so weak from fright that she did not raise a cry until they had left. Mr. McGinnis and family were sleeping in an adjoining room.

The Irish leaders have offered Mr. Blake one of the two Longford seats. Both Longfords returned nationalists by acclamation at the general election in 1886. Blake has left for Ireland.

A young man named Decelles, who had been at Varennes attending a wedding, was drowned June 22, while endeavoring to reach St. Theresa Island in an open boat.

A boy named Cherbonneau, aged 17, died June 22 from injuries received from an explosion in an excavation at Jacques square.

It is rumored that the factory of the Dominion Cartridge Co. at Brownburgh, near Lachute, has been blown up and that several men have been killed. One of the directors when seen stated that he had received a telephone message that there had been an accident but could give no particulars.

The rain storm which broke over Toronto Sunday night was one of the most severe that has happened for a long time, and the damage done will probably amount to \$200,000. The rain fell so heavily that in a short time the sewers and drains in many places were choked up, causing the water to rush into the cellars where valuable goods were stored, and in some cases even into dwelling houses.

If everybody had the presence of mind and pluck of Ada Curtis, a ten-year-old Rumford girl, there would be fewer drowning accidents. She fell out of a boat into the Androscoggin, the other day and went to the bottom several times, but closed her mouth and held her breath, and when she touched the bottom she would give a spring and out she came. Her rescue from a watery grave was due to her calmness.

Winnipeg was chosen as the next place of meeting of the W. C. T. U. A resolution was passed strongly protesting against the existence of the drinking bar in the House of Commons.

Patrick O'Leary, Otonabee, Ont., was playfully shoved by a companion at Indian River station on Saturday evening and fell off the platform on to the rails. The freight train backing down cut off both his legs and crushed his head, killing him instantly.

A C. P. R. conductor named Moses Nareau, belonging to Richmond, Vt., was killed in the station yard at Farnham, June 23. He was struck by a passing engine and died instantly.

Dun, Russell & Co. report 14 Canadian failures this last seven days as against 31 the corresponding week last year.

G. W. Ross, Ontario's minister of education, is suffering from rheumatism, and his condition is serious.

A shocking accident occurred last Wednesday at St. Augustin, in the county of Portneuf, Quebec. A man named Cantin was engaged in repairing the roof of a barn, damaged by the recent tornado, when he slipped and, falling to the ground, was literally impaled on a sharp picket standing below, which passed through his body. He died shortly afterwards.

Considerable anxiety was felt in Montreal, over the fate of the steamship *Whetherby*, 38 days out from Montreal to London. The *Whetherby* left there on June 1st with a cargo of grain deals and cattle. She is an old *Furber* liner, and carried no passengers. Seven Canadian cattle attendants were on board, and there are fears that the *Whetherby* has gone to the bottom.

The will of the late Hon. Alex. Macenzie disposes of an estate of the total value of \$53,000. The widow to receive \$1,500 per annum.

The evangelical branch of the English church have decided to establish a deaconess home in Toronto.

Owing to his persistent refusal to refrain from advocating the political union of Canada and the United States, the Ontario government has authorized Attorney General Mowat to dismiss Elgin Myers from his position as crown attorney for the country of Dufferin.
