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It is reported that the interest in Mr. McNeill's meetings in Glasgow shows no sign of abating. Large meetings are held every day at three o'clock in St. Andrew's Hall; while in the evenings the Circus is filled in every part with an attentive and appreciative audience. An excellent choir is singing as the people gather and leads the praise during the meeting.

A new gospel mission car has been built at a cost of £130, to be used in the north of Ireland. Its name is "Peace." It is the fifth car sent out. In the village of England the work has been very encouraging. A lady in Dublin has offered £100 toward the erection of another car for the south of Ireland, and £50 needed for books, etc. There are some 15,000 members in the "out-and-out band."

Another New York clergyman has been speaking out in meeting. He was called to officiate at the funeral of a man who had died from the effects of intoxication, and, instead of smoothing over the faults of the departed, the clergyman took occasion to observe that the man had been a curse to himself, to his family and to the community, and that there was no redeeming point upon which to fasten a single ray of hope for his salvation, except the unbounded mercy of Jesus Christ. Of course, the mourners were shocked. They had been accustomed to hearing a man's faults mentioned in a funeral oration. They relied too implicitly on the maxim *nil nisi bonum*. It seems that there are some preachers of the gospel who think it is a good maxim to ignore occasionally.

I came here yesterday in order to see Miss Hooper before she sails. She is looking better than I expected, and the sea voyage home will quite strengthen her, I hope. She sails on the 30th inst. We are well. There is a great deal of cholera in Balasore. Two of our Christians have died. There has been no rain since last Oct. My work is getting on nicely and gives me great pleasure. I thank God for giving me work I love so much. Oh for more workers.

On the 27th Miss Hooper wrote the following:

Shall sail on 30th (D. V.) Everything is planned so nicely that I shall have no difficulty, I am sure. About the middle of June I hope to run in and see you. Mrs. Boyer and children are here. Cholera is bad in Balasore.

C. T. ACT NOTES.—Thomas Babieu, of Moncton, was fined \$100 and costs for violation of Scott Act, second offence.

Wm. Ingram, a St. Martin's rum-seller, seems to have on hand enough cases to occupy the Courts for some time. A few days ago he was before the Court and had to pay a fine of \$20 and costs for assault. He has entered action against the Presbyterian and Methodist clergymen as well as against the constables of St. Martin's for unlawfully entering his place.

Rev. E. J. Grant, of Sussex, writes to the *Messenger and Visitor*, that after a long and severe struggle the rum-sellers of that place have been beaten, have paid fines amounting to over \$500, and declare their intention to quit the traffic; and he adds, "we mean to see that this expressed intention is carried out." He speaks highly of Mr. J. A. Freeze, by whom the prosecutions were ably and successfully conducted. Bro. Grant deserves the hearty thanks—and much more, of the people of Sussex and King's Co., for the manly fight he has made against the rum gang. Much of the time he has had to carry on the struggle alone, getting only criticism where he should have received help. But, in spite of all, he pushed the battle, and won.

WESTERN BOOMS.—There is a needed warning in the following from a Kansas paper:

"There are twenty well-built towns in Kansas without a single inhabitant to waken the echoes of their deserted streets. Sarag, has a \$30,000 opera house, a large brick hotel, a \$20,000 school house and a number of fine business houses, yet there is nobody even to claim a place to sleep. At Fargo a \$20,000 school-house stands on the side of the hill—a monument to the bond voting race. A herder and his family constitute the sole population of what was once an incorporated city. This is a sad commentary on unhealthy booms. Those Kansas towns, like Wichita, advertised themselves as phenomenal boom cities. For a while 'everything was lovely and the good hung high,' but at last dry rot took hold of the boom towns and killed them."

AN AFFECTING INCIDENT.—That was an affecting and inspiring incident in the M. E. General Conference, says the *Guardian*, when Bishop Taylor held up before the audience a little four-year-old black girl from the Congo; and when Bishop Bowman came forward and clasped her hand, a colored delegate gave way to his feelings, and suddenly gave utterance to a beautiful and appropriate reference to the saying, "Ethiopia shall stretch out her hands to God." It was a fine symbol of the yearning need of Africa for Christian truth, and of the loving sacrifice of missionaries who are ready and willing to plant it in that great region. Bishop Taylor's work is encouraging. "We have about 40,000,000 such as these," said the Bishop, when the little girl was brought upon the Conference platform. That was a suggestive way of giving an idea of the work and responsibility.

THE PROHIBITION COMMISSION meets this week in Montreal.

MORE KNIGHTS.—On the Queen's Birthday the distinction of Knighthood was conferred upon Hon. J. J. C. Abbott, Premier of Canada, Hon. Oliver Mowat, Premier of Ontario, and Chief Justice Lacoste of Quebec. Since these titles continue to be conferred upon public men in the Dominion, we presume the gentlemen selected for the honor are as worthy as any in this country. We think, though, that a serious mistake was made when Sirs began to be made in this country.

THE GOVERNOR OF Ontario, Sir Alex. Campbell, died on the Queen's birthday. He was seventy years old, and had been in failing health several months. He was a member of the first government of the Dominion, and for many years filled prominent positions in the public service.

—Temperance gains are reported from many sections of U. S. as the result of the spring elections. It is said that three-fourths of the towns of Illinois have voted "no license."
