PARLIAMENT.—Mr. Davies asked as to the correctness of the information published in the press, regarding the temporary settlement of the difficulties between the Dominion and Newfoundland.

Hon. Mr. Foster replied that negotiations were now going on between the two governments, and there was reason to believe that the same would be satisfactorily disposed of at an early period. The government had information from Newfoundland that they would return to the terms which existed between Canada and the island prior to 1889, pending further negotiations.

News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

A Sackville gentleman says the Tantramar marshes should yield a bigger crop of hay this summer than for many years. More attention has been paid to them this spring than ever before, and the result cannot but show the wisdom of this.

John Mullock, a fisherman of St. Andrews, fell from his boat in the harbor and was drowned. He leaves a wife and two children. He was a fine specimen of physical manhood and was greatly esteemed.

Sunday afternoon Robert Holmes and Thomas Moses, of Indian Island, "Charlotte Co.," were drowned while sailing in their boat, caused by the jibing of the boom. Holmes had a wife and mother-in-law dependent on him. Moses leaves a wife and three children.

James Black, who was drowned three weeks ago off Quebec, while crossing in a small boat, was picked up 35 miles distant.

A saw mill at West River, Albert county, operated by Mr. H. E. Graves, was totally destroyed by fire on Saturday last. About a carload of lumber round the mill was also burned. The Methodist conference held a mortgage on the mill and plant for \$3,000.

Thomas Hunter, a carpenter who has been working with Messrs. James Harris & Co., was killed on the I. C. R., near the One Mile house, by the incoming Halifax train. The train was coming along at its usual speed when Driver Stewart saw a man on the track on the Jardine bridge. He stopped his engine as quickly as possible but not quick enough to save the man's life. The locomotive struck him and threw him from the track into the creek, where he was afterwards found dead.

On Saturday afternoon, the water power mill owned by Mr. James Skeene, and situated at Penfield, Charlotte county, were totally destroyed by fire. The mills were the principle industry in the place, having been in operation 20 years, and giving employment to about 20 hands. The products of the mills were cloths, blankets, homespuns and yarn, mainly for Messrs. Manchester, Robertson & Allison. The property was valued at \$6,000. The insurance was as follows: On the main building, \$1,000; machinery, \$2,500; dye house, \$250, cloth, \$250; in the office of the Manchester Assurance company, of England. Mr. Skeene will rebuild.

Mr. Gibson's new shingle mill at Marysville started operations May 25, with six machines. A few hours after starting, one of the employees named Munroe had three of his toes taken off by one of the machines.

Geo. Winter, son of H. G. Winter, of the custom house, had his hand badly cut by the mortice machine while at work in Risteen's factory.

The man Miles who fell down stairs Monday night in one of the hotels is lying in a critical condition at the Victoria Hospital.

Letters patents have been granted incorporating the Adogwasook Fishing Club. Their waters are in Kent county.

John B. Campbell's rotary mill at Bas River was burned to the ground a few nights ago. It was insured for about \$1,300.

Patrick McKernan has been arrested at Janeville, Gloucester Co., and committed for trial at Bathurst, on the charge of placing obstruction on the Carleton Railway for the purpose of wrecking the train.

The death occurred at Hampton on Friday evening of J. Brunswick Belyea, at the age of sixty three years. He was assaulted by a party of roughs at Hampton some time ago and to this it is believed his death is largely due. His building was set on fire a short time ago and destroyed.

At Gowland mountain A. Co., Stephen Garland's house was burned on the 26th. Besides the loss of the house, Mr. Garland reports the loss of nearly all of his furniture, as well as the clothing of the family. The building was insured for \$800 and the furniture, etc., for \$200.

Judge of probate R. C. Skinner, of St. John, was drowned Saturday afternoon in the South west branch of the Miramichi. The boat from which he was fishing sank and in the attempt to swim ashore he was so encumbered by heavy rubber boots that he became exhausted and sank.

Nova Scotia.

Two fishermen named Hiltz, belonging to Tanook N. S. went out in a boat fishing three or four days ago. The next day the boat drifted back with one dead body in it. The other has not been recovered.

Representative men in the apple and potato trade held a meeting at Kentville, Thursday and steps were taken to secure legislation requiring Nova Scotian apple and potato barrels to be uniform in size with those used for the same goods elsewhere.

The store of George Newcomb of Canning N. S. was burglarized May 25th. All the money in the till and a quantity of goods were stolen.

Prosecutions have been commenced on a wholesale scale against persons in Colchester, Digby and Kings counties, who are charged with violating the game laws by hunting moose and caribou with dogs out of season. Six persons in Cumberland have been proceeded against. Three were convicted the other day and fined \$50 each.

A sad accident occurred at Sydney Mines, C. B., at six o'clock May 26, by which a young shaftman named James Gleason lost his life. Deceased was putting down spears in the shaft, and when he went to go further down by his mate he swung into space and with a cry was gone. It is supposed that the hook which was fastened to his seat got loose while he was working on the platform above. The poor fellow fell from 400 to 500 feet and was dashed to pieces at the bottom.

An employee in Snow's factory Lequille Annapolis, N. S., by the name of O'Brien while at work May 26 suddenly fell down and instantly expired. Heart disease is supposed to have been the cause.

Albert Bowles, who on Thursday afternoon last at River Herbet, made a desperate attempt to shoot his employer, Jonathan Smith, and afterwards to commit suicide by firing two bullets from the same revolver into his own head is now thought likely to recover from the wounds.

A lesson has been taught the Windsor and Annapolis Railway which probably, have to be taught the I. C. R. and other roads. Mr. Adam R. Bell of St. John sent some goods by the Windsor and Annapolis Railway and they were stored in the station at Berwick. The station was broken into and the goods stolen. Mr. Bell sued to recover the value of the goods—\$54—and judgment was given in his favor. Instead of paying up, the railway men appealed to the full bench with the result that the judgment in Mr. Bell's favor has been affirmed.

Other Provinces.

The Hon. Mr. Kirkpatrick, M. P. for Frontenac was appointed Governor of Ontario, in room of Gov. Campbell deceased.

Fall wheat throughout Ontario has seldom been in better condition at this time of year than it is now, and a rather bountiful harvest now seems almost assured. Reports of other grains are also satisfactory, while the prospects for apples and small fruit crops were perhaps seldom better than they are at present.

James Ryan, a laborer whose home is in Toronto was killed at Colborne last Monday. He fell on the track in a fit and was run over by a train.

Roger Harley was struck by lightning and killed during a thunder storm at St. Mary's, Ont., last Tuesday.

The seven men supposed to have been drowned in Lake Ontario have turned up all right. They drifted all over the lake, finally discovering that they were five miles east of Alcott. They then made for home across the lake in a perilous condition, not having tasted food since Monday night.

Brakenman Geo. Foster, of the Niagara Central Railway, was run over and killed at Thorold, Ont.

There was a big sensation Thursday in the municipality of Cote Ste. Antoine, near Montreal, when the council decided to dismiss the chief of police and all his men. A good many robberies have taken place of late, and after hearing a report of a city detective agency, which had taken the matter in hand, the councillors discharged their police.

Robt. Watson, M. P., has been sworn in a member of the Greenway government and awarded the portfolio of public works, now held by Hon. James Smart.

Percy Leaper and Wm. Earl, were returning from Heron Island to Orillia, Ont., in a sailing canoe just as darkness was coming on. A strong north wind was blowing, and in crossing the shoal the canoe capsized. Leaper, who was an expert swimmer struck for the shore, but was seized with cramps and drowned. Earl clung to the boat and was saved.

Convict Armstrong in the Kingston penitentiary has engraved the Lord's Prayer on a five cent piece. The words are distinct and easily read. The instrument used in the work was also made by the prisoner. He is sentenced to serve twenty years for robbing a Jewish pedlar in Western Ontario. After the robbery he tied the Jew to a tree and left him to die.

United States.

Dorflinger's cigar factory at White Mills Pa., was burned Tuesday night, with a loss of over \$100,000. Twelve large buildings attached to the glass works and O'Connor's store were also destroyed. The total loss is \$250,000; insurance \$30,000.

The annual report of the Brooklyn Sunday school children took place on Wednesday afternoon. As usual it was a great success. The weather was superb. Over 70,000 children were in line; the streets were crowded with spectators and the whole city was covered with bunting.

Hull is the only summer resort town in Massachusetts that voted for license at its annual town meeting.

At Armenia on Monday night James Tobin was shot and killed at Patrick Kelley's saloon, about 25 miles from the village. At the time of the shooting Tobin was endeavoring to enter Kelley's house through a window to rescue Mrs. Kelley who was being brutally beaten by her husband. Kelley has been arrested and is now in charge of an officer awaiting the result of the coroner's inquest.

Friday night, a terrible tornado burst upon Harper, Hutchinson, Kas. Nearly all the business houses of the city are either totally destroyed or badly twisted. Both the Santa Fe and Atchison & Southern depots were entirely blown away. The end was blown out of a fine school building. Four churches were wrecked and many residences ruined. Seven deaths are reported; many persons were badly injured. The total loss is about \$500,000, of which the cyclone insurance is less than \$15,000.

The Newfoundland seal catch this year shows a take of 5,121 seals over that of last year. The total take is 548,624 seals in twenty steamers, nineteen steamers last year. Besides these a few seals are taken by sailers.

For the degradation of the English tongue implies the correlative degradation of the national character. Out of the fulness of the heart the mouth speaketh."

Why He Gave Up The Trade.

A young man, a spirit merchant, built a large house in the country, and was retiring from business. When he first told me of his intention, I remarked to him: "Surely, the spirit trade is a paying business when you are able to retire from it so soon." "No," he answered, "it is not that; I have retired from it through fear;" and then he went on to tell me that he was a wholesale merchant and sold to many retail dealers. He kept a diary in which he entered all the names and ages of his customers, and when and how they died, and he said, "I watch with deep regret many of those who came in this business gradually slipping downward. When I called on some before eleven in the morning, they were so stupefied by drink that they were scarcely able to conduct their business. One morning, on looking through my diary, I was struck by the number of names I had entered there as having died suddenly through the effect of strong drink. From that moment I shut the book and resolved that I would be done with the demon that was bringing so many promising young men suddenly and early to fill a drunkard's grave."—The British Friend.

SETTING TYPE AT THE TELEPHONE.

The management of the London Times has utilized the telephone in a unique way. Telephone wires have been laid in the underground railway tunnel between the composing room in Printing House Square and the Parliamentary reporters' gallery in the House of Commons. A copy reader placed at the telephone reads the stenographic "turns" from the note-book as fast as it is possible for the compositors to take them on their typesetting machines in the Times' building, a mile and a half away. At first the reporters did not take kindly to the innovation, but when they found that they could dictate their notes direct to the composing room without the trouble of transcribing them they began to look at the arrangement in an entirely different light. Proofs, of course, are sent to them for correction. Each machine can produce from five to six columns of solid minion a night. Errors will sometimes creep in, but there is no doubt that the practice will become a permanent one. Its great advantage becomes apparent when the fact is considered that the Times is able, by adopting it, to print in time for the 5 a. m. newspaper trains going to all points of the United Kingdom the whole of the debates, which are often continued until after 3 a. m.

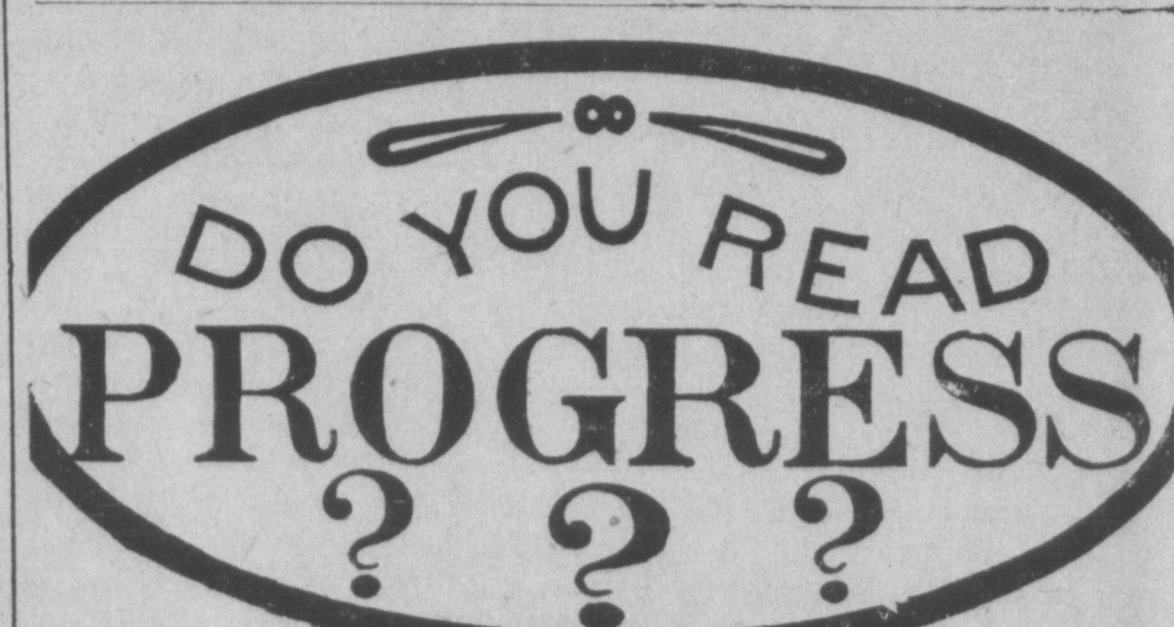
