INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

First Quarter—Lesson III—Jan. 17.

OVERCOME WITH WINE.—Isa. 28:1-13.

QUARTERLY TEMPERANCE LESSON

GOLDEN TEXT.—Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise.—Prov. 20:1.

THE OVERFLOWING SCOURGE. INTEMPERANCE.—Vers. 1-4. The court and leaders at the capital gave themselves up more and more to self-indulgence and luxury, and they persisted in regarding themselves as secure. But Isaiah saw the gathering storm. He therefore raised his voice to the magnates of Jerusalem: Lift your heads from your wine-bowls; look north. The sun-shine is still on Samaria, and your fellow-drinkers there are revelling in security. But the storm creeps up behind. They shall certainly perish soon. Within three or four years Samaria was destroyed, and the kingdom of Israel was no more forever. Woe. A warning that was coming. To the crown of pride: the capital, so called because it crowned the hill. To (better of) the drunkards of Ephraim: put for the whole kingdom, because Ephraim was the leading tribe: Whose glorious beauty. A beauty of magnificent luxury. Is a fading flower. It had nothing of the riches that endure. It was soon to wither before the Assyrian invasion. Which (rather, is) on the head of the fat valleys. Samaria was built on a hill, which rose up in the midst of a fertile valley shut in by mountains. Of them, etc. The possessors of this crown of pride and these rich valleys were overcome with wine. None but intoxicated people could be so blind as not to see their danger. Overcome with wine. A strong description of the intellectual and moral effects of drunkenness. Behold the Lord hath. He used the Assyrians as a rod where-with to punish these wicked people. A strong one: the Assyrian power. A tempest of hail. A destroying storm devastating force with which the Assyrians were about to overwhelm them. The crown of pride (of), the drunkards. All they rejoiced in would be trodden under feet. Samaria became a heap of ruins. As the hasty fruit. Rev. Ver. the first ripe fig before the usual season for figs.

The Application of this historical fact, and prophetic vision, to Intemperance, is plain. The Assyrian hordes, with all their fierceness and fury, did not so much evil to Israel as intemperance has done, and is now doing, to men. Their great army that poured over the land like a deluge, was but a guerilla band compared with the army of intemperance. It sweeps away from its victims property, home, comfort, prosperity, usefulness, riches, life, all blessings, including heaven itself. And yet moderate drinkers sip their wine, look complacently upon their crown of pride, and the glorious beauty of their surroundings, as if they were safe from the devastating power, which is far nearer them than they imagine. But they will not listen to the temperance prophets, nor hear the approaching tread of the destroying army.

One of the most effective Temperance lessons is the famous picture of the Black Valley Railroad. The Black Valley Country is situated in an extensive lowland, lying between an elevated and extremely fertile and beautiful region, called the Land of the Crystal River, bounding it upon its upper limits, and a vast and unexplored desert forming its lower boundary. The Black Valley Railroad lies wholly within this country, and we can learn something of the character of the country and its inhabitants from a description of some of the stations on the road, as given below.

The upper portion, near the Crystal River, and in some degree under its influence, is beautiful and attractive. The clouds reflecting the light from many of its resorts are of roseate hues and rainbow colors, especially in the night; and thus many are attracted within its influence, and tempted to dwell within its borders.

But gradually the country becomes rougher, more barren, and stony. The inhabitants become poorer, and are infested with innumerable pains and diseases. Vice and crime abound. Innumerable drunkards and criminals are found there. Prisons and poor-houses take the place of churches and school-houses.

On its lower limits the Black Valley Country is bounded by a vast desert, whose inhabitants are continually wandering in dry places, seeking rest and finding none. Over this desert thick clouds are always rolling, indicating approaching storms and tempests, while forked lightnings cross, and thunders mutter sounds of sudden wrath. "A

land of darkness as darkness itself." It is a place of outer darkness, where is weeping and gnashing of teeth. Here is the worm that dieth not, and the fire that is not quenched. Here is found the reptile whose tooth is like "the cruel venom of asps," and which, "at last, biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder."

It is a remarkable fact that none of the inhabitants of the Black Valley Country were born there. Every one of them came from the land of the Crystal River. And they all came into this terrible land by means of the Black Valley Railroad.

THE CROWN OF GLORY AND DIADDEM OF BEAUTY. TEMPERANCE.—Vers. 5, 6. In that day. The day when the drunkards of Ephraim perished. Shall the Lord of hosts be for a crown of glory. He will sustain, defend and bless those who obey him. Hezekiah came to the throne only three years before the fatal siege of Samaria began. He began his reign with a political revolution and a religious reformation. He threw off the yoke of Assyria, to which his father had submitted, and he cleared the land of idols and idol-worship. It was the dawn of a day of promise. Unto the residue: the remnant who served the Lord. For a spirit of judgment: of discerning the right. For strength to them that turn the battle to the gate. Those who drive the war back to the enemy's own gates.

STRONG DRINK CAUSES MEN TO ERR.—Vers. 7, 8. But they also: even those in Judah, who saw the destruction of the neighboring kingdom. So even those in temperance families and communities are sometimes led astray. They have erred through wine. They have erred from God's commandments, they have wandered into sins of all kinds, through the influence of intoxicating liquors. The priest and the prophet have erred. Strong drink biases and leads astray even the religious teachers of the land. They are swallowed up of wine. Men throw away all they have, and all they hope for, in this world and in the next,—family, fortune, happiness, life, heaven—to gratify their appetite. They err in vision. They cannot see things as they are. They stumble in judgment. They cannot judge anything correctly. No place clean. Intemperance defiles both mind and body.

THEY REFUSE WARNINGS.—Vers. 9, 10. Many regard these verses as spoken by those reproved by Isaiah, the mocking reply of drunkards over their cups. For precept must be: rather, is. For with stammering lips. That is, you think I speak to you in childish, stammering tones, but if you will not listen, the result will be exile among a foreign people, who will speak to you in their strange language. To whom he said, This is rest, etc. To these very persons God had pointed out where they could find a life at rest. The word of the Lord. . . line upon line. God repeats his lessons by word and by deed; and if they will not repent, his warnings and his punishments press on the sinner till he falls backward and is snared and taken. That they might go: as a punishment and also a discipline. He makes them drink the dregs of the bitter cup in order that they may hate it evermore.

W. C. T. Union.

OUR MOTTO.—If God be for us, who can be against us.

The reports of the Maritime convention W. C. T. U., have been received and are for sale at the W. C. T. U. rooms, York street, F. ton. Price ten cents.

The Union Signal comes draped in mourning in memory of Miss Ames who was associated with Miss Willard in editorial work. She was taken ill in Boston, while attending the late convention. Her death is very much lamented.

The Boston Advertiser speaks thus concerning the Woman's convention.

"One of the most noteworthy events of the present week has been the great dual Convention of the National and the World's delegates of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. Even those who are not in full sympathy with the methods and utterances of this important branch of temperance work have doubtless been impressed by the single-heartedness and the genuine enthusiasm which have so constantly been manifest during the Convention's proceedings. It is rarely that a convention representing so many different countries, churches, races and creeds is assembled anywhere. The host that was made of the British Empire may, with at least equal truth, be made of the countries represented in the W. C. T. U. The sun never sets upon its territory and those who watch with interest the accounts of the proceedings of the Boston Convention are to be found in every zone of the earth and near every great parallel

of longitude. There are other temperance societies whose work is well worth praise, among them the temperance organizations connected with the Roman Catholic and the Protestant Episcopal Churches. In the W. C. T. U., however, the work, while done in the name of Christianity, is identified with no single branch of Christianity, and is perhaps for that reason able to accomplish work which cannot be done by either of the great organizations for Christian temperance work.

"At all events the importance of the W. C. T. U. as an organization must be conceded. That it would make mistakes was to have been expected, inasmuch as its directors and officers are human and therefore liable to errors of judgment; but that it has done and is doing immense good must also be admitted. The life long devotion of its talented leaders to their work is a simple story of rare fidelity; the generous and powerful enthusiasm which has also animated its members is very striking in its testimony to the possibility of a real and vital 'church union' in spite of apparently irreconcilable creeds; the steady growth of the W. C. T. U. is convincing proof that women, when they unite in a work of great importance, are capable of serious and sustained effort even when the desired end seems almost hopeless of attainment."

Mrs. Mary Hunt says in her report on Scientific Temperance Instruction. Four things in the school room are absolutely essential.

1. A series of well-graded text-books that contain the whole truth against alcoholic drinks and other narcotics, together with the general laws of hygiene. Three different grades of books for ungraded schools and four for graded.

2. A course of study ordered by school boards or whoever marks out the curriculum, that shall require at least three lessons per week for 14 weeks of each school year, and lessons are regularly learned and recited with text books in the hands of all pupils able to read as in the case of other studies.

3. The same examinations and tests for promotion in this as in the case of other branches.

4. The interested teacher.

In behalf of the teaching profession I am here to say: If you will supply the first three conditions, you will have the last. If you give the pupils text-books that contain the facts to be learned, and a course of study covering the topic is ordered and the teacher knows that her pupils promotion depends on their passing a given examination in this study, that teacher will have as much interest, if no higher interest, in drilling her pupils in this as in other branches.

Are these first three essentials possible? Yes. We have now a large variety of well-graded school text-books on this topic, issued by many different publishing houses, bearing the imprint of great names as authors, all teaching the latest utterances of science against alcohol and narcotics.

UNTRUTHFULNESS often begins very early in life. We have seen mere children who (if they were not children) would surely be called arrogant thieves and sturdy liars. Some parents make their children such without realizing what they do; at least permit them to become such by neglecting proper care and discipline. Many boys and girls become so accustomed to practicing deception in word and act that they do so with as little movement of conscience as they have in eating their dinners. It is a fearful thing!
