### News of the Week.

#### New Brunswick.

In York county, as well as in Charlotte and Sunbury, deer are becoming very plentiful.

A company composed of John Leonard, A. F. Armstrong and Wm. Harding has been formed for the erection of a steam saw mill at Armstrong's wharf, Queens Co.

There are at present only twenty inmates in the city almshouse, nine men and eleven women. This is the smallest number that has been there for the last five years.

The Pope Manganese Co., of Markhamville, have closed their mines owing to the scarcity of ore, it is said. A large number of men were employed in the mines, which have been in operation about 25 years. Mr. Garvey, who has been manager of the mines since Mr. Markham's removal from the place, has returned to the States.

Hubbard, Isaac Kilburne, John Murray, Charles Kee. Byron Kilburne was appointed auditor for the shareholders. The board of directors have power to appoint a second auditor and all the other officers. A committee has been appointed to select a proper site for a butter factory somewhere near McKinley's Ferry.

Steamer William (iron), 210 tons, owned by D. Farquharson of Charlottetown, ran ashore at St. Pierre, Wednesday night on her way to Sydney. Total wreck. There is an insurance of \$5,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Daniel McNutt, of Colchester county, Nova Scotia, who celebrated their golden wedding the other day, are the fourth members of the same family to enjoy that distinction within the past few years.

A giant lobster was taken in a trawl in Digby basin. Its weight was 15 pounds; length, 32 inches; the claws were 18½ inches round and measured 37 inches from tip to tip; while the girth of the body was 17 inches. Old fishermen say it is the largest specimen ever taken hereabouts.

The dry goods store of W. D. Carter at Hantsport was burned to the ground last week. Insurance slight.

At River Herbert, Cumb. Co., Auma, the six years old child of Chas. Wood, was burned to death. She was playing with matches, and set fire to her clothes.

Wesley Daggett, confined in Digby jail met with a horrible accident Wednesday. He fell in a fit and his face coming in contact with the hot stove was literally roasted before assistance could be given.

Postmaster Hood of Yarmouth has been in office 28 years.

A terrible burning accident occurred at River Herbert, Cumberland county, N. S., on Sunday morning, resulting in the death of Anna, the six year old daughter of Chas. Wood of that place. The child was playing in the upper part of the house and her father and mother were in the lower part, when the child was heard faintly calling "papa". Her father immediately went up stairs and was horrified to see his daughter advancing towards him enveloped in flames to the neck. When the flames were put out it was found that the upper part of her body had been burned in a terrible manner, the skin being literally black.

The election in North Lanark, Ont., to fill the vacancy made by the appointment of Mr. Jamieson to a judgeship, took place Thursday, and resulted in the choice of Mr. Rossmond, Liberal Conservative, by a majority of over 500.

During the first week in June next, an extraordinary gathering of Canadian Indians takes place at Kamloops, B. C. There will be about 7,000 Christian Indians present from various parts of British Columbia, and probably a number of pagan Indians also. Rev. Father Lacombe has organized this unique gathering. It is understood that it is the desire to meet one another, compare notes and consider educational matters, progress in arts, of civilization, etc.

#### United States.

At Austin, Texas, Wednesday, Dr. W. W. Reeves, superintendent of the state lunatic asylum, was shot and killed by Henry Purnell, a discharged inmate.

Steamer "Charles Houghton," of the Frontier Line, was burned to the water's edge at Calais Thursday. Loss \$15,000; insurance \$10,000.

The total number of deaths in Boston last week was 292, against 187 in the corresponding week of last year. This increase is largely due to influenza.

On Tuesday there was a \$47,000 fire in Manchester, N. H.

The heaviest fog that has been known in New York for years hung over the city, river and bay last week. Traffic on the streets was much impeded, and on the river the ferry boats, and smaller craft were compelled to move at a much reduced rate.

The entire San Antonio and Arkansas Pass railroad is tied up as a result of the strike. The railway operators claim that they are poorly paid and that a system of removals and reductions has been inaugurated. The telegraphers, backed by all the other operatives, 850 men, are idle.

Fire at Birmingham, Ala., destroyed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars worth of property, which is three-fourths covered by insurance.

The double-headed trains collided near Graneros, Colorado, Thursday night. One of the firemen was killed. Three men were badly injured. The trains were heavily laden with passengers, but far as learned they escaped serious injury. The four engines were badly wrecked.

Nebraska suffered last week from a very severe blizzard. Trains on all railways were seriously retarded, and in many cases were blocked. The storm extended throughout Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming and the Dakotas. In Wyoming the loss of stock is reported unusually large, with a complete train blockade.

In East Oregon and Washington snow has fallen to a depth of from five to twelve inches.

Two hundred and four of the 365 colleges in the United States are co-educational.

The university of Michigan will erect a Grecian temple as her contribution to the World's Fair at Chicago.

#### British and Foreign.

The cold and foggy weather spoiled the Christmas season in London, England. Tradesmen are reported to have lost \$10,000,000 by the loss of holiday trade.

A despatch from Calcutta Wednesday gives an account of another engagement on the Pamir frontier in which Lieutenant Manners Smith and a force of 100 Kashmiris in the British service displayed great gallantry. Seventy of the rebels were killed and many wounded and 118 prisoners were taken. Pursuit was kept up and the British forces captured Gulmit, P. sau and Mayun.

Advices from Japan state that word has been received at Singapore that the Indian steamer, Enterprize, with a crew of 77 men, foundered off Port Blair and Aman Islands, Nov. 3. Only six men were saved.

The governor of the State of Durango Mexico telegraphs that in that state people are dying of starvation. Corn is being sold at cost to the poor and money orders for the purchase of corn are being distributed by organized charity. The President has ordered federal officials to aid the poor in Durango and other states, who may be suffering from lack of food.

The bodies of five miners were recovered from the pit at Castleford, Yorkshire, which has been on fire for a fortnight. The bodies were so cremated that the ashes hardly filled a bucket.

The S. liel and other Paris newspapers make the startling announcement that a plot has been discovered in the Russian colony to blow up the building in which the chamber of deputies meet, also the building occupied by the Russian embassy. A number of Russian nihilists have been arrested. It is conjectured that the existing relations between Russia and France are disliked by the Russian refugees and that they are determined to take vicarious vengeance on the Czar and his government by blowing up the French parliamentary buildings.
