Things Religious in the Province.

—Rev. J. C. Morse (Baptist) of Sandy Cove, Digby, N. S., has held his present pastorate fifty-three years.

—Rev. S. B. Kempton has resigned the pastorate of Canard, N. S., Baptist Church. He has been pastor there several years.

—The officers of St. James Church (Episcopal), St. John, last week made complaint in the Police Court against Geo. Williamson, a member of the congregation, for disturbing the worship of the church. Mr. Williamson's offence consisted of singing more loudly than they thought he ought. He shocked the sensitive nerves of the dear people, and they were compelled to seek protection in the Police Court. Before the case came to trial it was settled in some way. One of the church officers making the complaint is a brewer. Men in his business send many people to the Police Court.

—The Fairville Methodist Church was burned on Tuesday of last week. It was a new building, and was about ready for dedication. There seems no doubt that the fire was incendiary. Fortunately the church was insured, but at best the loss is severe. Our Methodist brethren in Fairville have suffered much within a few months—the destruction of two churches and the parsonage.

—The erection of the new Baptist Church at Gibson is being pushed on as rapidly as possible. It will be a little larger than the one burned.

—Rev. A. E. Ingraham has resigned the pastorate of Tabernacle Baptist Church, St. John, to take effect at the end of this month.
