### News of the Week.

#### New Brunswick.

The municipal elections for York county have taken place. The councillors elected for two years, and the results are as follows:

Dumfries—John Scott and Thomas Simmons, by acclamation.

Kingsclear—John C. Murry, A. E. Cliff, by acclamation.

New Maryland—David Fisher, A. A. Nason, by acclamation.

North Lake—Geo. S. Inch, David Cropley, by acclamation.

Queensbury—Alanson McNally, John Hamlet, by acclamation.

Stanley—Daniel Fullerton, James Boies, by acclamation.

St. Marys—Alex. Heren, 246; Calvin Estabrooks, 216; defeating Luther Goodspeed, 205.

Southampton—J. K. Pinder and P. Lockhard, defeating George Brown and Timothy Smith.

Douglas—William Kinghorn, 297; W. H. Lawrence, 297; defeating Thomas Murray, 103.

Bright—John McKen and Spencer Inch, defeating C. W. Estey.

Canterbury—Jameson and Carr, defeating Lawson and Paterson.

Manners Sutton—Thompson and Mowatt, by acclamation.

Prince William—The old councillors Messrs W. W. Graham and Archie McMullin, were elected, defeating Mr. Porter.

Owen Saunders of Woodstock is in jail for violation of the Scott Act.

The opposition to the election of the three candidates for the election to the municipal council of Woodstock has ignominiously fizzled out. The three present members have been endorsed as the temperance candidates and much effort was made to have an opposition ticket, and a number of names were confidently announced as being on the ticket of the anti-Scott Act party.

The time for making nominations has passed, however, without any other nominations being made.

The city council last week accepted the tender of the Fredericton Electric Light Co. to supply the city with fifty 1,200 candle power arc lights. The contract is for ten years at \$2,750 per year.

Tuesday afternoon Mr. Gideon Fields while working on a scaffold at Mrs. Abner Hamilton's house at Woodstock lost his balance and fell off backwards. He struck the ground on one shoulder and side receiving very severe injuries. His shoulder blade was broken, two ribs fractured and his body badly contused. Mr. Fields is an elderly man and his injuries may prove very serious.

Edward Stevens, aged 35, seaman from Moncton, N. B., fell from the masthead of a vessel at Commercial wharf, Boston, Oct. 4, fracturing his skull. He died before he could be taken to the Emergency hospital.

Word was received last week that a prize had been awarded to the fish exhibit of James Patterson of St. John at the World's Fair. Mr. Patterson's exhibit consisted of shad, herring, alewives, haddies and blasters.

The results of the University matriculation examination has been announced. All the candidates, seventeen, have successfully passed. Arthur H. Shea, heads the list of junior matriculants, standing alone in the first division. He also wins the York scholar ship.

The examiners speak of Mr. Shea's examination as a particularly fine one, reflecting credit not only upon himself, but on the Fredericton High School, from which he comes. Edmund Burke wins the St. John County scholarship.

The fines collected at the police court since October 1st, 1892, to the first of this month amount to \$2,505.40, and of this sum \$1,700 were for violations of the C. A. A. and \$805.40 from other sources.

The Scott Act boom is on here yet. Yesterday afternoon six cases were heard by Col. Marsh and three convictions registered, two against Austin Harris of Springhill and one against Hugh Edgar of St. Marys. In another case against Edgar judgment was reserved, and after hearing the witnesses for the prosecution in three cases against W. H. White the further hearing was adjourned on the application of the defendant. Several cases were heard and determined against the Queen Hotel, and six or eight cases stand for hearing against other parties. There have been in all about 24 convictions during the last weeks.

Miss Gilbert, daughter of G. G. Gilbert, Q. C., of Rothesay, was robbed of a pocket book containing eighteen dollars. The young lady came to the city on the morning train. Near Mrs. Isaac Burpee's residence she was suddenly attacked and seized by a man, who had a handkerchief tied over his face for a mask. Snatching Miss Gilbert's pocket-book, the robber let go his hold on the lady, and jumping over the boulevard railing, heran down the bank into Spring street. She also managed to describe the appearance of the man pretty clearly, and the police hope to secure the guilty person.

Dr. A. B. Walker has been instructed by Mr. James S. Byrne of Sussex to bring an action for damages against

Conductor A. Rennie of the I. C. R. Mr. Byrne alleges that he was put off the train when he had a right to stay on. The action is for \$3,000 damages.

The preliminary examination of Capt. Russell, regarding the accident to the steamer Rustler, was finished on Saturday. Police Magistrate Niven then said he thought there was sufficient evidence given to put him on trial, and he gathered from the evidence, that the captain was guilty of negligence, although it was an accident.

Capt. Russell went on his own bonds, amounting to \$400, to appear before the County Court on October 17th.

#### Nova Scotia.

Blenkhorn & Sons' axe factory at Canning was destroyed by fire last week. The loss is \$7,000, and the insurance \$1,000. The firm has made arrangements for filling all orders. The work will be done in another factory.

About 500 cheese of excellent quality have been made during the season at our experimental farm dairy. Attention is now being given to butter.

The severity of the late rain storm in the Amherst districts is becoming known as people from outside come into town. The storm has proved most destructive to bridges, and with some places communication is cut off.

At Shinimicas, out of ten bridges over the river only three remain standing. Burns & McPherson's bridges being among the wrecked ones. On the Tyndal road leading to North, bridges are down. At Curran's mill some 75 feet of the mill dam was carried away and about 150 logs lost. Another Lowe lost about five thousand shingles. Many tons of hay on the marshes still remain submerged, and the root vegetables, it is feared, will suffer severely.

At midnight Sunday a light engine left Truro for Stellarton in charge of Driver Copeland and Fireman Kennedy and came to grief just as it was passing over the further points of the Truro yard. Some miscreant had shifted the switch for the siding. Copeland and Kennedy escaped uninjured, but they had a close call, as the locomotive came within a hair's breadth of going over a steep embankment. Another report says a fiendish attempt to wreck an Intercolonial train was made near the same spot, where a sleeper was placed on the track and the train fired at by unknown men. Last Sunday night or early yesterday morning a switch a short distance north of Truro was opened, causing the engine to dash off the track and tumble over on its side. The engineer and fireman narrowly escaped death. In the immediate vicinity to where the attempt was made is a deep embankment. An examination of the switch shows that the lock was deliberately smashed and the death trap opened for the first train to leap into it. The railway authorities are working on the case and from information gleaned by them it is thought that arrests will follow.

The Norwegian barque Pontecarve, Capt. Ainesen, from Liverpool, England, in ballast, bound for Miramichi, five weeks out, ran ashore just below Green Cove Cape Breton, during the recent storm, and is a total wreck. The captain and crew got ashore with difficulty. The wreck is fast breaking up. Her bottom is gone and decks broken considerably with a heavy surf still running. The ship is listed toward the shore with both masts broken. Had she gone a cable length either side of one of the reefs that project at these points the crew could not have saved themselves. No other casualties are reported.

A son of W. C. Woodworth met with a painful accident on last Tuesday at Delap's Cove. One of his little fingers was cut off by coming in contact with a circular saw.

Some weeks ago A. L. Hubley, of Worcester, Mass., arrived at Halifax on a visit. He went shooting near St. Margaret's Bay. When he came home his hand was wounded, and he stated he had shot it when crossing a fence. Hubley is reported to have had \$128,500 accident and \$100,000 on his life, the accident being apportioned among some eighteen American and English companies. While in Halifax he took out \$5,000 each with G. M. Graer and A. Shortt. During the past week or two an accident insurance expert and an inspector have been in the city enquiring into the circumstances surrounding the shooting. Interesting developments are promised.

There is considerable excitement among the owners of the Amherst body of the marsh, a break ten feet square having been wilfully made by some parties in the abode across Laplauche river put there by the proprietors of the Amherst marsh ten years ago at a cost of eight hundred dollars. The breach would have let the tide in the flooded Fort Lawrence marsh had it not been discovered.

Steps are being taken to find out the perpetrators of the act.

The following deliverance was, on motion of Rev. H. H. McPherson, seconded by Rev. Dr. Murray, unanimously adopted by the Presbyterian synod "The synod receives the report and thanks the conveners for their diligence. The synod express their sympathy with the Protestants in Bathurst and other places in New Brunswick in their efforts to secure the removal and redress of the grievances of which they complain. The synod further express, as in former years, their strong disapprobation of any contravention of the free non-sectarian school laws of these provinces, either in letter or in spirit, and urgently recommend all the ministers and members of our church to watch with due diligence against any encroachment upon the rights of our people in relation to school education and against all such compromise as in any respect contravene the public school laws in the interests of any particular religious demonstrations.

A young man narrowly escaped getting crushed beneath the wheels of the incoming Halifax express a day or two ago. He attempted to board the train while it was moving quite rapidly. He missed his footing, the car struck him on this side of the head and threw him between the platform and the wheels. J. P. Edwards, the station-master, happened close by, and with remarkable presence of mind got down on the platform, grasped the young fellow and held him under the platform until the train came to a standstill. The young man was pretty well shaken up. His head, hand and side were considerably bruised.

Quite a large bunch of May-flowers was picked last Wednesday by a young lad on the Cameron farm, about a mile from town—a most extraordinary thing for this time of year.

#### Other Provinces.

Early Thursday morning Stephen Badgley, of Deseronto, Ont., was found dead on the roadside. He had gone out to exercise a colt in a buggy, which backed into a ditch. Badgley fell under the horse's feet and was trampled to death. The horse, unable to get out, was standing on the dead body when found.

(Special)—The four days wind and rain still continues, with very high tides about Charlottetown, P. E. I. The steamer was again unable to cross to Pictou and many passengers are detained here. A great deal of damage is done on the North Shore among the oyster boats lying at anchor. The sea is mountains high, and boats were driven ashore in scores overturned and battered, and their fishing gear, etc., washed overboard and lost. The heavy loss to fishermen will reduce the oyster catch considerably this season.

#### United States.

A southeast gale visited Mobile, Ala. Monday. The wind had blown the water in from the gulf until the river reached Royal street, four blocks from the river at an elevation of about 15 feet from the mean river height. All the wholesale and a great portion of the retail districts of the city are in four feet of water. Thousands of dollars worth of goods have been damaged. Several boats were wrecked. The southern part of the city is badly wrecked. Telegraphic communication is almost entirely cut off. Many houses are unroofed.

If forty-nine or less go, they will be returned for one-half fare. Each purchaser of a ticket to St. John must ask for a certificate from the agent. The certificates must thus be filled in and signed by the Secretary of Conference, and presented to the ticket agent in St. John, who will sell return tickets at the rate agreed upon. Tickets going must be purchased not more than three days before the opening of Conference; and return tickets within three days after adjournment of Conference.

STAR LINE.—Delegates going to Conference by the steamers "David Weston" or "Olivette," will be returned free on presentation of certificate signed by the Secretary of Conference.

Delegates travelling by the steamer "Springfield," and paying one first class fare to St. John, will be returned free on presentation of certificate signed by the Secretary of Conference.
