Fishery Inspector Chapman returned from Richibucto January 18. He reports the smelt fishing business booming at that place. It is estimated that about 50,000 tons will be taken Richibucto river this season, where 175 nets are spread. Between 300 and 400 men are engaged in this occupation, some nets taking in two and three tons a day. Smelts bring from  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 cents per pound in the American market.
